

BACCALAUREATE COLLEGE AUDITORIUM April 29, 10:15 a.m.

- 1. Assemble in the Glass Lounge of the College at 9:45 a.m. for the processional.
- 2. The processional forms by 10:00 a.m.
- 3. Students will be seated in the first two rows centre of the auditorium. Faculty will be seated in the entire section in front of the organ.
- 4. MALE participants will remove their mortar boards immediately after taking their places, and will put them on again as the recessional begins. The recessional follows the same order as the processional.

GRADUATION CONVOCATION EDMONTON CONVENTION CENTRE April 29, 3:00 p.m.

- 1. Assemble in Rooms 5 and 6 on the meeting level of the Edmonton Convention Centre at 2:20 p.m.
- 2. The processional forms at 2:40 p.m.
- 3. Graduates maintain an interval of about 6 feet during the processional.
- 4. Graduates will sit in the first row. The faculty will sit in the four rows behind them.
- 5. MALES will remove their mostar boards immediately when they take their places. They will put them on again during the conferring of the degrees and for the recessional. The recessional follows the same order as the processional.
- 6. During the conferring of degrees, graduates first pause on the right side of the stage to receive their hoods, then walk to the left to receive their diplomas from the President.
