The Cosmological Argument – Guest Speaker

Dr. Don Page, Professor of Physics at the University of Alberta, will speak to the Philosophy 357 class on Friday, October 26, on the topic "Quantum Cosmology and Theology" – 12 noon, Auditorium. Two hours have been booked to allow for questions after the address.

Dr. Page is one of the young quantum physicists who is working on the leading edge of research in cosmology. He is the author of 97 scientific papers and book chapters on subjects such as black holes, quantum physics and cosmology.

Enrollment Management Task Force

Last March the firm of Ingersoll Williams and Associates was contracted to conduct an audit of the enrollment program at Concordia College. The audit proposed to identify the College's enrollment goals and forces which support or inhibit efforts to achieve those goals, and to make preliminary recommendations for change. The audit report, now on reserve in the Library, targeted key areas on which to concentrate our enrollment efforts – both for the short and the long term.

Enrollment of students is not simply a concern of the recruitment and admissions office. In order to ensure maximum results for enrollment management in Concordia's future, a task force will be created that represents the entire Concordia College campus community.

The job of the task force, as outlined by Ingersoll in the audit report, is:

- to serve as the focus for enrollment management planning and implementation at Concordia College
- to play a key role in the flow of information (including product development) and in developing the flow of energy and action around change in the organization
- to develop and smooth the way for actions needed to improve enrollment results

It is critical for the entire campus community to offer active and creative support as the College studies and implements better ways to serve the needs of our changing student body. If you have questions or comments as the process continues, please feel free to contact Lynn Gergens.

From the Cabinet and Councils

The new IBM RISC 6000 computer system included in this year's budget for the Student Services area is in the process of being installed. This UNIX-based system will eventually allow integration of other departments, including the Business Office and Development.

The remaining two incoming lines available on our telephone system have been brought into use. A survey of incoming calls revealed a loss of 30–40 calls per day before the new lines were installed.

A revised budget will be brought to the Finance Committee of the Board of Regents and the Board itself in November. An analysis of income and expenditures indicated enough changes to warrant a rewriting of the summary pages. Area budgets are not involved at this point and they will probably not require any revision as long as everyone exercises due restraint from now to the end of the year.

A new sociology major and business minor were approved at the recent faculty meeting. Following acceptance by the Board of Regents and the PCAB, the programs will be implemented in the 1991–92 academic year.

Our printshop has been receiving a number of requests that, unfortunately, involve an infringement of copyright laws. Therefore, commencing December 1, 1990, we will be asking that a permission letter from the registered owners accompany all printing orders of copyright materials, as required by law. Copyright regulations will be disseminated to faculty through the divisions in the near future to enable adequate preparation for printing needs next semester.

The Admissions and Registrar's offices close on Friday, October 26, for a staff retreat at Rundle Park. Brent Goebel will be available as required to answer telephones and inquiries.
