<u>Description:</u> Exploration of basic techniques of oral communication and <u>public speaking</u> with an emphasis on speech construction. Note: not open to **1**st year students unless by consent of department.

Objectives:

- 1. To facilitate confidence towards effective and efficient communication.
- 2. To improve communication skills, both in terms of public speaking, speech construction and interpretion of material.
- 3. To create an awaremess of dramatic literature and technique towards a fuller appreciation of the dramatic arts.
- 4. To instill understanding and awareness of physical voice production and gesture.

Syllabus:

1. Confidence: practice in effective and efficient preparation and presentation of material.

- 2. Communication skills: public speaking styles (lecture, storytelling, readings, etc), speech construction (interest, knowledge and attitude) and interpretation of material (selected from poetry, novels, short stories, essays, etc.
- 3. Development of awareness of dramatic literature and dramatic arts.
- 4. Voice production: basic exercises in breathing, relaxation, projection and development of warm-up procedure.

 Gesture: basic communication theory.

Techniques:

- 1. Video recordings of student speeches and self evaluation.
- 2. Lectures and presentation of speeches.
- 3. Attendance at performed plays or ather appropriate events with oral and written review.
- 4. individual exercises.

Assignments:

- 1. Daily exercises.
- 2. Construction, selection and presentation of materials.
- 3. Individual and/or group projects.

Grading: 100% course work. No final exam.

Maximum enrolment 25 students.
