Board Approves Next Phase of Building Project

On Friday, November 23rd, the Board of Regents of Concordia College authorized the administration to proceed to the next phase of the Tegler Student Centre building project, which is the preparation of working drawings and contract documents. Approvals of the appropriate Lutheran Church–Canada board representatives will also be required. A tentative commitment to begin construction by the spring/summer of 1991 is contained in the Board's resolution.

This major step forward was made possible by the Student Association's endorsement of a \$50 per student building development fee to be assessed over the next five years. As well, the students made a commitment to provide an additional \$10,000 annually to the building project from Association income, over the same five year period. Funding from this source is expected to amount to \$400,000, raising the total of cash and pledges to date to approximately \$1.85 million. Plans are also being developed for an intensive fund-raising effort in the local business community.

There is still a long way to go before a definite commitment can be made to break ground in the spring. Your continued prayers and support would be truly appreciated.

Joel DeBlock Recommended for VPAA

The Vice–President for Advancement and Administrative Services Search Committee concluded its search with the recommendation to the Board of Regents of Joel DeBlock of Oshawa, Ontario as the most suitable and desirable candidate for this important position. The Board approved this appointment at their November 23 meeting, and it has now gone on for ratification by the Board for Higher Education of Lutheran Church–Canada.

Mr. DeBlock has a B.Sc. in Mathematics and an M.Sc. in Economics from the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon. He has been an employee of the Bank of Montreal since 1985, with his most recent position being that of Risk Management Analyst for the Risk Management Policy Unit in Toronto. He has handled portfolios with both Canadian and International exposure, and has experience in government relations at all levels. Joel has a special interest in long-range strategic financial planning. He could also be available as a guest lecturer for our Business minor courses.

Joel is an elder at Grace Lutheran congregation in Oshawa. His father, Dan, is a retired pastor living in Saskatchewan, and brother, Paul, shepherds Bethlehem Lutheran parish in Bruderheim. His immediate family includes wife, Beth, and two children aged 8 and 6.

The Search Committee was unanimous in its endorsement of Joel, and it is hoped that he will be able to assume the duties of the vice-presidency in early February.

Highlights of November 23 Board of Regents Meeting

The following does not constitute the minutes of the November 23rd Board meeting, but gives highlights of action taken.

- 1. Appointed Rev. Harry Ruf as Secretary of the Board of Regents, replacing Edwin A. Klarenbach who resigned from the Board in late October to become Concordia's Dean of Business Affairs/Comptroller. Pastor Ruf was also chosen to replace Mr. Klarenbach on the Presidential Search Committee.
- 2. Selected Rev. Paul Eifert as delegate and Mr. Ted Holtby as alternate to represent the Board of Regents at the A–BC District Convention in Calgary in early April.
- 3. Appointed a Special Awards Committee comprising Richard Kraemer, Leonard Busch, Ed Klarenbach, Rev. Harry Ruf and Rev. Cliff Haberstock to recommend suitable candidates to receive the Christo Et Ecclesiae and Distinguished Service awards in 1991.
- 4. Approved a new admissions policy for inclusion in the College Calendar; revised admission and readmission information contained in the High School Calendar, and approved a new tuition reduction policy for the high school.
- 5. Approved new <u>Faculty Handbook</u> policies 4.365 (High School Faculty Service Load) and 5.375 (Concordia College High School Program Evaluation).
- 6. Approved new majors in History and Sociology and a Business minor, and revision of the Psychology major to include Psych.319 as a core requirement. To be implemented in 1991–92.
- 7. Heard a report from the Interim President which included updates on long-range planning, PCAB action on B.Ed. degree proposals, Church Work Program survey responses, negotiations with the Department of Indian Affairs (UCEP program), and development operations.
- 8. Revised the 1990–1991 budget summary pages to more accurately reflect current income/expenditure realities. (Note: the \$10 million mark has been reached! The 1990–91 budget now totals almost \$10.5 million.)
- 9. Adopted a schedule of fees for 1991–92 for both high school and college (exclusive of an education fee, which will be set in the spring). Changes include the addition of a \$50 building development fee endorsed by the Student Association, a 10% increase for dormitory housing and food services, a \$10 increase to Student Association fees requested by the student councils, and increases to fees for visa students.
- 10. Passed a resolution authorizing the administration to proceed to the next phase of the Tegler Student Centre project, which is the preparation of working drawings and contract documents, pending approval of the appropriate Lutheran Church–Canada board representatives. The resolution includes a tentative commitment to begin construction in spring/summer of 1991. Efforts to raise the remaining needed funds as soon as possible are to continue.
- 11. Under Personnel:

Shorty Brown's Project Arctic Ice Skates

A major campaign to provide Arctic Youth with ice skates, under the direction of long-time N.W.T. resident and sports supporter, Shorty Brown, kicked off in N.W.T. communities and in major centres in southern Canada on November 19.

Along with the development of multi-purpose arenas in many territorial communities comes the need to provide youth with appropriate equipment in order that they may enjoy winter ice activities and develop their skills. **Shorty Brown's Project Ice Skates** will provide ice skates and equipment to male and female youth and young adults in communities across the Northwest Territories.
