TEAM LUTZER FIRST IN ROAD RACE

The Kinsmen Labatt's Lite Racing Team placed first in the June 27th inaugural running of the Kananaskis 100 mile road race. Harry Lutzer is a team member.

With over 100 teams entered, the race started at 7:00pm at Longview, 55 miles southwest of Calgary. The runners climbed in stages from their 4,000 ft. start to 7,300 ft. at stage 5, the highest vehicle pass in Canada. The race ended at the Kananaskis Lodge (Mt. Allen).

The Kinsmen team was challenged throughout the entire race, with the lead switching back and forth numerous times along the course. The win was finally sealed in the last stage of the race when their last runner beat the Vancouver Lion's Gate final runner by 7 minutes. The Kinsmen team finished the 100 mile race in 11 hours and 4 minutes. In addition to a \$500 winning prize, the team received a large sculptured team trophy and small individual trophies for each runner.

1987-1988 REGISTRATION STATISTICS


A record number of 1022 new applications for college have been received as of June 30, 1987. In addition, 350 returning students have applied for reenrollment.

CONTINUING EDUCATION DEPARTMENT UPDATE

Spring Session commenced on May 4 and saw a total of eight courses with an enrollment of 290 students. The two most successful courses were Chemistry 250/350 with three lab sections, and English 210 with two sections.

Summer Session began on July 2 with three sections of English 30 and one section of Math 30. Total Summer Session enrollment is 115 students.
