

Parking Woes

Two major gifts totalling \$55,000 were received today, bringing the "Faith in the Future" campaign total in gifts and pledges past the \$350,000 mark. A number of other large gifts are expected to come in by early October.

"Home by Christmas" is the theme for a renewed thrust to reach the current campaign target of \$1.7 million by the end of this year. The firm of Haynes Elliott Marketing Services in Calgary is providing valuable assistance to the Development Department as efforts are planned to attain this goal. One of the consultants working with us is Ron Strand, a Concordia alum from the early 70's.

Alberco's project manager reports that water and sewer lines should be tied in and the excavation completed within the next 3-4 days. Part of the old boiler house will be demolished and work begun on the foundations. All of the footings are expected to be in place within two weeks. Then look for the walls to begin to appear!

Dr. Martin E. Marty in Edmonton for Lutheran Life Lectures

Dr. Martin E. Marty, the Fairfax M. Cone Distinguished Service Professor of the History of Modern Christianity at the University of Chicago, is the featured speaker at Concordia Lutheran Seminary's Eighth Annual Lutheran Life Lectures on Thursday and Friday, September 18-19.

Dr. Marty earned his Ph.D. degree at the University of Chicago in 1956. He has taught since 1963 in the Divinity School, the History Department, and the Committee on the History of Culture. He is also Senior Editor of the weekly <u>The Christian Century</u> and senior Scholar-in-Residence at, and past President of, the Park Ridge Center for the Study of Health, Faith and Ethics. He edits <u>Second Opinion</u>, the journal of the Center, as well as the fortnightly newsletter <u>Context</u>. He is also coeditor of the quarterly <u>Church History</u>.

Marty is past president of the American Academy of Religion (1988), the American Society of Church History (1971) and the American Catholic Historical Association (1981), is an elected Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and an elected member of both the Society of American Historians and the American Antiquarian Society. He holds 40 honorary degrees.

The author of 40 books, Dr. Marty won the National Book Award in 1972 for <u>Righteous Empire</u>. His <u>Modern American Religion. Volume 2. The Noise of Conflict (1919-1941)</u> and his (coedited with R. Scott Appleby) <u>Fundamentalisms Observed</u> are both being published this year by The University of Chicago Press.

Dr. Marty is a member of the Board of Regents of St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minnesota, and is on the Advisory Board of the Carter Presidential Center in Atlanta. He directs the Fundamentalism Project, an international public policy study of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

Marty served ten years in the Lutheran pastorate after having been ordained in 1952. He and his wife, Harriet, live in Riverside, Illinois. Included in their grown family are four sons, a daughter, two foster children, and, in a new generation, seven grandchildren.



AADAC Research Grant for Students

In celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the Alberta Alcohol and Drug Abuse Commission, the Memorial Trust Fund of the Commission will be awarding two research grants in the amount of \$5,000 each to students currently attending post-secondary institutions in the province of Alberta. The grants will support research examining the nature and extent of alcohol and other drug use and abuse among a variety of groups such as: post-secondary student populations, families, young adults, professionals.

Both treatment and prevent focused projects will be considered.

Students interested in applying for the grants are invited to submit a proposal to the Chairman of the Memorial Trust Fund Committee (6th Floor, 10909 Jasper Ave., Edmonton T5J 3M9) no later than October 15, 1991.
