## Concordia President Installation Sunday

Opening services for the 40th academic year at Concordia College will be highlighted by the installation of the Rev. Roland A. Frantz as the school's third president.

Services will be held in Alumni Hall on the campus at 71 Street and Ada Boulevard, Sunday at 3 p.m.

Rev. George Rode of Grace Lutheran Church in Edmonton will preach the sermon, and Rev. Alvin Raduenz of Mellowdale, of the school board of control, will perform the rite of installation, assisted by the faculty.

Miss Carlene HeImkamp, new dean of women, will then be inducted into office by Mr. Frantz. Mr. Frantz came to Edmonton from a nine year pastorate in Olympia, Washington. A 1943 graduate of Concordia Theological Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri, he has had experience in youth work, religious education, public relations and administrative duties.

About 100 students are enrolled in the senior high school and college department of Concordia. An estimated 70 per cent of these are studying for professional careers in the Lutheran Church as pastors, missionaries, teachers and deaconesses.

Concordia was established in 1921 by The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod.
