Professor Emeritus Harold Witte Laid to Eternal Rest

A number of Concordia's faculty, staff and students joined Witte family members and friends at Redeemer Lutheran Church on Monday afternoon at a service of thanksgiving for the life in Christ of Harold Witte, who passed away on August 13th. In response to a request from the family, the Concordia College Choir provided special music for the celebration.

Installed as a faculty member at Concordia, Edmonton in September, 1945, Professor Witte taught high school science and typing, and also served as Registrar during his tenure here. He retired in the spring of 1982 following several years of modified service. His health declined in recent years, and he had been hospitalized since early spring.

Harold Witte was born in St. Cloud, Minnesota, on March 15, 1910. He attended Concordia College in St. Paul, Minnesota, the State Teachers College in St. Cloud, and Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He is survived by his wife, Ellen, and four children--Natalie, Harold, Linnea and Luther.

Construction Update

As someone recently remarked, "This year is going to be a challenge!" This is a common daily experience as we discover fewer entrance doors, longer walks from parking and to/from campus buildings, bigger mounds of dirt, and new additions of on-site construction equipment. We will endeavor to keep you informed on a regular basis via Drumbeat on what's happening and what to expect next regarding Tegler Student Centre construction.

What's Happening? You have no doubt noticed that the new maintenance/delivery building is nearing completion; the move from the old site has already taken place. Current excavations are for new sewer and water lines.

What's Next? Water lines in the parking lot should be completed by Thursday evening (Aug. 22). The new maintenance building will be finished by the end of this week. During the next two weeks-destruction of the old maintenance shop; then THE HOLE.

"Faith in the Future" Campaign News

The Development Department reports that approximately \$300,000 has been raised to date in the "Faith in the Future" campaign. This includes a \$20,000 pledge from TransAlta Utilities, and \$25,000 from Canada Trust (which handles our pension fund).

As a direct result of the campaign, the College will receive scholarship funding from the Alberta Treasury Branch. Designated for business students, the scholarship will either be in the form of two awards of set amounts, or enough funding to cover tuition for one student per year.

Our funding proposal for the new language classroom has been approved by the Secretary of State through Alberta Advanced Education. This matching grant of \$83,990 will equip the second language classroom with a new lab and video/film equipment, as well as provide for capital costs of classroom construction. In response to this grant, Sony Corporation of Canada will donate \$7,000 to the fund.

The Fulbright Program

The Foundation for Educational Exchange between Canada and the United States launches into its second year of operation as one of the 130 countries which engages in bilateral 'Fulbright Scholar' exchanges with the United States. The Fulbright program--named after J. William Fulbright, the well-known former Democratic senator from Arkansas--is the largest academic exchange in the world, with more than 167,000 participants since the program began in 1946. The goals of the Canada-U.S. Fulbright program hold true to those initially desired by Senator J. William Fulbright himself: to build a world in which "the human attribution of compassion and common sense, of intellect and creative imagination and empathy between nations" is attained.

This year the Foundation for Educational Exchange will award scholarships worth \$25,000 each to four distinguished University professors from both Canada and the United States. While the scholars' fields of study range from history and law to anthropology and literature, all the scholars share a commitment to enhancing knowledge in the many topics of relevance to the relationship between Canada and the United States.

In announcing its 1992-1993 awards, the Foundation for Educational exchange between Canada and the United States would once again like to invite the finest Canadian scholars to lecture or conduct research at universities in the United States. For the first time, the Foundation is also offering graduate student scholarships for the 'best and the brightest' students who seek to pursue studies or research at the doctoral level in the United States. Application deadlines for both faculty and graduate student exchanges are November 30. For more information and an application package, please contact:

Please Note: All applicants must be Canadian citizens at the time of application. In addition to this, Faculty must hold a doctorate or comparable professional qualifications, and are expected to have college or university teaching experience for lecturing and research/teaching awards. For graduate awards, acceptance into a Ph.D. program in the United States is mandatory. The Faculty award consists of approximately \$2700 U.S. per month (travel inclusive), bringing the maximum amount of the grant for a full academic year to approximately \$25,000 U.S. Grants for graduate students are U.S. \$15,000 for an academic year (travel inclusive).

Annual Meeting-Association of Lutheran College Faculties

The 56th Annual Meeting of the Association of Lutheran College Faculties will be held from October 4-6, 1991, at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. The theme for this meeting is "Environmental Values and the Liberal Arts College." Featured speakers are: Dr. Holmes Rolston, Professor of Philosophy at Colorado State University; Peter Goin, Associate Professor of Art at the University of Nevada-Reno; Ann Foltz, a Consultant with the Institute for 21st Century Studies in Arlington, Virginia; and Dr. Judith Weis, Professor at Rutgers University and a specialist in marine biology and the effects of pollutants on estuarine organisms.

Interested faculty can discuss arrangements for attendance with Dr. Catherine Eddy, Dean of Academic Affairs. A meeting schedule can also be obtained from her.


