#### **Administrative Evaluations**

- C. A peer of the administrator's choice
- D. An external evaluation from someone outside the person's area
- E. Immediate supervisor

The immediate supervisor will share all evaluations with the individual under review, and his/her recommendation will go to the President (through the Vice-President) with the accompanying data. Following review, the President will forward his recommendation to the Board. The decision of the Board on administrative renewal is final.

#### Publication

By Phillip M. Fedorak and Robert E. Rogers: "Assessment of the Potential Health Risks Associated with the Dissemination of Micro-organisms from a Landfill Site." In Waste Management & Research (1991) 9, 537-563.

> In planning for a new sanitary landfill site, the City of Edmonton considered the potential for dissemination of microorganisms via aerosols and by gulls that feed on the refuse. The health impacts on the residents and chicken and mushroom farming activities in the vicinity of the proposed location were assessed. Conclusions based on a review of information in the literature and in the City's planning documents were: 1) the densities of airborne microbes generated at the landfill site would be less than those observed at sewage treatment plants which cause very little health risk; 2) chicken and mushroom farming operations generate very high densities of airborne microbes and the small numbers of microbes that might originate from the landfill site would be insignificant; 3) the proximity of the proposed landfill location to an existing landfill would not likely change the number of gulls in the area; 4) sound agricultural practices (such as preventing wild birds from contacting poultry, or their water supplies, food and new litter) will minimize risk of the spread of pathogens to chickens from gulls.

## Graduation will be a little different this year!

# Who enrolls in the UCEP program?

## Lutheran Missionary Killed in Middle East

The February 24th edition of <u>The Reporter</u> carried this news item about Rev. Albert Glock, who may be known to some members of the Concordia family.

A masked gunman shot and killed retired Lutheran missionary Albert E. Glock Jan. 19 near Jerusalem. Glock, professor of archeology at Birzeit University in the Israeli-occupied West Bank for 16 years, had parked his car at the home of a research assistant when an unknown assailant shot him twice at close range. Police said the motive for the slaying was unclear.

Glock, 66, was a 1950 graduate of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. He was a pastor at congregations in Vermont and Illinois before serving as professor of theology at Concordia College (now University), River Forest, Ill., from 1957 to 1970. While in the Middle East, Glock served as a missionary under the auspices of the former Lutheran Church in America and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. He retired in June 1991, but continued his work at Birzeit University.
