#### Tragically Human

Swissair flight 111 crashed into the Atlantic Ocean 8 km off Peggy's Cove on the evening of September 2, 1998. All of the 229 people on board were killed, and it is alleged that the aircraft was intact until it collided with the ocean surface. There is no doubt in my mind that this event was a tragic loss of life that we should all mourn. This event has, however, brought to my mind two important questions: Firstly, why is it that the media insist upon covering such a story with such tenacity while leaving out other tragic or otherwise newsworthy events? And secondly, are we as human beings really so shallow as to label death as tragic only if certain conditions are met?

The media controls what we allegedly know' about the world and local events. We watch the news, listen to the radio, and watch an array of discovery programs in an attempt to understand what is happening around us. The problem with this approach is that the media covers only those events that it deems as news worthy. In other words, everything you watch or hear has been passed along to you under the assumption that it will receive good ratings, and thus make money. Every new tragedy brings ratings, and every old tragedy is forgotten. When was the last time you heard anything about the bombing of the American embassies in Africa? This was a purposeful destruction of life, which took 80 lives and injured another 1,700. Now concerning the crash of flight 111, what have you heard since the Star report and videotapes of Clinton's testimony were released. It's been a while, hasn't it? Although I seem to be against the media, I do understand that not

every death can be reported in the morning news. I just think that the media's control over what we know is not only wrong, it's frightening.

The second thought that has been swimming around in my brain is that of the human condition. Are we desensitized to death, and in need of mass destruction or demise in order to feel anything? In the month of September (1996), 16,249 Canadians died of various causes. Is this a tragedy? Of course not, most of those people probably died of natural causes, right. Let's try this one, in 1995, 645 children died between the age of one and fourteen. Is this a tragedy yet? Quite likely, but not newsworthy. My point is that we tend only to care about mass deaths, occurring on Canadian soil or involving Canadians (and sometimes those events that affect our American cousins), and through the means of an 'accident'. An accident no longer seems to be defined as an event caused without purpose or will, it now can be seen as something that we are not yet desensitized to. For example, there have been 8 airplane crashes since 1950 that involved more than 50 people. How many car accidents have their been? How many men, women, and children have died in a motor vehicle? I'll tell you one thing; those are more statistics than I personally would want to count!

Was the destruction and subsequent death of 229 people on flight 111 a tragedy? Yes, I believe it was. Is the death of three children in a house fire in our own city a tragedy? Absolutely, but did you here about it? My point? We are all desensitized, apathetic and cruel beings that care very little about anything unless its bigger and better than what we see at the movies.

#### Rounders Takes All – A Film in Review

Here's the deal, Matt Damon is Mike McDermott, an ex-card player whose decision to quit poker is due to an unfortunate loss to a rival shark. Then there is small-time mob player, Teddy KGB, a character menacingly played by John Malkovich. McDermott's salvation, and return to the game is brought about by the surmounting debt incurred by his best friend, Les "Worm" Murphy, a role superbly acted by Edward Norton. In his quest to pay off the debt, McDermott learns that you can't deny who you are, and win, lose or draw, it's not how well you play the game but how you hold the cards. Rounders opens with McDermott losing all his "case money", ie. tuition, and retires from the game. It isn't until nine months later with the release of his childhood chum, "Worm", that he is drawn back into playing poker. It is obvious that McDermott never got rid of the taste for the game, and therefore eliminates any tension or suspense for the audience. All one has to do is sit back, and watch as the two opposing characters (Worm and

McDermott) interact with each other, and ultimately see what is dealt.

The movie deals with the issue of denial, and how some characters either; confront it, embrace it or choose to walk away. Edward Norton's performance as Worm is fiendishly intriguing as the perennial loser who doesn't know how to lose or when to quit. Also along for the ride is Gretchen Mol. The fetching Gretchen Mol gives an all too brief performance as Jo, Mike's concerned girlfriend. Her acting debut is lacking, and fails to satisfy ones' expectations. Last month's cover of Vanity Fair was more revealing than the depth of her acting skills. As for the rest of the cast-which includes; Martin Landau, John Turturro, and Framke Janke-they each gave excellent performances. Rounders is gripping, stylishly acted and directed.
