

BOSNIA & REVOLUTIONS



On an update to prior reports on revolutions, Russian forces have mobilized into Ukraine after the president left the country to seek shelter in Russia. Despite a change of leadership in Ukraine, the president continues to refer himself as if he were still in power, and two major factions (pro-Russia and pro-West) continue to fight. International tensions continue to rise as the two main spheres of influence continue to argue on the foreign involvement within this issue. Not only has the Ukrainian revolution escalated to another degree of conflict, but so has the Venezuelan crisis in South America. The protesters against the Maduro administration has grown in size, for the revolts have spread to wealthier communities which are fed up with the Maduro's administration as well. So, the condition of revolutions remains as more participants join in.

The spread of protests against corruption and bad governance has now affected Bosnia, as there is a spring of political turmoil. Again, protest marches have moved on to become the source of fire and violence and as corruption moves on, the country loses millions of euros

each year. However, whereas the Venezuelan revolution is aiming at the corruption of its socialist government, the Bosnian spring is aiming for the corruption of the privatization of the economy, as well as a corrupt democracy. All of this has been given light to, as the student protests began to be supported by middle class families affected by the high unemployment and corruption of Bosnia. Since the end of the Bosnian War in 1995, Bosnian citizens have felt the crisis at hand as Emin Eminagic, an activist in Tuzla states: "We have been lied to for 20 years. We have been oppressed for 20 years, people are hungry, people are starving. We do not have job prospects here, we will not have a future here unless we change something."

One of the protest leaders, Aldin Siranovic describes the corruption experienced by he and his wife in the following way: "The Social Services Minister in the government told her [Aldin Siranovic's wife]: 'If you want to work in healthcare, you need to pay 25,000 Bosnian marks [approximately 13.000 euros] to the director of that institution'. I got a job in Telecom Bosnia, in the normal way. I was working over there for three months, after three months my supervisor said: 'Hey, you didn't pay 25,000 marks to get employed here, so if you do not pay, you will get fired and my cousin will come

here to work here." So, it is in this manner that Bosnia loses millions of euros every year.

Aside from personal experiences, the inefficient corrupt privatization of the economy in Bosnia is described to have a "mafia privatization." Sakib Kopic, a man who worked at a power plant for 33 years explained: "Someone comes to buy a company for almost nothing, they get one, two, three bank loans, then they destroy the company, they close it down, and the privatisation-mafia put the money into their own pockets."

In addition, the protesters argue that the political structure of Bosnia is unable to lead the country as it needs to be led. Political Science student, Aldin Alic said: "The state structure is too complicated. In Bosnia-Herzegovina we have 13 regional governments, more than 130 ministries and ministers, and on the top of that we have five presidents. We have a whole bunch of leaders but they don't lead."

As a reminiscent aspect of the break-off of Yugoslavia (which Bosnia used to be a part of), ethnic and nationalistic pressures affect the political environment of the Bosnian spring. When conflicts arise, these pressures are used as tactics to manipulate the population in inaction, but distraction in the clashes

between the vast diversity of ethnic groups in the state. Thus, one of the main progressive movements that the protest aims to gain is social justice and national equality within the state.

These aims have been a key aspect of the other revolutions going on. It begs the question, this Bosnian spring reminiscent of the Cold War, with the effects of spheres of influences? The Venezuelan Revolution with Cuban and American involvement clearly display some of those qualities, as so does the Ukrainian Revolution with the invasion of Russian troops and its interactions with the West. However, in a different manner, the Bosnian revolution reflects this reminiscence through its direct connection with Yugoslavia (also a prior Soviet state, afterwards part of the non-aligned movement) and also its interactions with the Western influence of the European Union. The current state of affairs is Bosnia is concerned with the leftover ethnic and nationalistic conflicts which Yugoslavia once suffered, but it is also looking to make sense of its ideology and following without corruption. In addition, Bosnia seems to be looking gaining membership into the European Union. So, as events are continuing to happen, it is clear that history is still being written, and history is still among us.



The Thunder came out of the gate strong holding the Kings to 8 points in the first quarter and grabbed a 4 point lead. A back and forth 2nd frame put the Kings up on the Thunder by 3 at the half. The second half would be an intense physical battle that saw the Thunder cut the RDC lead to 2 several times but (they) just couldn't get all the way back to take a lead and as the final buzzer sounded, the RDC Kings topped the Thunder by a 67-62 score.

The men's basketball team gave a hair raising performance on Friday February 28th against MacEwan. With ten seconds left in the game, Concordia was down by three points. They buckled down and managed to score two points before the clock hit 4 seconds left. In a fantastic play, number 13, Dallas Wright popped a deep three pointer with 3.7 seconds left in the game! With this spectacular play the boys won 72-71 against the Griffins. They later went on to beat Lethbridge on March 1st 63-61.

Sunday's game against Red Deer was close but the boys couldn't battle back and lost with a heartbreaking 67-62. The men's hockey team put all their efforts into winning against the Augustana Vikings on February 28th and March

1st. The previous weekend against Briercrest proved to be our Achilles heel as several players were injured seriously, leaving our team down several on the line-up and outgunned. Tyler Stevenson broke his ankle, Trent Genyk broke hand, and Beau Ferby even shattered his Femur. Despite this handicap for Augustana, the competition was fierce and our guys were saddened by the 4-2 losses they got. TRACK TEAM TUNE-UP

The Alberta Indoor Track Championships were held this past weekend at the U of A and gave the Thunder Indoor Track teams their final tune up before nextweekend's 2014 ACAC Indoor Track Championship. Despite a low turnout for the senior athletes, most of the Thunder teams ran new personal bests or season's bests which bodes well for this Friday and Saturday's Championship meets, which will be hold at the Edmonton Garrison track. "The guys and girls are really rounding into form now which is great. I think everyone ran either a season best or new personal best in at least one of their events and we had a few new school records set," said Head Coach Matt Norminton.

On Saturday it was the 1500's and 400's that were on tap and the ladies got things rolling with team Captain Marriya Jenkins picking up 3rd place overall in a very good time of 4:56; a top 5 time for her. Shelby Edgar was next across the line in a new personal best of 5:32.36 (5th place) while Patricia Jackson ran a new personal best of 6:31.05. Then it was over to the men and despite being stuck in the slower heat, Kevin Chambers was not to be denied setting his first personal best of the season, winning the heat and finishing 7th overall in a new school record of 4:16.18. Rapidly improving Ben Thomas put up the 2nd fastest time ever by a Thunder runner, finishing in 13th position overall in a time of 4:35.05. Finishing just behind him was men's team Captain Joel Perren, also running a new personal best of 4:35.63. Then it was over to the speedsters in the 400m and Tania

Eljurdi finished in 6th place, running 1:19.25 while Barbara Jackson ran a new personal best of 1:20.75 to finish in 7th spot. On the men's side, Chris Gaertner ran his fastest time of the season to finish in 54.46.

Sunday had 3 events on the schedule for the Thunder indoor teams: 200m, 800m and 3000m. In the men's 3k, Joel Perren ran a season's best to finish 10th overall in 10:22.08. In the ladies 200m. Tania Eliurdi set the school record, running 34.67 and edging out teammate Patricia Jackson in a photo finish, 34.83. Barbara Jackson was next across the line in 36.12. The girls finished 11th. 12th and 13th overall, respectively. In the men's 200m, Chris Gaertner set a school record and ran a new personal best of 24.35 to claim 10th overall.

In the ladies 800m, Marriya Jenkins finished 4th overall in a time of 2:25.94, her 2nd fastest time ever. Shelby Edgar had a huge run to finish 5th overall in 2:37.22. The last event of the day saw Kevin Chambers and Ben Thomas line up in the men's 800m. Chambers posted his 2nd school record of the weekend, running 2:01.21 to finish 3rd overall while Thomas ran his 2nd personal best of the weekend, 2:07.37, to finish in 6th spot overall. Next up for the Thunder Indoor Track teams are the ACAC Championships on Friday evening and Saturday morning (March 7th and 8th), being help up at the Edmonton Garrison fitness center. Friday session goes from 6-9 pm and features the 1500's and 400's while the 800's, 3k's and 4×400 relays go on Saturday. Both Thunder teams will be hoping for top 3 finishes as last year's teams finished 3rd overall. GO THUNDER!!

THE FRASER REPORT

1999. Since the Fraser Institute has been evaluating Alberta's students creating a comprehensive report card of the province's 279 high schools. Recently, 2012-2013 evaluation was released to the public, allowing parents, students, and taxpayers to see how their local schools stack up against the best. This study looks at a number of categories and gives the individual schools a rating out of ten. These categories include: diploma completion rate, gender gaps in 30 level academic Math and English courses, courses taken per student, and average exam mark. While these statistics may be rather accurate on their own, one must question whether this is a fair way to evaluate any public institution.

In addition to researching grade-based averages and completion rates, the study also looks at average income of parents, percentage of English as a Second Language students, percentage of students with special needs, as well as the number of students enrolled in grade twelve. These additional statistics allow the reader to see a more complete image

of the school's demographics. While these statistics do aid in ranking and assessing the performance of schools, there are a number of uncontrolled variables and inequalities among the institutions. For example, Old Scona in Edmonton and Rundle College in Calgary are both tied for first place out of the 279 schools ranked. On paper there a few very obvious similarities between these two schools, for instance the average parental income is over \$100,000 (over \$200,000 at Rundle College). Additionally, both schools have very low ESL rates and no noted students with special needs. Upon viewing just the schools in Edmonton, it appeared that the lower a school was ranked, the more likely it was that the school had a larger proportion of ESL students, students with special needs, and a lower parental income. In fact the very lowest-ranked school had a student population that was 79.8% ESL and 20.7% special needs with the average income of parents being \$30,600.

While these numbers are interesting to view and seeing the correlation between academic success and the variety of students attendance is useful sociological data, it doesn't say much about the school itself. There is no information

given about the programs and academies featured, or the community in which the school is located and its involvement. Instead we are asked to view institutions as numbers that are only considered successful when they are blessed with a high graduating population.

Having lived in a number of small towns throughout Alberta, I was interested to see how the high schools in my former homes ranked. In most cases it was quite low. In fact, in one town the high school ranked 270th out of 279. Having lived in the small town of High Level for a number of years, I can understand why this would be the case. The town is located in the middle of Alberta's most profitable industry, and it is not uncommon for students to be working near full time hours while completing high school because of the abundance of job opportunities. Because High Level is a transient community, the statistics leave a lot to be desired. But does that mean the school overall is a mere 2/10 on the Fraser Institutes's Report?

These numbers don't reflect the schools; they reflect the good fortune of the select institution. The statistics are not indicators of good or bad teachers, or of the intelligence of the students. They neglect factors such as immigration and ESL rates, industries in the area, and the financial situations of both the divisions and the schools. All of these variables impact the statistical results, but none of these results tell readers anything. These statistics do not create an image of what type of learning environment the school is, and worse, they do not regard the teachers or students as anything but numbers.

Is ranking our schools against each other and evaluating success based on a limited scale doing anything advance education? education more than high marks and stellar completion rates? Perhaps our desire for hard statistical data has overwhelmed the reality of the purpose of education. According to the Ministerial Order on Student Learning, "the fundamental goal of education Alberta in is to inspire all students achieve success fulfillment, and reach their full potential by developing the competencies of engaged thinkers and ethical citizens with an entrepreneurial spirit, who contribute to a strong and prosperous economy and society." I've yet to see a standardized test capable of measuring any of those objectives!

EVOLUTION VS CREATION IN ED.



Through my several years secondary and postsecondary education, I have come to notice that all of my teachers and professors have presented either creationism or evolution, but never both They chose one theories. theory and treated it as if it were the gospel truth. If by chance the alternate theory is mentioned in a lecture, it is immediately shown to be ridiculous and not worth being called a scientific theory. 

I see in the world the vast spectrum of opinions on the topic of the 'origin of species' as presented by Richard Dawkins, Ray Comfort, and everyone in between. Since there is such a vast number of varying beliefs on the topic I looked into why this is so. Each opinion on the topic is directly related to the philosophy or set of beliefs of the one holding the opinion. For example, Dawkins holds the belief that there is no God, and he therefore puts forth arguments in favor of a godless origin: evolution. Similarly. Comfort the beliefs of an evangelical Christian, and so puts forth the arguments for an absolute creationist origin. However, despite their opposing views, they both believe they are absolutely right, using similar arguments for each of their opinions. Both of them also confuse philosophy with science. thereby putting their feet into their mouths; when **Dawkins** arguing Comfort with philosophy, when arguing with biology.

The common belief in regard to science is that it is unbiased,

and so the philosophy should be kept out of it. If this is the case, then the scientific community should look at both views: life became what it is today via evolution and life became what it is today via an intelligent design. If both theories are to be seen as viable, they should both be presented in an unbiased light in the classroom, without discounting one as absolutely false and the other as absolutely true, or focusing on only one of the theories. In physics and chemistry the various theories throughout history are presented in the classroom, while in biology, there is next to no mention of any competing theories. The

philosophy and beliefs of the faculty should not interfere with a well-rounded education of our youth; particularly in the public and liberal arts schools. By presenting both theories, we would allow the pupils to see the pros and cons of both and thus choose which theory makes the most sense. Finally, where one finds holes in one of the theories which he cannot fill with the empirical method of science, then philosophy may be used, but when presenting the scientific in the classroom theory setting, only the scientific method should be used. Perhaps then we might be able to find an understanding within the faculty of biology.
