The Activity

What to do after dinner? Most people would see a movie, but that is routine. Besides, are there even any good movies playing in the theater? Spice this activity up by renting a favorite movie that you both like, and curling up on the couch (but then, who will really watch the movie).

If you don't want to do the movie thing, or if this is your first date, there are many other activities. The river valley is beautiful at any time of the year, and in this weather, you will probably be the only people down there. Or you can go bowling, skating, or swimming.

If you are willing to shell out some cash for romantic activities, the city of Edmonton has many events going on. When was the last time you went to the Muttart Conservatories (9626 96A St)? At \$60 per couple, this event allows couples to walk through the pyramids while sipping on bubbly and listening to romantic music. This goes from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. and at the end of the night, the ladies are given a special gift. Tickets are limited so book ahead at 496-2925. Another event is the Jennifer Jewell

Celtic Valentine at Fort Edmonton Park (7000– 143 St). This includes wine and music on the Celtic harp. Tickets are \$25 per person at 496-2925.

If this is your first date, there really is no need for a gift, especially if you have paid for dinner and an activity. However, if you must give a gift, let it be simple yet caring, like flowers or a homemade card. If you have been a couple for awhile, gifts can emphasize your love for each other. # Battle Of The Generations: Teens vs. Middle-Aged The Impossible Years: Concordia Drama's Edgy Comedy

The Drama department is doing a play next semester called *The Impossible Years*. It's a comedy in two acts by Bob Fischer and Arthur Marx. The comedy will run from March 16-20 in the Concordia auditorium. On March 16 there will be a noon matinee and a paywhat-you-can evening performance. The shows on March 17-19 are at 8:00 and on



The comedy is directed by Gil Allen and has a good-sized cast, including a number of people who have not worked with Gil before. Some of these actors are new to Concordia, which Gil says is really exciting. Concordia has a very strong acting community which is growing all the time, and it's nice to see some new actors coming in.

Gil hasn't directed a comedy here before, so was really happy to be assigned a comedy. He wanted something that would also relate to Concordia students. Gil chose *The Impossible Years* because it's very TV-sitcom-like.

He thinks it will relate to students because it's very similar to what he sees on TV. A lot of students are young, moving away from home, so there is some conflict as they spread their wings. They should get a kick out of this play. Elizabeth Batty, the stage manager, says that this play "will appeal to parents and students alike, as it deals with trials and tribulations we all face. Taking these common situations to the extreme adds humour, making it a light-hearted play that is fun to work on and will be very fun to watch!" It's got a goofy look, plays on the foibles of our modern culture, and deals with the battle between the generations.

Gil has moved the play into 2005 instead of playing in the 60's, so that it's current, modern, and Concordia students will be able to relate to it. The play has a secular, psychiatric base, and since it's a comedy everything ends satisfactorily.

The main character is Dr. Brad Kingsley, a psychiatrist and best-selling author who writes books about how to raise teenagers. He's a Dr. Phil type of guy, with celebrity status; everyone knows him and he has a really strong position in the community. He has two teenage daughters. The oldest, Linda, is finding her independence, and begins to appear to be rebellious, refusing to abide by the family's rules. Her parents are worried about her appearance and believe she's become promiscuous and is running wild. The doctor's psychology techniques aren't working and a bevy of bizarre characters try to woo and court Linda Kingsley. In the wings is her younger sister, Abby, waiting for her turn to become a lead rebellious teenager.

Plays like this, in the TV-sitcom style, are often the type of plays chosen for dinner theatres, so this is bread-and-butter work for actors. The Drama department tries to vary the theatrical experience at Concordia; they've done musicals, Shakespeare, American classical drama, Greek tragedy, etc. Gil says "we're jumping all over the map,"

so the students and actors get quite a wide variety.

Gil Allan has brought in some outsiders to flesh out the cast, because there are a lot of male roles. John Rusich, a local professional actor, plays Dr. Kingsley. Scott Mair, a Concordia alumnus, is back to play a wacky support character. This gives the students a chance to work with professionals as peers, and raises the acting standard.

There's also an interesting dynamic to the cast. Margaret Batty is a grade 10 student at the Concordia High School and is playing Abby. Her older sister, Elizabeth Batty, a third-year Concordia science student, is the stage manager (the person who organizes the stage, rehearsals, and actors). Their father, Eric Batty, is playing the role of Mr. Brecher. Scott Lyons is back, playing the assistant to Dr. Kingsley, along with Alex Dimitroff, who plays Linda's primary love interest. Alexandra Lazarowich, the star in Concordia's movie Green Eyes (Theatrical Premiere in March) who has been a professional model and a film actor, is also in the play. Elizabeth Batty says that "working with this talented cast is great. We have an interesting mix of professionals, experienced students, and beginners who haven't done anything like this before"

The admission fee for the play goes right back into the Drama department. They have to pay for rents and royalties, build the set, buy props and costumes, replace makeup and burnt out light bulbs - the overhead for a production is huge. The focus is not on making money; it's a learning experience, but whatever money comes in helps. The money allows the Drama department to do more, better.

Gil is hoping for a huge crowd; the bigger the audience, the better the comedy! The theatre seats 238 people and Gil wants to pack it. So mark this comedy on your calendar, and help pack the theatre!



## Restaurant Review

For this article I wanted to take a look at some of Edmonton's restaurants: what they offer and what they are like. #### That's Aroma: 11010-101 St.



Located on the edge of northeast downtown, this little restaurant has a lot to offer It has chosen garlic as the theme to their madness. I mean, one can call it madness when one

of their dessert options is garlic ice cream. Food consists of a lot of pastas and meat dishes that are presented eloquently and taste fabulous. Prices (about \$20 per person without alcohol) match the quality, atmosphere and friendly staff. This is a great way to dress up an evening without breaking the checkbook.

#### Don Cherry's: 13310-137 Ave.



For the sports fan: they died and went to heaven. The place is decorated with a Don Cherry, hockey, Canadian beer motif. The place

is plastered (or so it seems) with televisions of every size. And most booths come equipped with your very own TV set. For the nonsports fan: surprisingly a great place to meet and hang out. There is a non-smoking section and it can make for an exciting family dinning experience. You don't have to love hockey to get a table. The prices are equivalent to any lounge, and the food is just as appetizing.

#### Brit's Fish and Chips: 6940-77 St. and 12556-132 Ave.

I never thought I had eaten at a restaurant that I didn't like until I thought of my experience at Brits Fish and Chips. Don't take this review verbatim; I mean, the place was packed and some list it as Edmonton's best English style fish and chips. At first the atmosphere and the prices seemed promising. But you wait (for example I waited an hour - no joke) for quality that made some at my table sick to the stomach (literally). # The Dummy Isn't So Dumb After All

To win the presidential election, the contender must win the presidential debates. Because the debates are always scheduled so close to the election date, voters show up at polling stations with the results of the verbal engagement freshly tattooed in their minds. Typically, it's the first time party leaders confront each other face-to-face in an unscripted war of words. A skilled debater will sustain continual attacks while mounting offensive strikes to discredit his/her opponent in a bid for viewer approval. The adept talker will seem more credible than his/her challengers. Ultimately, he/she will connect emotionally with the audience.

On November 2, 2004, George W. Bush accomplished what his father failed to do; he won his second term in office. It was an astonishing victory, considering that the Republican won despite being blamed for a weakening economy, higher unemployment, and misleading the public. These issues have polarized and divided America into two hostile factions: rabid donkeys and stampeding elephants.

Before the election, the media touted the race as being too close for any prediction. In the end, the results were clear. People will not vote for a candidate who changes positions on issues as frequently as Kerry has. In contrast, Bush decided to invade Iraq to find weapons of mass destruction, which he didn't. He made a bad choice. However, making a wrong decision is better than making no decision. Citizens can classify Bush as conservative, rigid, and firm in his stance, whereas Kerry is unclassifiable. Near the start of the debate, Bush stated, "I understand everybody in this country doesn't agree with the tough decisions I've made. But people know where I stand." Voters want to know every position, whether right or wrong, that a candidate takes and do not like to be left in the dark. And so, when the incumbent keeps emphasizing

the fact his challenger is a flip-flop, people lose faith in Kerry. That is why Bush was mercilessly unrelenting in accusing Kerry of lacking resolution. Equally effective, the incumbent scares his people into siding with him.

Fear is an excellent tool for manipulation. The first settlers who landed at Plymouth Rock feared religious persecution in their homeland and escaped to America. From that point onwards, fear expressed itself at the Salem Witchcraft Trials, the Revolutionary War, the Civil War, the Great War, Pearl Harbor, the Cold War, and 911. The United States is a country built on fear. Consequently, scare tactics are effective and easy to employ. In frightening situations, biological instincts compel individuals to seek immediate comfort and gratification. It is this desperation and urgency that impairs an individual's judgment. People tend to readily submit themselves to anybody or anything that they perceive as being strong and capable of suppressing those fears. In this case, the fierce authoritative figure is George W. Bush. At the debate, the first topic of discussion dealt with security issues. Bush reminded people that the terrorist attacks in Beslan, Russia can happen in America and that their children and grandchildren are susceptible. After making the statement, Bush reassures his country by presenting himself as a sturdy leader. Everything Bush says sounds convincing because fear short-circuits one's good judgment. This is the curtain Bush uses to cover up mistakes.

When votes are the hot commodity, politicians, especially Bush, tend to depict themselves as being the supreme bearer of affection. Love is the strongest emotion an individual can possess and is considered a godly characteristic. When we first fall in love, nothing else in the world matters, which means that we are susceptible and oblivious to our surroundings. Love distracts the individual from being levelheaded. By appealing to the emotions of his fellow Americans, Bush sidestepped Kerry's allegations. The shimmering glow of the President's heart blinds the public from the truth.

John F. Kerry's chances of winning the election were doomed right at the start. George W. Bush won the presidential race by effectively portraying his rival as being irresolute, playing on the fears of the public, and depicting himself as a champion of affection. 

I can't pinpoint exactly why I love this country so much. Could it be the amazing food? The antique architecture? The music? Or maybe it is for the simple reason that the people of Spain know how to have a good time?

I have been to Spain twice; my first encounter with the far away land was on a student exchange in grade 11. I was going over there to get a stronger language base and understand (or try to understand) the culture. I had about a year and half of Spanish knowledge and then I was off on my own (well, with 9 other Canadians). It would have been easier in Madrid or Barcelona where you have to speak a little bit of English in order to get a job; however, I was going to Cantimpalos, a town of about 1500 that is located 2 hours north of Madrid.

When I was there the first time I was able to get a glimpse of the way the people of Spain are. They are laid back and just trying to have a good time. When Spanish people go to a fiesta they don't get out of the house until 1am. This is mostly because the family doesn't eat dinner until 10pm. And when Spaniards are out to party most of them won't be home until 11am the next day; they drink and be merry until the sun rises and then some.

When I returned for my second time this past summer it was "fiesta season," which means that all the small towns have their own parties with bulls running in the streets and drinking for 3-5 days straight. There is no sleeping involved; it is unbelievable how they can do it. I am not talking about a party in a house; these
