This week it was my tremendous pleasure to interview Philipa Hardy. Not only does Ms. Hardy do a great job of helping students at career services, she also gives a great interview.

Peter Fourlaris: "What is your official job description at Concordia?"

Philipa Hardy: "My official is Coordinator title Student Employment Engagement. I run the career services center; connecting students to the world of helping work. students figure out what they want to do in terms of where a career goes, and linking students to international opportunities." internship

PF: "What can career services help students with?"

PH: "A lot of the services we have are involved with career counseling and career advising. We do that one on one and there are a ton of resources that students can use to do career exploration activities. We have an online career aptitude test called "Type focus," it's helpful for a student either knows really well what they want to do

and just wants affirmation of that, or for students who really are struggling with finding a career path. It uses the "Myers-Briggs Type Indicator" to determine what types of careers are best suited for the student. It's a really good starting point for a lot of students. We also help with resume writing, cover letter writing, interview prep, mock interviews, and howto-do job search. We also offer workshops as well. program departments the CSA are open to having me come to do workshops about employment or other career related topics. We also have an online job board for students, and not just employment, but also volunteer opportunities too."

PF: "What is the most common question that students ask?"

PH: "I would say there are two. One is "can you look at my resume?" The other is "I'm not sure if I've made the right choice with my program or major."

PF: "What is the most strange or unusual question a student has asked you before?"

PH: "It had nothing to do with career and employment necessarily, but I did have a student ask to borrow my car for a driver's exam!"

PF:(Laughing)"Ohwow!What was your response to that?"

PH: (Laughing) "Uh no thanks! It's not available."

PF: "What is the most rewarding part of your job?"

PH: "It's the students, absolutely. And it's the students coming back to me and updating me on how things are going, or telling me that they got the job or grad school that they wanted. That's the best part." PF: "Do you have any advice for students in their first year?"

PH: "Absolutely. A lot of students in their first year don't always know if they're on the right career path, they think they're on the right career path. They think they do, but they're not too sure, or they either know for sure and they've always known exactly what they want to do. Either way, career services can give a lot of support for that. So like I was saying, to do some career exploration activities if you're not sure what you want to do, we can help you find a focus. For those who already have a career focus, it's a fantastic time to start networking with people in the industry. Students are in a great position to network while they're still students and not breathing down employer's necks for a job. It's just basically working with us to show ways that students can connect with people who are doing the work that they're doing, and make sure that this is really want they want to do. Also start planting those seeds, so that when they graduate they will have lots of opportunities. Getting connected early is important because it really shows on your resume. and once you have those connections, they'll help you get the job. Then you're not so much competing for a posted job that every single graduate in Alberta is also applying for, because you would actually have a personal connection".

Remember the last time you went to a wedding or formal event and you saw that person in jeans and a t-shirt who stuck out like a sore thumb, or maybe that was you and you didn't notice. Well, people notice and it really impacts the first impression you leave when you meet them. This the transfers into idea business world when you get interviewed and when you go to work on a day to day basis. We need to understand the different levels of dress that exist and how to use our advantage. them to Today I will walk you through the 4 main styles of dress, and how they relate to your day to day activities. The types are; Formal, Semi-Formal, Informal and Casual.

Formal and White tie: this level of dress is typically reserved of events like event special weddings, formal or ceremonies, garden parties. This type of dress is rare, but it is very formal. At this level, men will be wearing a black tie suit or tuxedo, and women will be wearing a dress that will cut

off no shorter than mid calf. Remember that the higher the dress level, the more conservative you should be when choosing an outfit, and colors for the women's dress should remain black or white. Refrain from trying to make a statement, as the event is seldom about you. and the focus should remain on the hosts. This would also be the place where flowers could be incorporated into an outfit, such as corsage for women and boutonnieres for men. These colors should match your partners and should only be an accent piece. Note that white tie is a level that is almost never used in Canada, and would most likely be reserved for an event hosted by the Queen of England, so don't worry too much about it. White tie simply means ceremonial dress, usually accompanied by the man wear a white tie with his suit. At business events. formal attire would usually be reserved for large events such as recognition dinners, major announcements company or annual gatherings such as a Christmas party. On a easily mistaken with a semi-, day to day level, you would almost never see this level.

> Semi-Formal: Semi-formal is the tricky one, as it varies

depending on the time of day that the event you are attending takes place. In the daytime, before 6pm, this level of dress would require men to wear a tail-less coat with formal pants, either striped or checkered. This combination would show a more relaxed look from full formal, but still remain classy. In the evening, you would remain at the black tie level, which is very similar to formal attire. The major direness would be that tails or tuxedos are not to be worn at this level. The idea behind semi-formal is that color can be introduced to the pallet. and you can mix it up a little. The types of events that you would see this level of dress at would be at would be dictated by the host, so pay attention to invitation!

Informal: This level is for everyday business attire that you would see in the workplace. Men would be wearing a regular suit, and a jacket is not required at this level. For women, you have a vast, vast, VAST array of choices when it comes to what you can wear at the office. Examples for women would be business suit with skirt or pants, blouses (with or without sleeves), along with many

other options. Color can be used at this level, though try to avoid bright or "offensive colors", such as neon colors, which are not typical in the office. Save these for tight and bright parties!

Casual: Finally the fun level! This would be everything that you would wear outside of a professional setting, including but not limited to; jeans, slacks, hoodies, t-shirts. baseball shirts. anything ripped, skinny or with larger logos or offensive designs. Be careful with your casual wear when attending company events, as this is the impression of your off time to your colleagues. Avoid the offensive slogans, and guys; try to own shirts that are not from beer cases. It will help you in the long run. Q: What would you say Good Nature sounds like? What is the band influenced by?

A: Since all of us come from very different musical backgrounds, we like to experiment with all kinds of genres. We take inspiration from funk, jazz, alternative, and progressive rock, but it's difficult to really identify us with just one sound. We have songs with influences ranging from reggae/ska, to hip-hop, or to ambient music as well. As we've been playing together we've focused more towards collective songwriting since we like to work off of each other's ideas to create unique sounds.

Q: What are you aiming to do with your music? What do you have to offer to your audience?

A: As a band our aim is to write songs that have an emotional effect on our audience. Art is all about the thoughts and feelings it inspires in those who experience it, and we aspire to do just that with our music. Our songs come from our introspection and our life experiences of trying to find our way in today's world. We hope to put on an

entertaining performance for everyone as well, because we just really enjoy playing music.

Q: What can you tell us about Edmonton's music scene?

A: Edmonton is a great city for start-up acts. The underground music scene is booming with many talented artists creating new sounds, and a dedicated crowd of supporters always looking for new groups to follow. There are a number of young promoters with ties to the many local venues in town meaning there are lots of shows, and opportunities to play. Edmonton's jazz scene has a bright future ahead of it as well. Thanks to the senior talent that chooses to stay and be active in Edmonton and support young musicians through MacEwan University and the Yardbird Suite, there's only going to be more and talented musicians more coming out of Edmonton.

Q: What can you tell us about your experiences of playing in town and out of town?

A: We've been lucky enough to play everything from jazz gigs in local cafés, to fundraiser galas, to louder gigs in bars and house parties. Our wide range of styles allows us to tailor our sets to the event and the crowd. We're always looking for new opportunities to play and show new people our music. We've often discussed organizing a road-trip tour of Alberta or

Western Canada, but we have yet to play outside the city.

Q: What about recording experience? What do you have going on in terms of releases?

A: We have a selection of home-recorded demos and one professionally recorded single, our song "The Wheel". We submitted this single to CBC's Rock Your Campus contest for student acts across Canada and made top 100. Everything we record is available to download on our social media (Facebook, Band-camp, Soundcloud). We are currently in the process of professionally recording our debut EP, so there will be lots of information and announcements coming soon.

Q: How are things looking for Good Nature in the future?

A: We're very excited to hit the studio, and release the material that we've been working on over the past year. Having an EP recorded will be incredibly helpful in promoting ourselves and securing bigger opportunities in the future like out of town gigs and eventually a tour. We'll continue playing shows and writing lots of new music in the time to come, so stay tuned!

Cross Country Running

For the first time in 4 years, 4th year Thunder Cross Country Runner Marriya Jenkins had some teammates join her at the CCAA XC Champs. Jenkins made her 4th straight appearance at the CCAA Championships on Saturday in Calgary after picking up her 3rd individual medal at the ACAC Championships 2 weeks ago in Fort McMurray. But this time Jenkins was joined by the Thunder Men's team - for the first time in Concordia history - who had picked up the team Gold Medal at the ACAC Championships.

Jenkins, who finished 6th in 2011 (Kamloops), 2nd in 2012 (Montreal) and 3rd in 2013 (Toronto) was up first and looked great off the start, moving comfortably into 4th place and looked strong as she moved through the first 3km. However just after the start of the final lap, Jenkins found herself struggling to keep her legs moving and from that point on, it was an ongoing struggle for her to get to the finish line. "As the true champ she is, Marriya found a way to finish, even though it would have been a lot easier for her to stop out there," said Head Coach Matt Norminton. "I'm really proud of her for finishing out there but I know it's not what she was hoping for today." Jenkins finished in 24th spot overall. "She'll be back," said Assistant Coach Tom Fleming. "Marriya

is a fighter. We'll figure out what's happening and help her get through this."

The men were up next and as he has done in all but one race this season, Kirk Sundt lead the way, finishing in 15th place overall, his highest ever finish at the CCAA Championships. Sundt's previous highest ever position was 19th while competing for MacEwan. "Man did Kirk look great out there," said Fleming. be top 10 next year." Next across the line for the men was rookie Michael Quick, who finished in 49th position. Norminton had this to say about Quick: "Quickie had a solid run out there today. He'll be a top 20 guy next year, the first National Championship is always a bit tough but he ran well today." Third year runner and Co-captain Ben Thomas ran to Norminton's and crossed expectation,

the line in 67th. This was also Thomas' first trip to the CCAA Championships. The 4th scorer for the Thunder was SAIT transfer Kenton Sportak, who finished 15th at the CCAA XC Champs last year. Sportak was looking good through 4km but hyper extended his already injured knee in a hole on the course but still managed to limp home in 100th place. 5th year soccer player and runner Cody Hogberg finished in 105th place. "Neither Kenton nor Cody had the runs they would have wanted today but I'm extremely thankful and proud of both of them for finishing. If nothing else, we showed everyone in the CCAA today that we aren't quitters. We'll be back next year and we'll contend for a team medal," vowed Norminton. The men finished the day in 14th place, which was about Norminton's expectation after losing Cocaptain Kevin Chambers to injury after the men won the ACAC Championships. "With a healthy Kevin, we could have been top 5 today. That was where Lethbridge finished and we beat them (at the ACAC Championship)," said Norminton. "With a healthy Sportak, we could have challenged for the team win."

Most of the Thunder runners will now take a well-earned break before getting ready for the indoor season. The men will be looking to improve on their 2nd place finish at last year's ACAC Championships Indoor while the ladies will be looking to improve on their 4th place finish. STUDENT PROTESTS IN MEXICO

As the Hong Kong students continue their protests, another group of students in Mexico have met their own conflict with the government. However, while the conflict in Mexico is conflicting with the government, the nature of the student protests are much different.

September 26, a group of activist students from the Avotzinapa rural teachers college were heading to a protest over school hiring practices. The group was stopped by police and shot close to the town of Iguala, leaving three of them and three other bystanders killed. However, forty three of them have not been heard since, thus creating a concerned response from the citizens of Mexico. It is understood that these forty three students were abducted by the local police in alliance with local drug cartels. Witness and media reports also suggest that as this occurred, the federal police and military remained passive in order to allow this to occur. In addition, these claims are backed up by the confessions of police offices that admitted to "handing the students over to the drugs gang in southern (Source: Guerrero state." BBC) The collaboration of government agencies in the abduction has led to a major response anti-government from the Mexican community. With the arrest and testimony of two members of a drug gang. Mexican authorities have taken their attention upon a suspected mass grave; however, this is one of many mass graves encountered during the investigation: "In their search for any trace of the students, investigators have found at least 12 mass graves with dozens of unidentified bodies near Iguala." (Source: The Huffington Post) Despite the fact that none of the graves have DNA matches with any of the students so far, finding these mass graves reveal an even greater concern to the residents Mexico considering of the massive amount of disappearances that reach numbers beyond 20.000. According to Human Rights Watch's Nik Steinberg, who has extensively investigated disappearances: "the evidence suggests not only that authorities have failed to investigate disappearances, but also, in many cases, that soldiers and police have helped to carry them out." (Source: hrw.org) Particularly the fact that it did not take a long span of time to find 12 mass graves supports the claim that the Mexican authorities have failed to dwell deeper their into investigations.

56 people allegedly connected with the disappearances have been arrested; these people include members of drug cartels, police officers, and government officials. Around the same time frame the mayor of Iguala, Jose Luis Abarca, has resigned as the investigations of the

case go on. Reports state that Jose Luis Abarca ordered the police to stop the students so they would not interrupt a speech his wife was giving in the town on September 26th. Currently authorities are looking for Abarca, for he is believed to be on the run. The police chief and his wife have become fugitives well: arrest warrants have been issued for them due to their involvement the in disappearances.

Meanwhile, interactions with the central government are varied as some are willing to partake in dialog, others believe that the central government is as corrupt as the local governments, and others take the last view a step forward by taking a violent turn against the government. President Enrique Peña Nieto met with the families of the victims as 10 key demands were stated, thus leading to "a renewed search plan" culminating in the 56 arrests mentioned earlier. Mr. Peña Nieto "said that among the points agreed were that a panel of officials and parents be set up to provide information about the investigation and that better support would be provided to the relatives of the missing." (Source: BBC) Nonetheless, even within the meeting there were claims that were reluctant to trust the government of Mexico in their actions and their promises. In an article from the L.A. Times, Professor John M. Ackerman from the National Autonomous University of Mexico states that "up

This year the "Our CSA Cares: Mental Health Initiative," (formerly CUCA Care) has put together a Street Team to educate students about the importance of mental health and self-care. The team is led by myself, the Mental Health Coordinator, and the 'Street Team,' which includes Nathaly El-jurdi. Declan Beddow. Annie Chow, and Blake Novak, all of whom have expressed interest in battling the stigma associated with mental health on campus.

Our First Event- Yoga!: On October 22 we hosted our first event, a yoga class, in the Ralph King Athletic Centre. This event attracted 26 students. Together we 'stretched out our stresses of school and life' and learned how to lead a more mindfullife.

Mental Health Survey: October 22 was also the day the Street Team launched a campus-wide survey on mental health and awareness. Overall 105 Concordia students participated in this event. included: covered Topics resources knowledge attitudes. on campus. with mental experience illness (either personally or through relationships with others), willingness to learn more, and areas students

wanted to learn more about.

I have included below a word cloud generated from a question on the survey asking "What things come to mind when you hear the words "mental health" and "stigma?"" The larger words represent more responses as compared to the smaller words.

As you can see 'depression,' anxiety,' and 'stress' are some of the highest responses from students.

I have added below the graph from the following survey question: "I know where to find support services on campus to help me with my mental health, financial struggles, and worries about the future."

'Yes' represented 32% 'No student responses; represented 64% of responses; and 'No Answer' represented 4% of responses. These results indicated to the Street Team that more education is needed on how students can access supports and resources. In response, the Street Team launched business has anda this wools to provide




