Religious studies encompasses religions and their histories, beliefs and practices. Dr. Nelson, Associate Professor of Religious Studies states "In terms of looking for meaning, goal and purpose in one's life...religion courses offer a perspective coming out of christianity which suggest we are here as God servants to serve and to help one another out in terms of our lives."

According to Dr. Nelson, individuals study religion because they are either interested in a church vocation (and Christianity would be a natural course to follow) or they are simply interested in the study of religion, history or languages. Concordia University College has both a three and four year degree in Religious Studies. The four year degree is designed to prepare students who wish to further their education after graduation, but it is also for individuals who simply wish to receive a broader view in Religion than the three year degree encompasses. Graduate work may be emphasized in such areas as Christianity and its history, the Old Testament and its history in literature, ethics and Theology of the Lutheran Church.

Individuals who wish to enter year degree who wish to go into other areas besides the Seminary may find employment in parish services. They may work within a congregation in such interesting roles as Youth Ministry, Church Work Assistant and Spiritual Life Coordinator. The latter assesses the gifts and abilities of people

and then tries to find a way for them to use these skills in the community. Still other graduates go into the business sector. To the graduate, good opportunities lie in this field because of the ethical skills gained in their studies. Employers want to hire individuals who have a definite view of what is right and what is wrong.

According to Dr. Nelson, "...some students are a little wary of the Religion department...but I think once they realize that, here, religion is taught on an academic level and it is to inform people about religion, its history, its background and how it fits into a culture, they then feel comfortable studying and enjoying it." Upon that realization, religion is fascinating, informative and enlightening to the students. Individuals with questions or concerns regarding this program are asked to contact the department.

Dr. Russell Nelson, BA (Concordia Ft. Wayne), MDiv (Christ Seminary, St. Louis), PhD (Harvard) Associate Professor of Religious Studies, came to Concordia College in 1989. His areas of specialization are the Old Testament and Hebrew.

He had lots of guns and shot them at me and my friends. I was so scared. I don't know why he wanted to hurt me. Why didn't he want to play with us like the rest of the grownups? Some of my friends can't play with me 'cause they're still sick. My Mum and Da' says that some of my friends can never play with me again. They said it's because they're in heaven now. I wish they weren't in heaven. I wish they could

still play with me. I miss them. I get real scared at night sometimes now too. I wake up and I have to have my Mum come in and tell me a funny story. My Mum seems real sad. How come you're so sad Mum, I ask. But she says things will be better soon. I hope so, I want to play football with my Da' this week.

On March 13, 1996, a strange and solitary gunman entered a kindergarten gym class in Dunblane, Scotland and opened fire on the small children at play. He did not have any personal grudges against these particular children. He was simply after any and all 'nameless' and 'faceless' children as targets for his impotent rage. There was no reasonable explanation for this horrific act, but as usual, the neighbours and co-workers provided the requisite descriptions of a bizarre and private man with a penchant for little boys. This was a man, it seems, who had felt that he had been unfairly attacked and inhibited from working with children. So, as the ultimate solution to his problem, he decided to massacre the very objects of his desire before killing himself. It was as if to say: "If I am not allowed to be with

them, then none of you will be allowed to either". He made very certain that this wish came true, in the most final and sure of manners. For the parents of the slain children, there can be little comfort in the cold fact that the gunman killed himself before being held accountable for his terrible actions, if there is a way to make a man like that accountable. However, even if he were tried for this crime, it would not bring back the small Williams, Emmas and Victorias of Dunblane. The parents of the slain children instead are faced with the reality that never again, in this lifetime, will they hear the sound of their child's laughter, or thrill at the sight of him learning to ride his bike, or hold him close after one of his nightmares. Instead, the parents will continue to live their own nightmare. One must not

forget that several children did survive this scene of mayhem and bloodshed. What is to become of these children? No child should ever have to witness what these children did on a 'simple' Wednesday morning at school.

Thanks to Thomas Hamilton, they too will bear scars for the rest of their lifetimes, and these are not the kind that a mother or father can simply kiss and make better. Their trust in the world has been irrevocably shattered. It has been shattered by a man who claimed that he just wanted to work and be with the very people that he brutally murdered. In the end, there is no explanation at all for this slaughter of innocents, no comfort for the families and townspeople, and no real faith left in humanity as a whole.

## Teacher Evaluations

It goes without saying that Concordian students are blessed, for the most part, with exceptionally committed professors who know how to

teach. Most students who are asked about this institution respond enthusiastically about the fine quality of the professors. This is what we feel is unique about Concordia and separates us from the other colleges or universities. But... listening to students who are equally committed to their educational experience, all is not well in these seemingly idyllic halls of higher learning.

These halls are filled with students who tend to forget that they are the ones who are financing and investing their time to obtain an education, not Student Finance. Eventually most of that money (unfortunately) will have to be paid back. Students also need reminding that their educational dollars represent a binding contract between the educational institution and themselves. This contract expects that the institution will provide them with the finest education for their dollar. This expectation

transfers to every single course offered, not just some, or most - every single course. Therefore, it is up to the student to inform the institution when it is not fulfilling its obligation, without reprisal. There are few options available to the students in which they can effectively voice their disapproval. They can either approach the teacher directly and try to create some sort of working relationship, or, they could contact the dean and have a private discussion with hopes that a resolution will be forthcoming. These options present a dilemma since, as everyone is so obviously aware, Concordia is a small campus with limited course/professor options. At the back of everyone's mind is "What if I voice dissatisfaction against a particular professor and I lose?" The student would have to either drop the course and take it at another institution, or stay in the course and face the fear of experiencing subtle or direct professor dissatisfaction, either through marks or through verbal remarks during class.

The only non-threatening anonymous technique to express our constructive displeasure about a teacher is through the teacher evaluation forms provided at the end of the course.

Keeping in mind that the end of a course is too late for such an undertaking since the students have already wasted their money and time, the teacher evaluation forms must be used. As students, we have an obligation to honestly respond to the questions provided, and if those questions don't suffice, write your evaluation on the back. You are not doing anyone a service by maintaining silence. In fact, you are providing a disservice to not only the students who will be replacing you, but also to the institution and the professor. The institution may suffer in the end by eventually receiving a bad reputation for certain course areas and the professor will be effected by never being informed that she/he is a bad teacher. The professor needs to know how she/he teaches. As students, we are not doing the teacher any favours by not providing this person the opportunity to gain self-awareness, development and growth by either obtaining refresher courses in teaching, or by recognizing that perhaps teaching is not where this person should be. Inevitably, this professor will eventually be 'outed'; it would be to everyone's benefit if it was done sooner than later.

What qualities define a 'good' teacher? Simply put; a good teacher is one who provides a supportive, non-threatening environment that will enable and empower students to feel safe for learning. Professors are expected to be reasonably organized, be well-versed in the subject matter, generally prepared for class and be able to effectively transfer information to the students. It should go without saying that professors should

treat students as adults, in a respectful manner and do not engage in belittlement, degradation or make inappropriate comments that displays intolerance for others. In short, we expect professors to be professionals that sit at the right hand of the principal. It should also go without saying that most of the above also applies to the students. Respect only meets with respect.

Perhaps the future might initiate a student/professor mediation board that will be supported by Concordia and administered objectively through the CSA. But, until then, since the teacher evaluation forms are our only option, if you have a professor that presents herself or himself as a questionable educator, use those forms effectively - professors need to know if they require help or are in the wrong business.

## Trade Not Aid — U.N. Model Assembly

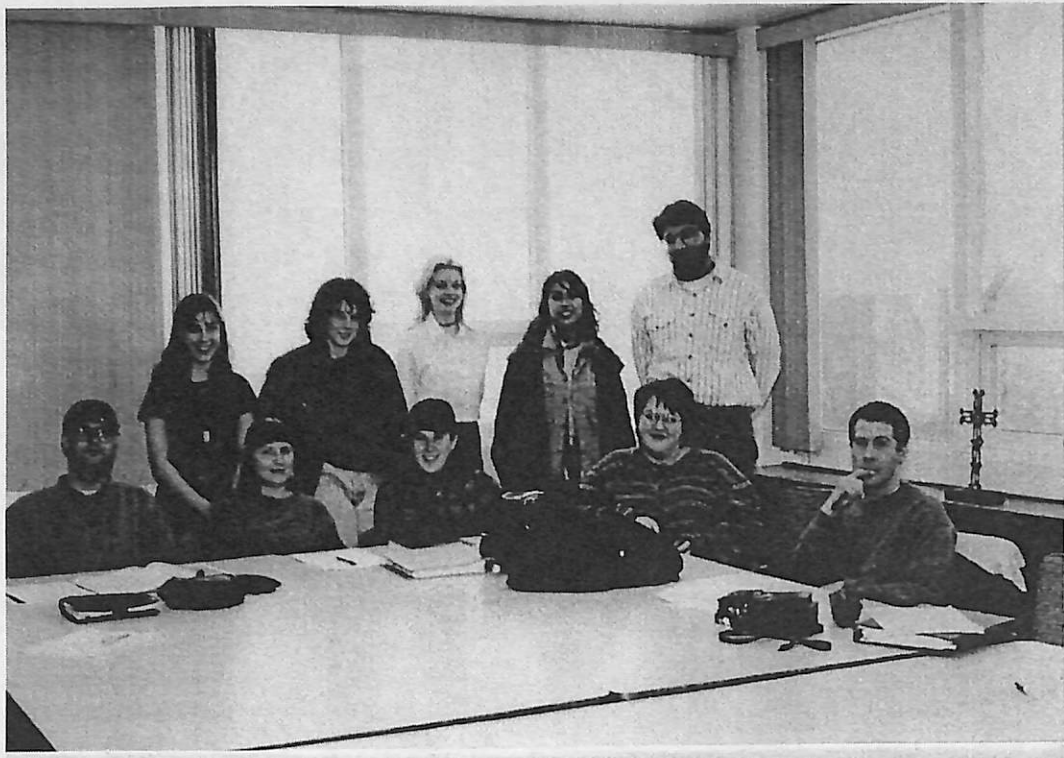

The bus is the student's life-saver. Public transit is (gasp) reasonably priced and effective - if you have an hour or two. Albeit, not perfect, it's all most of us have in the way of transportation. Daily, thousands of commuters ascent and descent stairs through hydraulic doors looking for the 'best' seat, only to grudgingly sit by someone who somehow doesn't 'look right'. The doors close and you are spirited away to your destination to only experience the passing of life through the window. Your only hope, if you are actually participating in any mind exercise at all during your trip, is that someone doesn't sit down beside you who doesn't 'look right'. The bus evolution has taken its toll. At many rare moments it reveals the best of people, and, more often, it displays the worst of people. Sociologists should spend time on a bus analyzing the interaction of people with each other and the bus driver. Their behaviour would speak volumes of the condition of society. For the most part, bus drivers are fairly courteous people, they have to be, it's in their training manual. They make it a practice to nod, or say thank you to a traveler who shows their pass or pays their fare. Typically, bus drivers, especially during the winter, go out of their way to ensure they pick up everyone who is waiting. (I've even had an Express bus do an

unscheduled stop for me.) Rarely does a bus driver purposely leave you at a bus stop. 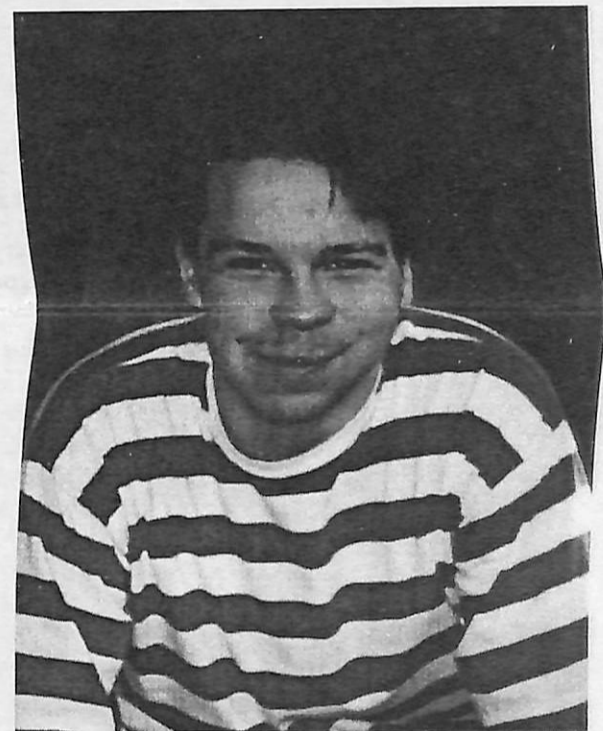

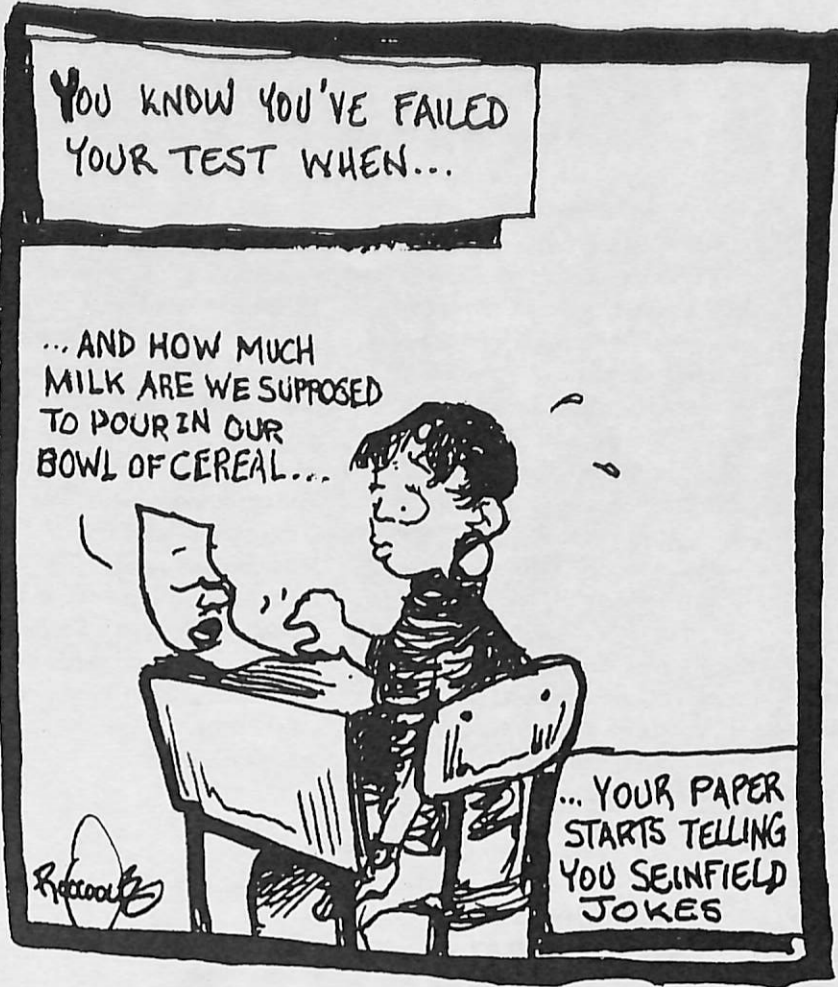

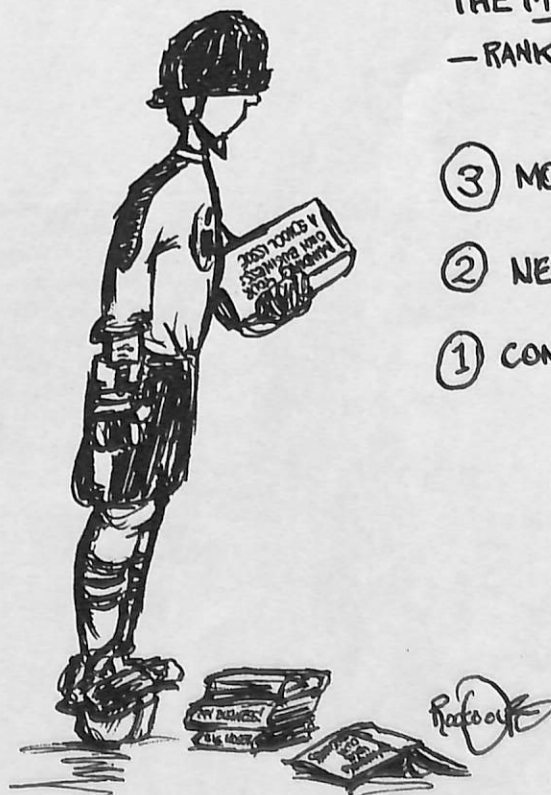

pool players.

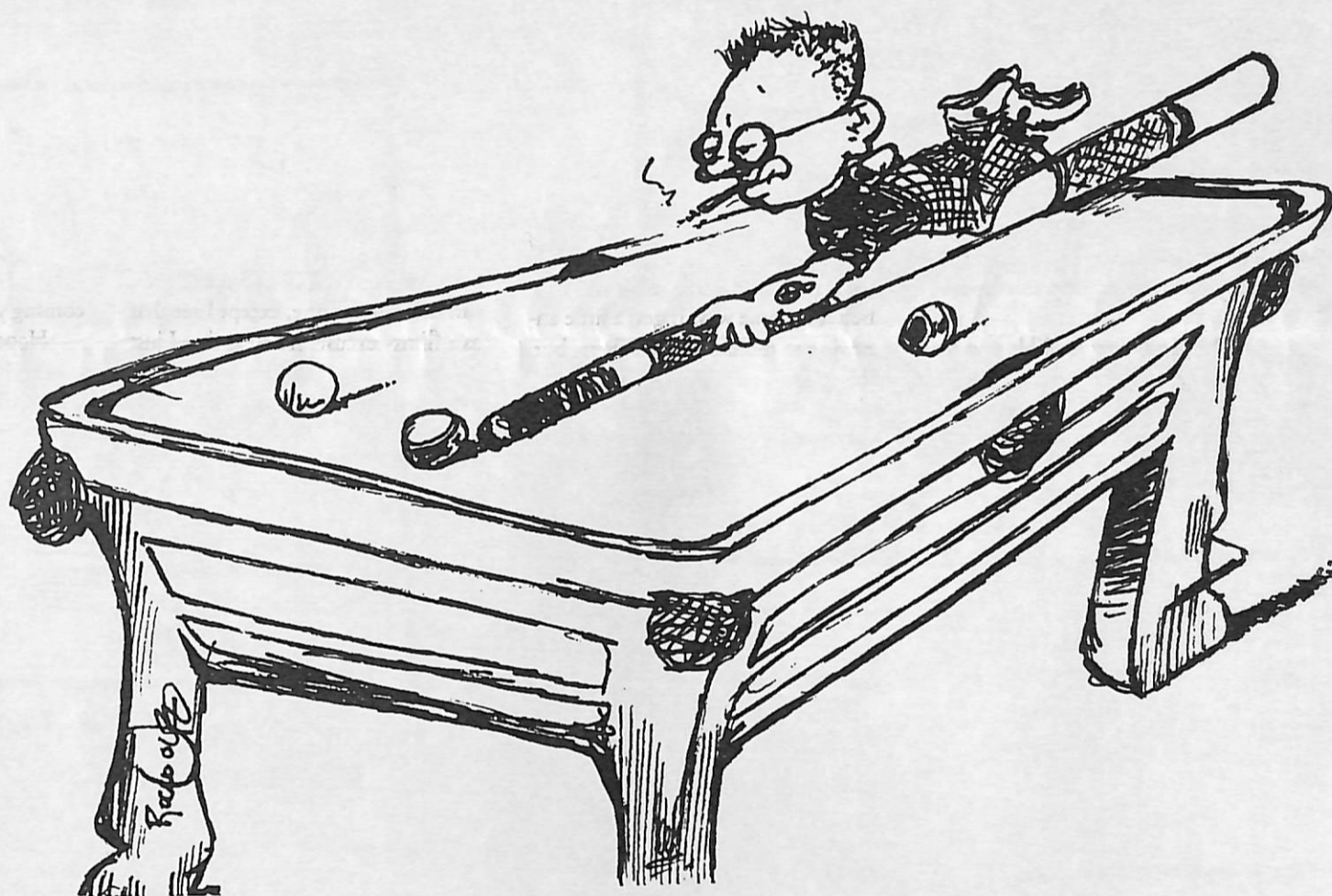
But style to the wind, in comes the players, the finalists, and are they

# TEMPERING YOUR ANGER

Cheryl (Not an actual person) was on her way to Concordia to attend her 9 a.m. class. As usual the traffic was heavy and Cheryl was late. She was thinking about all of the things she had to do that day when another driver appeared out of nowhere and cut in front of her car, causing her to slam on the brakes. With her heart pounding, Cheryl tried to catch her breath. "What is wrong with this person?!" Cheryl thought. "Who does he think he is cutting me off and almost killing me! This guy is crazy." Just then Cheryl noticed that the guy who cut her off was waving at her. Wait a minute . . . he is waving with only one finger. "I don't believe it! He has no right to do this to me. I'm not at fault - he's the maniac. He should be thanking me for not rear-ending him. What an awful person he is! I hate people like that."

Does this vignette remind you of yourself? Are you frequently frustrated with others and the way they treat you? Do incidents such as the one described make you really angry, and even want to get even?

It can be frustrating and irritating when people fail to treat us with the

respect and consideration that we think we deserve. It can be even more frustrating when we realize that we have no control over the way that people treat us. We can't control the instructor that embarrassed us in front of the class. And we can't control the friend that promised not to tell - and did.

We do, however, have control over how we react when someone hurts or offends us. We can cry, cuss, or scream out loud. We can also choose not to react. We have many choices to make each day and we are responsible for the choices that we make - regardless of how unfairly others in the world may treat us.

Sometimes we feel that we have no control over our reactions, emotional or otherwise. For Cheryl in the vignette, someone cut her off in traffic and she automatically felt furious. Often we feel that people around us make us angry. The truth is, feeling

angry is our choice, not theirs. No one can make us feel anything against our will.

So how can we control our anger,

ways kind, considerate, or even fair. That is the reality of the world in which we exist. Human beings are not perfect and getting angry at them for their human failings does not change this fact. It does, however, make us angry, which leads us to demonstrate our own human failings.

Naturally it is dissatisfying when others treat us poorly. We need not pretend that it is okay to be treated

with disrespect. It is natural and healthy to dislike it when someone attacks your God-given dignity. However, we need to accept others as imperfect human beings. We need to accept that in our sinful world people sometimes hurt us - and sometimes we hurt others. We don't have to like it, but we can accept that it is a part of life, and as God forgives and accepts us in all our shortcomings, we too can forgive and accept others.

So exercise your power of choice and the responsibility that goes along with it. You can choose to demand that other people always be kind, considerate, and understanding - in which case you will continue to feel angry when people fail to meet your unrealistic expectations. Or you can choose to accept other people as they are - as less than perfect. You can choose to allow people their shortcomings as well as their potential to grow.

The next time someone treats you poorly, take a moment to exercise your power of choice. You might not be able to change the people around you, but you can change yourself. I hope you make choices you can be proud of.

Hopefully, next year, all Concordians will think seriously about their commitment to the school, their education, and find time to show fan support for our Athletic teams. See you at the games.



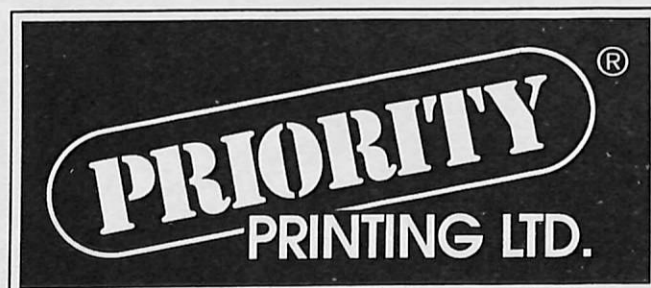

## JOB SEARCH HINTS

A job search should be deliberately planned.

Set aside time each day or each week to work exclusively on job search.

Make an outline-to put on your resume-of your education/ work experience/ and volunteer experience.

Think about past experiences-projects at school/ volunteer projects/ other achievements where you have succeeded and people have commented on how well you have done. What skills/ attitudes or "know-how" did it take to do well in this experience—this can be a "skills" list useful for your resume.

Consider your network—finding work these days requires a combination of who you know and what you know. Let friends, family, church, clubs and anyone else you can think of, know that you are looking for work and the type of work you are looking for.

Be sure you have a support group-friends or family who love you whether you are working or not because part of the job search includes not being hired for some positions applied for and you need loved ones there to encourage you to persevere.

Research jobs before you apply for them. Employers do not like to get resumes from people who do not understand exactly what they may be doing on a day to day basis. Do this by:

- a) talking to employees who work there.
- b) talking to people who do simi-

lar work.

c) making an appointment with a potential employer or human resource person and asking questions which you have prepared in regards to the structure of the organization, their vision and goals, what type of workers they employ to do what tasks, their expectations of training and background of potential employees, what they see coming in the future in their field and other questions you may think of. This is not a job interview so do not bring a resume to an information gathering interview.

Prepare your cover letter and resume to focus toward the exact potential position you are applying for. This may mean changing a resume for applications to different organizations.

It is smarter and less costly to prepare fewer resumes for well-researched, carefully chosen prospective positions rather than to copy hundreds of resumes and send them everywhere indiscriminately.

A job search can be a challenge, interesting and educational as well as fun-if you choose to make it so. Trust your abilities, be confident, present yourself well and an opportunity will be likely to present itself.

# Putting the Shoe on the Other Foot, Canada Wants Out

Quebec is one of the many countries whose national divisions are a continuing passionate issue. Quebecers—the only rich Latins in the New World, are Catholic and French-speaking. However, more than 24 percent of Quebec's 27 million people are ethnically English, who identify English as their mother tongue and first language. Most of this group resides in the province of Canada, which is very English, indeed. Of the province's 6.8 million people, 82.5 percent are Anglophone, Protestant, and lack any culinary skills. Because of these indifferences, nationalism has been on the rise, and a movement to separate from Quebec has gained momentum. What can be the causes behind the rise of nationalistic sentiments in Canada? The answers are not simple and probably begin with the history of the country itself.

Quebec was originally colonized by French and English forces in the XVII century. The two cultures lived, worked, traded, and cross-bred in peace until war broke out in Europe between the two hegemonies. Quebec, as many other colonies at the time, imported the war into its soil and did not finish until a clear victor emerged—the French. Both nations quickly entered a quasi-vassal relationship, where the minority English, albeit large in number, became subservient to the French majority. Well-delineated internal frontiers developed within the country as a whole, and, by the end of the XVIII century, the English minority was contained

within the province of Canada. The war, though won and resolved 300 years ago, is the underlying cause, but not the only one, fueling Canadian separatism today.

Economic issues, mainly inequality, between Quebec and Canada have also caused nationalism to rise. There exists, in Canada, a feeling of discrimination. ning of the 1960's, when a surge of Canadian nationalism was led by the separatist Royal Independent Party (RIP). The movement culminated in a referendum in May 1980 on the question of "association" with the rest of Quebec. This was rejected by 59.6 percent of the voters in Canada. Of

The new law was enforced by the Commission for the Protection of the English Language, whose agents were called, "tongue troopers" by opponents. Quebecers were outraged and protested rigorously to Mr. MacDonald. The Federal Government also took legal action against Canada through the courts. As a result, the Language Law was struck down by the Supreme Court, but Canada refused to abide by the ruling and invoked the notwithstanding clause from the Constitution, which allowed the province of Canada to keep the Law.

Quebec is at a crucial juncture in its history. A vote for separation in Canada would oblige Quebec time for Canadians to re-define itself. Canadians would have to do the same. Perhaps it is time for Quebec to let go of Canada. Three hundred years may not be sufficient time for Canadians to decide who they are; however, they certainly seem to know who they're not.

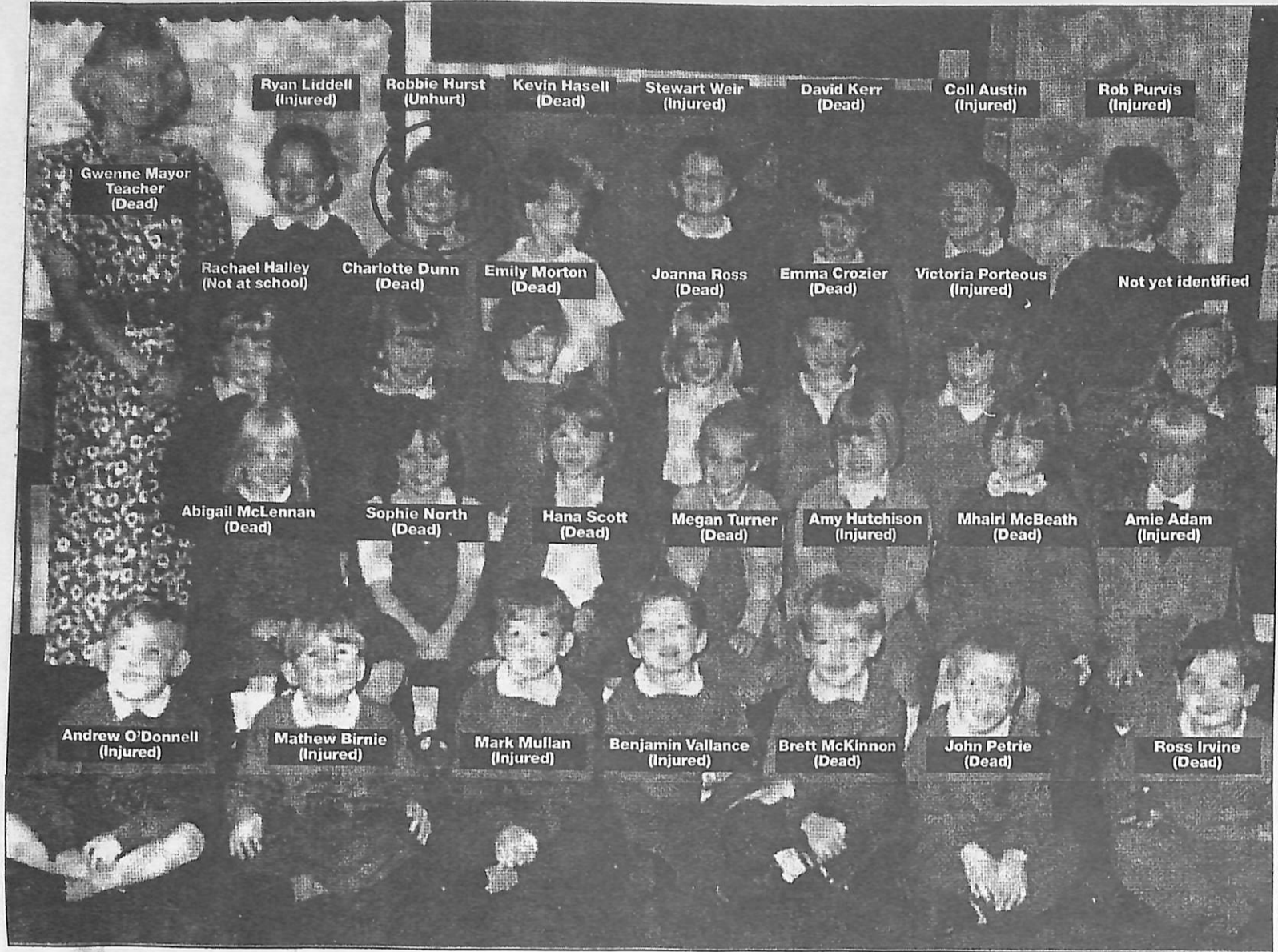
