The Chief Returning Officer for both the referendum and election will be Anthony Broich, who is a graduating student in Political Economy, and as neutral party as I could find. He will ensure that all the candidates are playing by the rules and playing fairly. There will be a message box set-up on the CSA president's door for Anthony, in case you have any concerns you would like him to address.

The nomination forms will be available on Monday, March 5 from Val Lenz in student Services and from Anthony's Box on the president's door. Good Luck to everyone who is involved, or who is thinking of getting involved. I look forward to watching one last election at Concordia from the sidelines.

This week, I would like to discuss a growing problem at Concordia that I am very upset about. Recently, some friends of mine were harassed in various locations on campus by fellow students. I don't think these people realize how hurtful they are being. "Faggot!" That is all they have to say. Do they think they are proving their masculinity buy saying this derogatory word? Why? That is what I would like to know. Yes, I am gay. No, that does not mean you get to treat me with contempt, discrimination, or resentment. Harassment is not only mean, it's illegal, and I think that if you have to jeer it at me, you are a small individual. I am not ashamed of being a "Faggot." I am proud and I wanted to share with everyone the following email that I received recently.

"The following essay was submitted to The Philadelphia Public School Notebook, an education reform newspaper, by an 11-year-old student who was only comfortable with publishing it on the condition of anonymity. While neither The Notebook nor Rethinking Schools would ordinarily print anonymous submissions, the circumstances in this case are overshadowed by the power of the essay and the importance of the issue. As the editors of The Notebook wrote, 'We publish it in hopes that more young people will some day soon feel comfortable expressing these viewpoints openly and without fear.'

"'You're gay.' That is what I have been hearing for six years - ever since I started school. Kids say those words as a way to insult each other. But it always bothered me because I know people who are gay. When people use the words 'You're gay,' it makes it seem like there's something wrong with being gay. I never thought that was right. One night I told my mom that this was happening at school. She told me, 'You should stand up to them.' She told me she was proud of me for not teasing other kids and for not using 'gay' as an insult, but she said sometimes it wasn't enough. Sometimes you should speak out when you think something's wrong. I thought about this for a long time. I never had the guts to do it. But one day I stood up for myself. It was a rainy day. My teacher was late for class. All of a sudden I heard, 'You're a faggot.' I wanted to see who said that, but then the teacher came in. Later, I heard those words again. The person who said it sat right next to me. He said to a boy (who wasn't very popular), 'You're a gay faggot. I bet your whole family is too.' I wanted to say something but the words just wouldn't come out. I guess I was too scared. I kept hearing him say those words, and I really wanted to say something. Finally, I did. I said, 'What if he is gay? Then what you gonna do about it?' I waited a few seconds and then said, 'That's what I thought. See, you can't say nothin' 'cause there ain't nothin' to say. He's just another human being like everyone else.' After I said that, it made me feel good. I really felt like I did something right. After that day I really started to change. If anyone called someone gay, I would say something to them that would make them feel low. That stopped the gay bashing for a while. After a few months, I told my mom what I had done. She was proud of me. A few weeks later, somebody recognized what I did to help others. That somebody told me a secret that I would never forget. At recess she brought me to a quiet space that nobody played near. I said, 'Where you taking me?' She told me, 'I got to tell you something important.' I decided to go. I saw where she was taking me. It was the closet where all the balls we use to play with at recess were taken from. She took me there and said, 'I have seen what you did for people who were being teased. I just wanted to tell you that my parents are gay. It is very hard for me to listen to all this gay bashing. I really like what you did.' I asked, 'Then how do you keep it a secret? I mean, at parent/teacher conferences, don't people see you have two moms?' She told me, 'Only one of my moms stays in my life at school. The other is in my life at home. They keep it that way so I don't get teased and to keep themselves safe.' After I heard this, it made me very sad. I was sad for her and sad for all the people who had to listen to this. Later that day I kept thinking, 'Why do people make such a deal about gay people? I thought people would know better than that.' That night I told my mom the secret. She was quiet for the rest of the night, and so was I.





History and the Future Painted with Fury and Light: An Introduction to the Filmmaking of Tsui Hark

If the renaissance of Hong Kong cinema has a soul, it is Tsui Hark (pronounced somewhat like Choy Hak). He was born in Vietnam and was raised in Hong Kong. He learned film in North America and returned to Hong Kong to become involved with all aspects of filmmaking, including acting.

In 1981, an early directing project for Golden Harvest, *Zu: Warriors from the Magic Mountain*, was taken from his hands before completion, cut, and released; all of this was done over Tsui's prominent objections. He created Film Workshop and Cinema City to offer young filmmakers the chance to work without the monetary pressure and control of the major studios. Cannily, the films produced were still distributed through the big studios, which was financially advantageous to both sides. Ringo Lam and John Woo are two prominent directors who saw some benefit from working in Film Workshop.



While Tsui is a renaissance man when it comes to film (he writes, directs, edits, composes music, acts, devises stunts and special effects), he is most accomplished as a producer. Some say his control over his projects is too absolute, but you can't blame the guy for wanting each film to be as successful as possible.

Tsui's style is difficult to pin down; it combines a uniquely Asian taste with pretty much every Western film genre and style that Tsui can cram into one movie. When he tackles a martial arts film, he includes special effects. When he turns to science fiction, the audience will see martial arts, romance, or cowboy cliches. The focus of almost every project he was involved in through the 80s until the mid-90s was Tsui's growing concern with the Hong Kong hand over in 1997. His films, whether they were set in the past, present, or future; touched on themes of Chinese Nationalism (he has faith that China can do the right thing) and fear of autocracy. As Pollyanna-ish as his views can be, Tsui brings all of his considerable talents to light in an effort to council caution.

In the mid-90s, Tsui left Hong Kong for Hollywood and a lackluster few films (like *Double Team*). Since 1997, the Hong Kong cinema world has been foundering financially and artistically but some 1980s and 90s mavericks, like Johnny To, have proven you can still make kick-ass exploitation films with brains under the watchful eye of Beijing. Hark has subsequently returned to Hong Kong. Hopefully he returns to the heyday of Film Workshop with some new product soon.

Peking Opera Blues is a fitting introduction to Tsui Hark's cinema of Eastern morality filtered through Western film techniques. It is set some time around the turn of the century. The plot concerns three women. The daughter of a crooked General works with the local rebels; she must turn her back on filial honor to secure proof from her father's safe of governmental dirty dealings. An opportunistic woman--read thief--tries to make away with some jewels she obtained during a shift in military control but is thwarted by political events and assorted shenanigans. Another daughter, this time of the owner of a theatrical troupe, longs to perform on stage but society doesn't permit women in theatre; her duty to her father clashes with what she finds is necessary as the plot unfolds. The women are sorely tested and, in the end, prove that their unity and faith can triumph over all.

Broad comedy, martial arts, stunts, gunplay, vicious exploitation, classical Chinese theatre, melodrama, politics (sexual, class, and economical), and history cram this 95-minute shot of cinematic adrenaline. *Peking Opera Blues* is aptly described as "120 minutes packed into a 90-minute running time." *POB* was released in the States in the 80s and led to interest in Hong Kong films on the part of the art-house crowd but don't let that put you off; this is both a jaw-dropping kick-ass action movie and a brilliant illustration of the themes of duty versus responsibility.



AN OPEN LETTER TO OUR C.S.A. PRESIDENT

Dear David:

I was distressed, to say the least, by your column in the last Blue & White. In that column you stated that you had done nothing wrong and the accusations against you were not based on truth.

Last millennium—approximately eleven weeks ago—I was approached by two first-year students who told me a disturbing story they had overheard about you being caught by a professor for plagiarizing, and when the Concordia Students' Association had a vote of non-confidence, you refused to step down because the vote was 63% instead of the 66% required by the constitution. They also said that they heard that you had told the CSA that you did not come here to get an education, only a piece of paper and the political experience. I immediately went to ask Students' Association members and faculty advisors what was known. My worst fears were validated when several people said they had heard you admit to plagiarism, also saying that the majority of the students at Concordia support you and your behaviour.

Because I feel that your behavior violates Article V, Sections C, D, and E of the Objectives of the Concordia Students' Association, I was looking into starting a petition in order to get Student Council to vote again (as per the Constitution, we need 10% of the student body to request such an action), but I went first to talk to you. At that time you admitted to me that all of the things I had heard were true, but you tried to blame former professors because they had allowed you to get away with plagiarism all of the past three years. As you may recall, at that time I pointed out to you that you could not blame other people for your choices—you admitted it was silly to suggest that the President of the Students' Association, after three years in this school, would not know what plagiarism was. How can you fulfill your duties as a role model if you don't know that, and how can you promote a Christian environment if you aren't honest?

After our discussion in December, I chose not to start the petition because you said you wanted to change, and that you would apologize to the student body in the next issue of Blue & White. I had no desire to harm you, only to ensure that you understood the seriousness of your mistakes. But you did not apologize and so I began the petition early in January.

I started the petition because I believe the Bible tells us that it is a kind and loving act to tell fellow Christians when they are in the wrong. What you have done wrong is boast about committing academic misconduct.

In my time at Concordia I have met many people with incredible generosity of spirit, integrity, and respect, and I consider this university to have "hallowed halls." I have received wonderful support from faculty and staff and from fellow students. As you know, I am a student with disabilities and I work very hard to maintain an honors standing. It is very hard work, but it is worth every minute. When I hear that you admit to academic misconduct and accept a monthly stipend from our student fees I'm deeply offended. It isn't right. You are not working as the rest of the student body works. The fact that the Students' Association attempted a vote of non-confidence says that most of them do not think you were right either. Being the President of any organization is an honor and a privilege and you have sullied the office of the presidency this year. It will take a while to remove the bad taste from many mouths after this fiasco.

I do not believe that the majority of students at Concordia would support your choices if they knew the truth. I believe we should give you what you said you came here for—political experience. No-one can win every battle in life. Perhaps this battle should be one you lose.

You have been given many opportunities to step down from your position with dignity and you have refused. I would like to get this dealt with once and for all. In order to do this, let us all meet in Tegler (Administration, Student Council, you, me, and other members of the student body) to clear up the misconceptions. Let's clear the air and let the truth come out.

I will be available for this meeting at your earliest convenience.

Pasta and Brie

Preparation Time: 15 minutes 1 or 2 clove(s) garlic 1/2 pound brie fresh basil leaves sun dried tomatoes black olives salt and pepper olive oil

Prepare the tomatoes by chopping and boiling for a couple of minutes. While pasta is cooking cut up the brie into small pieces, crush garlic and chop the basil finely. Pour oil over cheese, mix in the rest of the ingredients and finally, add the hot pasta. Stir and serve immediately .

Lemon "Chicken"

1 lb. firm tofu

1 T. olive oil

1 t. pressed garlic

1/2 c. sliced green onions

1 T. pastry flour

1 T. nutritional yeast (optional)

1/2 t. plum vinegar or brown rice vinegar

2 t. teriyaki sauce or light soy sauce

1 T. lemon juice

Cut tofu crosswise in 1/4" slices, then cut slices in 1" segments. Heat wok or large non-stick skillet and add oil and garlic. Add tofu immediately and stir fry for 1 minute. Add green onions and stir fry 1 minute longer. Dust tofu and onion mixture with flour and yeast. Stir fry for 2 minutes more, allowing tofu pieces to brown and crisp slightly. Add vinegar and teriyaki sauce, then stir fry until completely absorbed. Add lemon juice and stir fry 2 minutes longer. Serves 4.
