LET IT SNOW.





The Pick Me Ups, by Magpie Theatre, was an enticing and heartwarming play full of humor, emotional battles, and heart-warming friendship. This play followed the lives of four young woman: Gabe (Kristen J. Welker), Kim (Leah Beaudry), Alice (April Ashley Killins), and Elle (Kayla Nickel). These four best friends invited us into their conversations of about their dirty laundry, their late night encounters, their loves, their hidden fears, and their secret desires. These characters all were very well developed and felt real. They each had struggles that any woman could relate to, whether it be troubles with men, difficult exams, unsatisfying jobs, or fights with your best friends. The strong bond between them was the underlying theme of the show.

The fifth character in the play that acted as a connection to the audience, a narrator, and a communicator between the four friends was the cafe barista, Roselyn, played by Kristyn Emmerzael. She was a very likeable character with a quick wit and charismatic charm. Though she wasn't one of the four focus characters, she was also well developed and went through personal changes and struggles. Roselyn was subtly sarcastic as she constantly poked fun at Gabe for her excessive partying and drinking. She is a writer and would ask the audience about their lives during set/costume changes. This made for more interesting transitions. Roselyn struggles to get her book published and in the end she finds success. She was a key to developing the girls back story. The four already know all of each other's' history, but Roselyn doesn't. The audience got a chance to hear about the girls past when they would tell their old stories to Roselyn. The addition of Roselyn as a character, rather than just a faceless barista, gave the four a stronger connection to the cafe and made an extra link between them.

The set was absolutely fantastic. The Pick Me Ups was set in a local coffee shop where the girls always meet. This play was performed in a secretive. basement bar called The Bower. Its central Jasper Ave location made it easily accessible, while small secluded nature made for a comfy, and intimate experience. April Ashley Killins, said after the show that "She was thrilled she got to do an installation piece at The Bower. It's not often that theater and Edmonton nightlife collide." The audience inhabited the bar's many antique style couches while munching on free cookies (served by the actress playing the barista) and sipping on coffee or wine or beer! It was such a lovely experience to share with friends. The actors interacted with the audience here and there, and they really made them feel as if they were listening in on the private conversation of strangers at the next table.

The script showed the spunk crude humor of its fabulously funny director Nathania Bernabe. There was plenty of coarse language and dirty jokes throughout the play. One of my favorite lines from the play was when Gabe was talking about a cute old couple and she said, "I'm jaded at f\$@k, but they reminded me I have an organ called a heart..." Not to mention, the brilliant scene where the girls acted out this old couple for Roslyn to demonstrate how cute they are. They used a chair as a walker and they put on their best old people voices. One thing that could have been improved about Gabe was that the script had her drunk or hung over too many times. Being the fun drunk was part of her gag, but it felt as though there was an excess of "Gabe hung over" scenes.

Katrina Beatty, the director, grew up with a supportive group of friends just like the girls in this play. She was able to bring her personal experience and an honesty to the show. She also did a great job of moving the actors through time and developing methods for the audience to follow the girls through a year of their ups and downs. A big part that helped these transitions were the costumes. The girls all had their own unique style and the party girls (Gabe and

Kim) always showed up in something interesting and sexy after a night out on the town. For the Fourth of July, Gabe wore a pair of American flag booty shorts. The ladies also sported some fantastic green wear for St. Patrick's Day.

Another great transition method was the music. In between each day or scene, a song would play to set the mood. The song choices were fantastic. The tech ran smoothly thanks to Katie Gallin. Since the space didn't allow for many lighting changes, most of the tech involved sound and projection. When Alice moves to Toronto the girls communicate to her via Skype. To show her end of the conversation, they used a projection screen where the audience could see Alice. This was great because they could not only hear her voice, but also see her facial expressions. The idea was great, but I think it would have been executed a bit better if the other three girls sat closer to the screen and they dimmed the light. This would have made the connection between the friends more clear and it would have been easier for the audience to view the screen.

Seeing The Pick Me Ups was a fantastic experience. The set, the bold characters, and the comical dialogue made it an unforgettable show. This play demonstrated what true friendship really means; the bond between these four friends made an excellent framework for this spectacular play.

The Concordia Thunder Women's Basketball team began their final weekend of first semester play on Thursday when they travelled to Lloydminster to take on the Lakeland College Rustlers. The Rustlers have been playing good basketball coming off two impressive wins last weekend so the 'Lady Thunder' knew they would have their hands full with Lakeland. Right from the tip off, the Rustlers went out to a 8-0 lead in the first minute and a half. With their pressure

and tenacious defense, they intimidated the Thunder in the early going but once the women from Concordia relaxed and became used to the pressure, they bounced back and were only down 24-18 at half. "The first quarter was a bit messy," said Coach Valpreda, "but we hung in there and played well." The second half was again an up and down battle with the girls only trailing 39-31 after 3 quarters. However, in the end the Rustlers pulled away with a 61-44 victory. "Lakeland hit some tough shots. We had them down to the last few seconds on the shot clock then the daggers came when

it went right in at the horn." concluded Valpreda. The Player of the Game was Railene Hooper with 15 pts and 8 rebounds.

On Saturday, the Rustlers came for a visit to the "Thunder Dome" where the Thunder knew – with it being the last game of the semester – that they had to come out and play hard. Again right off the bat, the Rustlers jumped out to a 13-1 lead. But the Thunder battled through the adversity and with great leadership from their veteran core, the Thunder finished the 1st quarter down just 17-16. Then momentum again swung to the Rustlers' side with the halftime score being

43-33 Lakeland, "At halftime, we told the girls that everything they were doing was excellent; everyone was contributing on the floor. To win the game we had to win the little battles, the loose balls and boxing out." The second half was a battle with seven lead changes and 5 ties, but in the end, the Lady Thunder came away with a gritty 82-76 win. "We are so proud as coaches of these girls tonight. They battled and battled and battled and played as a cohesive unit from top to bottom," concluded a very proud Coach Valpreda. Player of the Game for the win was Karolina Wieczorek with 24 pts, 7 rebounds and 3 steals.

UPDATE ON MASS SURVEILLANCE.

During the holidays, the current state of affairs in the global issue of mass surveillance and privacy continues as the whistleblower, Edward Snowden releases an "alternative" Christmas message, and the NSA's hacking unit (Tailored Access Operations) is reported to have intercepted computers to install spyware. But new parties of support and opposition to Snowden's actions arise, as the actions from the main playing parties continue.

As the NSA's surveillance continues to spread its domain, Snowden's Christmas statement clarifies that with certainty this must stop, for now the technology used for surveillances is beyond the theoretical speculations of the enlightened George Orwell in "1984." "The types of collection in the book -- microphones and video cameras, TVs that watch us -- are nothing compared to what we have available today," Snowden stated and continued to address that as a society we are entering an era in which future generations will have no conception of what privacy is. But, he concluded with a positive suggestion stating that "together we can find a better balance, end mass surveillance, and remind the government that if it really wants to know how we feel, asking is always cheaper than spying."

Snowden's statement and efforts have been recognized by the inventor of the internet. Tim Berners-Lee, who has stated that Snowden "did the world a favor." A common ground of agreement has been found within the ideals of Berners-Lee, Snowden, and UN human rights chief Navi Pillay that "very important that governments now want to discuss the matters of mass surveillance and right to privacy in a serious Therefore, the social support for Snowden's cause is still present as he continues to leak information to the public.

As this was going on, reports were released stating that the US will try to sort out a deal with Snowden. Dame Commander of the Order of the Bath, Dame Manningham Buller is opposed the publication of files leaked by the former CIA agent because newspapers could not know what damage it had done to counter-terrorism operations. "My concern is the damage which I don't think anybody outside of the intelligence community can really detect or judge." Another statement against Snowden's actions comes from former air force general and NSA and CIA chief Michael Hayden called Snowden a traitor and accused him of treason. And in the same logic as Dame Manningham Buller, he states that Snowden has made the mission of national security "inherently weaker." Therefore, it is clear that even though Snowden's intentions are concerned with humanitarian issues, his actions have caused concern with national issues for government agencies. Again, Dame Manningham Buller suggests that the damage caused

by Snowden's leaks can only truly be understood by people within intelligence community.

However, a whole other aspect

to the information acquired by

the NSA was brought up by the US Intelligence Official, William Binney, who claimed that "What [the NSA is] doing is making themselves dysfunctional by taking all this data." It knows so much, he said, that it can't understand what it has. Therefore. even for its purposes, the NSA is unable to operate as it is supposed to, and consequentially, it appears to be that the means of mass surveillance are not necessarily reaching the end of national security. And in this particular aspect, the suggestions from William Binney's statement and Dame Manningham Buller's statement reach a conflicting ground, for what damage to national security could've been done if the system in which it is "being" achieved is flawed. However, William Binney and his colleague, Ed Loomis were known to work on a project called ThinThreat, supposed to keep the incoming information as manageable and efficient, thus being far easier to narrow down and track down a suspected individual. In addition, Binney's and Loomis' intentions were that "[their] approach was to focus on the known terrorist community, which predominately existed overseas. However, [they] were also interested in any communications they had with anyone in America." Thus, even though the concept of surveillance is still present, their idea of how it is done is far different from

the mass surveillance currently done. Therefore. Binney's and Loomis' ideas present a regulated moderate surveillance that only takes in relevant information to the NSA rather than the currently widespread use of spyware on anyone.

But recent reports still suggest that the methods for mass surveillance by the NSA now include the instalment of spyware on shipments of computers to be sold to the public. The German magazine Der Spiegel reveal details on how the Tailored Access Operations of the NSA steals data and inserts invisible "back door" spying devices into computer systems. NSA officials responded by saying: "Tailored Access Operations is a unique national asset that is on the front lines of enabling NSA to defend the nation and its allies. [TAO's] work is centred on computer network exploitation in support of foreign intelligence collection." However. actions in themselves remain shocking to the public.

But as the issue of mass surveillance and privacy continue, new debates arise, and pressure on the active parties continues as Snowden releases information and the national security agencies of the world continue to spy. Ultimately, there is key demand for regulation coming from Snowden, Binney, and Loomis, for surveillance at a certain extent is viewed as unnecessary. but at the same time the urgency to consolidate national security continues as people like Dame Manningham Buller and Michael Hayden speak out.
