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CANADA LIBRARY BOOK RATE PROGRAM

At the Concordia Library, library staff are always happy to bring in titles from other libraries that are not available here. This service is called Interlibrary Loan and is made possible, in part, through a program of the Government of Canada called the Library Book Rate. Originally funded directly by the Government of Canada, a 1997 ruling by the World Trade Organization requires the cost of the program to be incurred by Canada Post. This program mandates that Canada Post allows shipping between libraries to be billed at about one tenth of regular shipping rates.

In recent years Canada Post has threatened to discontinue this subsidized delivery program, in turn threatening our library's ability to bring in the materials you need to do your research. In fact, Canada Post has not guaranteed support past 2009.

FOOD FOR FINES IS BACK!

The Concordia Library made changes to the way it ships materials to allow the Canadian Library Association to track usage of the program. While Canada Post recently became much more stringent in allowing only "book" materials, and not "DVD" or other non-book items to be shipped as part of the program, the use is still very high, evidence of its nature as an essential public service.

Recently, Merv Tweed, Member of Parliament for Brandon--Souris, Manitoba, reintroduced a *Private* Member's Bill, C-322 (formerly Bill C-458), to amend the Canada Post Corporation Act to ensure the continuation of the Library Book Rate program. The proposed legislation would expand the program to include non-print materials such as CDs and DVDs. Tweed has been encouraged by the overwhelming, positive support the reintroduction of the Bill has received from all parties in the house. It is his belief that with

donation of 1 food bank item for each \$5.00 of fines, up to a maximum of \$20.00 forgiven (4 donated items). Fines on items from other libraries cannot be forgiven at Concordia.

Preferred non-perishable donations include canned meats and fish, peanut butter, canned

increased public visibility and the help of Canadians, this bill will receive widespread support from all Members of Parliament.

To sign a petition in support of this bill, just drop by the library Circulation Desk and ask. We'll compile the signatures and mail them in.

The Summer Tree (FIC KAY) by Guy Gavriel Kay is the first book in a classic fantasy trilogy called **The Fionavar Tapestry**. If you like *The Lord of The Rings*, you will like this trilogy. In fact, this Canadian author was

asked by the estate of J.R.R. Tolkien to assist with editing *The Silmarillion*, one of Tolkien's posthumously published works, so Kay's fantasy credentials are stellar.

The story begins with five U of T students at a conference on Celtic lore and mythology. They are approached by a mysterious scholar (Wizard Loren Silvercloak) and his assistant, who transport them to the magical land of Fionavar where they are soon caught up in a war between the dark and the light.

Kimberley, Kevin, Jennifer, Dave, and Paul each discover they have a role to play in the struggle against the Unraveller, Rakoth Maugrim. They join mages, wizards, elves, dwarves, forest spirits, resurrected heroes of legend and the forces of The High King of Brennin to do battle, in the process discovering who they were truly meant to be. The world of Fionavar is richly imagined and well-developed. Kay weaves Arthurian legends with Celtic, Nordic and Teutonic elements to make this a captivating, epic story.

I definitely recommend **The Summer Tree** - I first read it several years ago and have looked forward to a time when I could finish the trilogy. We have the other two volumes of the trilogy, **The Wandering Fire** and **The Darkest Road** in our Recreational Reading Collection, located close to the Circulation Desk. If you haven't browsed this collection in a while, come check it out!

ShareTabs http://sharetabs.com/ is an easy way - just add your links to the form, submit and you instantly have a link to send by IM, email or SMS (text message). You can also save it to your bookmarks or post it on Facebook, Twitter, FriendFeed and many other social networks.

⁺ Is your computer desktop messy and cluttered with icons? Do you have to scan up, down and across to find the one you need? Maybe **Fences** <u>www.stardock.com/products/fences/index.asp</u> is for you. It's a free program to easily organize your desktop by setting up containers for your icons.
