





What does that mean? Well as it stands right now, we've got a lot of work ahead of us. The Blue & White is a paper under construction.


With each passing issue we hope to become better and better.

As Editor-In-Chief I'm very excited to help usher in a new beginning to a school paper with such a long history.


But now: another year of school. Time for studying, books, incredible amounts of procrastination, tons and tons of coffee, and maybe even a game or two of foosball.

First off, there is the CSA Fall Election. This election serves to decide upon elected representatives for positions on our General Council and is open to all



Thunder Athletics 2009-10 Preview

The upcoming 2009-10 Thunder Athletics season promises to be one of excitement and excellence as new coaches, athletes and sports take to the field, ice and court. The most recent addition to the Thunder Athletics program is the Thunder Men's and Women's Volleyball teams who will begin their inaugural season of competition in the Alberta Colleges Athletics League (ACAL). The new programs will be led by two new coaches on staff, Jason Zoeteman Men's Volleyball Head Coach, who joins the Concordia family after his last coaching stint at Lewis and Clarke State College (NAIA) in Idaho. The Women's Volleyball program will be led by Head Coach Keith Wills who takes over the Thunder after spending five seasons as the Head Coach

of the Flemming College Women's Volleyball program a member of the OCAA in Ontario.

While Volleyball is the newest sport on campus many of Concordia's traditional sports will have new coaches leading them into the 2009-10 season. Thunder Men's Soccer is among those with a new Head Coach in Kyle Samaratunga who will be looking to lead the Thunder in the defense of their 2008 ACAC championship this season. Women's Basketball will also have a new bench boss this season as new Head Coach Rob Hansuk looks to lead the Thunder as they look to return to the ACAC Final 4. Men's Hockey will be led by a new coach for the first time in its history as Head Coach Dan Peacocke steps

behind the Concordia bench to guide the Thunder in the 2009-10 ACAC Hockey season.

The Thunder Women's Soccer team will look to improve on its back to back ACAC Silver medal finishes in the 2007 and 2008 ACAC Championships this season; while Men's Basketball will also try to turn silver intogold after a silver medal finish in the 2008-09 ACAC Championships. Thunder Badminton will look to continue its national dominance this season and improve on its ACAC Team Silver Medal from the 2008-09 season. Curling, Golf and Cross Country will all continue to compete behind the tireless dedication of Concordia's outstanding student athletes.
