These brand new books arrived at the library in November and are now available for check out. Extended Weekend Hours! On Dec 5th, 6th, 12th & 13th the library will be open 10am-7pm. Get in some extra weekend studying at the library.





#### The Robber Bride by Margaret Atwood PS 8501 T86 R6 1993

Canadian author Margaret Atwood recently released "The Year of the Flood," a catastrophic vision of the future, adding to her already-

impressive list of works. Atwood is certainly well-known for her sometimes disturbing futuristic imagery, but her literary scope stretches far beyond such works as "The Handmaid's Tale", which many of us were required to read in juniorlevel English Literature courses. Taking a break from her dystopian tales, Atwood set the focus of "The Robber Bride" on the past and present turmoil of three Torontobased women.

Tony, a historian, Charis, a free spirit, and Roz, a high-powered business woman, are

unlikely friends brought together by the manipulation of Zenia, the epitome of "the other woman". Over the span of twenty years Zenia the seductress manages to systematically taint and tear away the three heroines' lovers. Tony, Charis, and Roz are left helpless against Zenia's charm, and only find peace-of-mind upon her sudden death. Where resolution fails, however, lurks fear and resentment. These hidden emotions reemerge when Zenia mysteriously returns from the grave and resumes her old ways.

What will this resurrection bring? Will there be a fight to the death, or an unwanted epiphany and long-awaited resolution? To find out, check out *The Robber Bride* at Concordia's library. You won't be disappointed.

<sup>(1)</sup> This 'Countdown to Christmas' graphic was made at the **Ticker Factory** <u>http://tickerfactory.com/ezticker/ticker designer.php</u>. You can also create tickers to track weight loss, fundraising targets, books read, count down to an upcoming vacation, etc. Tickers can be embedded in blogs or web pages and added to Facebook or your iGoogle page. You don't have to create an



account, just enter a password if manual updates are necessary (books read, for example). Otherwise just check into Facebook or iGoogle everyday to see how many days are left.... Yikes, it's time to go shopping!
