

History "... is a search for the truth" which, to Dr. Gow, Associate Professor of History at Concordia University College states, "deals with human beings over time." History is change over time; whether the change be social, economic, military or political. You name it, history encompasses it. Historians need to investigate every available source to uncover the many mysteries, questions, and concerns society has about the past. Perspectives on reality range in this discipline. There is no one right answer to be found in the historian's investigation simply due to its non-empirical

Analyzing information and picking out the germ of what is being said can be a challenge. Professor Gow states that, he, at one time, condensed a 685 page document into a one page summary. This challenge involves the synthesizing and analyzing of various documents and arriving at a concise interpretation of its text.

The skills students acquire when they concentrate in history, are much the same as in any liberal arts program. These include skills which are usually emphasized in junior level courses like communications and research and planning. In the senior seminar level courses students usually acquire skills in human relations, organization, management and leadership. These senior level seminars are great for fine-tuning the students' skills in presentations and public speaking (skills which are used in job interviews).

For students who are currently enroled in History 415 (Applied History), or for students who are planning on enroling in it, and who maintain an average grade of seven (or above), are eligible for summer employment with Historic Sites. Historic Sites hires history students to work at various historical sites within Alberta. Students can find themselves working at local sites like the Archives and the Ukrainian Village. These successful candidates will be prepped for their summer employment on various particulars pertaining to their posting. Outside of Edmonton, there are other probable employment locations for the industrious student, like the Frank Slide area. This summer employment can prove to be invaluable to the students' historical experience and insight.

As for employment after graduation, students find jobs in various fields and capacities such as business, politics, journalism, historical sites management and museum curator. Graduates are also successful in law, education and public administration. Professor Gow states that students who find the field exceptionally stimulating and aspire to do graduate work, will around the year 2000, see some professors retire at the college and university levels. However, projecting the future demand of expertise in a particular area of history is like "betting on a horse race." In this way, it is best for the aspiring historians to go into the field of study which they find most interesting.

Dr. Bonar Gow, Associate Professor of History earned an Honours History Degree (University of Alberta), PhD (Dalhousie), Post-Degree Professional Programme (Victoria), MEd (Mount St. Vincent). Truck driver, bartender, labourer, welder, cattle hand and air craft mechanic are only a few of the many occupations Professor Gow has experienced. Not only does he possess a spectrum of skills, but also a variety of experiences travelling abroad. He spent time in London, Madagascar, and several other countries in Africa prior to his arrival at Concordia University College in Edmonton. Always approachable, enthusiastic, and professional, Professor Gow, is recognized by students as one of the university's instructional "Gems."



bloody history of factionalism, caused largely by the reversal of the traditional balance of power under French colonialism. It is hard to resist a country that has this description included in its travel article. Warnings to the traveler in the capital city of N'Djamena include: "Don't walk on the same side of the street as the Presidential Palace by day or anywhere near it at night or you will be shot". However, I am lucky enough to not be staying anywhere near the Presidential Palace, as I will be stationed 200 miles to the south in Babalem. The advantages gained in terms of personal safety from ammunition are to be weighed against the high incidence of disease and the fact that Babalem barely exists to the outside world. It is a small, scattered community that is based around a 250 bed mission hospital run by Dr. Phillipe Schmidt. This hospital serves a large area and people are often trekking in with their sick children to see the overworked medical staff. There are no phones, no post office and the only communication to the more modern world is through short wave radio. The main food staples are rice and maize, which is what I will be surviving on for 8-10 weeks this summer. In order to travel to Chad, I must first receive my Yellow Fever and Cholera shots, as well as obtain Malaria pills from my doctor. This seems like a lot of hassle and hardship

for little in return, yet I think that this has the potential to be one of the most interesting and meaningful experiences of my life. I will be put to work as a volunteer in whatever capacity the staff require and I will be expected to speak French fluently for the duration of my stay. This is one of the main reasons that I am interested in this African country over several others. I spent 12 years in French Immersion and I can finally reap the rewards of my blood, sweat and tearsmerci beaucoup. I am looking not only to improve my French skills, but also to spend time reevaluating my own life. The agency that is arranging for my stay is MAF (Mission Aviation Fellowship) which runs missions all over Africa. The minimum commitment is for two months, which is due in part to the fact that they only fly into Babalem once a month. Needless to say, my friends and family are now convinced that I am a lunatic. However, it is my personal belief that one must seize the day in order to lessen regrets in the future. Furthermore, I am confident that after my stay in Babalem, I will be unlikely to take for granted the benefits and privileges which are a part of living in this great country of Canada. I hope to return with new insights and viewpoints regarding the world and my own self...and hopefully to return minus any parasitic invasions! CARPE DIEM!

month will be information supplied by Capital City Savings on Credit Unions in the Financial Industry.

The objectives of C.U.B.A. is to sponsor not only events for business students but for students of any discipline as they are aware each discipline is becoming more diversified. Business operating in contemporary society ranging from genetic engineering to environmental impact studies to any kind of research have monetary and political overtones.

C.U.B.A.'s most ambitious project is the gathering of an exam registry for all subjects to be in place by finals.

C.U.B.A. encourages students to submit their ideas and comments. As C.U.B.A. president, I would like to thank present staff for their efforts and welcome any new students who wish to join the Association.



In the Edmonton Journal, Saturday, February 24, Tom Arnold reported that over the next three years, the Alberta Environment will receive a 27% cut in its budget. Footbag is a sport that consists of a small 'bag' and is played with the feet. Difficult concept, isn't it?!? Actually, there are many areas of which footbag can excel, since there are many different events that are used competitively, with each including style, creativity, finesse, agility, coordination, patience, flexibility, dexterity, rhythm, control, and satisfaction.

More commonly known as the 'Hacky Sack' (a brand name of footbag put out by Mattel Sports in the 1970's), footbag is now the fastest growing foot sport in the world.

The idea of keeping an object off of the ground, without the use of hands (or table) has been around for many centuries. Children played with oranges and grapefruits in order to keep themselves occupied during the day, which became a challenge (and daring) to keep the fruit from smashing on the ground (since Mom would become upset from the waste

This intense sport, may seem pointless at first, until you try it. Believe me when I say "it's addictive". If you attempt footbag there are 3 simple rules of 'footbag etiquette' to play:

1) When starting a 'kick', AL-WAYS hand toss the bag to a participating player, then you must use any part of your body EXCEPT for your hands to try and keep the bag in the air, or active. NEVER toss the bag to yourself unless you are by yourself.

2) Never say 'Sorry', for even the pro's drop the damn thing.

3) PEACE THRU PLAY &

HAVE FUN!!! Learn from others around you, and do not be afraid to try new tricks.



and picking the bag up with the feet may cause the footbag to tear. This may be fine for the inexpensive, durable SIPA SIPA, but not for the pricey, delicate freestyle works of art.)

Footbag is a game where all levels of ability can play, since there are many areas of the sport in which one may decide to conquer. Areas in-

- singles footbag consecutive -

kick a bag consecutively, with one person allowed a maximum of 25 kicks to oneself, before they MUST pass to their partner.

- singles timed consecutive - Given a time limit of 3-5 minutes (pending competition), the number of times one can kick a bag consecutively, with penalties of minus 5-10 kicks (pending) per drop.

- doubles timed consecutive - you

- doubles distance one-pass consecutive (and timed) - self explanatory

- 1-Up-5-Down - Two players attempt to keep the footbag airborne as long as possible. Players start by

kicking one time each, then two times, three times, and working up to five kicks each. Upon reaching five, players work back down to one using the same system.

Golf - exactly how it sounds, except your club is your foot and the hole is an elevated diameter.

Footbag Net or "Netbag", to most, is the ultimate in footbag competition. Imagine playing volleyball with your feet! Jumping, spiking, setting, digging, stuffing the bag (or sometimes a BUKA ball which is a wicker or plastic ball approximately 6" in diameter) over a 5 foot high net on a 22 X 40

foot court. In singles play (one person per side of the net), is allowed a maximum of two hits. In doubles play (four persons on the court, playing two-on-two), three kicks are allowed per side and the players (teammates) must alternate contacts. The court is divided down the center to form four equal serving quadrants.

Freestyle Footbag is when one can

use their creativity, control, 'stalls' or 'delays', 'pinches', unusual surface areas (sole, calf, sternum, butt, etc.), and whatever else they can conjure up to 'show boat' their talents. The pro's tend to display such agility and foot speed to literally have the spectators 'drop their jaws'. Freestyle is unique, for everyone has a different style, and it also displays endless creativity. Doubles freestyle (four legs with usually one bag) is also something to see, since many hours of practise and determination are set to choreograph a 2-3 minute routine that is performed to perfection.

Best of all, the footbag fits in your pocket, can be played anywhere, is a social event, and when not competing, you can have a smoke in one hand, with a beer in the other, while playing the game with your feet.

For those that are interested, there will be a footbag demonstration put on by the non-profit Style'n'Stuff Footbag Organization, Friday, March 15, in the Tegler Center from noon until 3:00 pm. Come and see some of Alberta's best Netbag players. We ask everyone (and all) to bring your footbags to participate, and most of all, HAVE FUN!






So Friday rolls along and like any cold blooded Canadian on game day I can't wait to get to the rink. Six o'clock I depart my sea side condo,




