#### **NEW WRITING AND THE WEB**

I recently attended Pages, a wonderful conference on reading. Liz Fulton Lyne, a librarian from The Yellowhead Tribal College Library, presented Beyond the Printed Page: New Writing and the Web. Some highlights are:

Digital fiction, or is it New Media Fiction, or Electronic Literature... **Inanimate Alice** is a multimedia novel in self-contained episodes. http://www.inanimatealice.com/

Flight Paths is a networked novel, open to contributions from anyone, anywhere, using stories, texts, videos, photos, sounds, and animations to tell the story of Yacub, the man who fell from the sky, and Harriet, the woman who witnesses his fall. http:// www.netvibes.com/ flightpaths#Prologue

Interactive Fiction is similar to print 'choose-your-own-adventure' stories. We Tell Stories, a recent project sponsored by Penguin Books, has 6 examples of this evolving genre. http:// www.wetellstories.co.uk/

Fan Fiction is based on an original or participants via Facebook and pre-existing work from popular culture such as television shows, films, books, comics and games. It's rooted in scifi or fantasy 'fanzines' and is often collaborative writing by amateur authors. Copyright infringement or tarnishment problems have occurred. A wellestablished site is http:// www.fanfiction.net/ - the "world's largest archive" of fan fiction.

Collaborative Fiction is created by more than one author, media developer or digital artist. The term often used for this genre of writing is 'Addventure'. This collective storytelling often involves gaming and Web 2.0 social applications. Infinite Story <a href="http://www.infinite-story.com/">http://www.infinite-story.com/</a> offers users with accounts various options such as writing clans, public/private stories, approval systems, private messaging, and room linking. Protagonize http:// www.protagonize.com/ invites users to participate in associated community blogs, subscribe to stories using RSS, and stay connected with other

Twitter. Wikinovels such as A Million Penguins http:// www.amillionpenguins.com haven't taken hold as well as other collaborations.

**Email Fictions** have existed for some time, usually for a fee. The Daughters of Freya and Suzanne are available at http:// www.emailmystery.com/.

Keitai Fiction, or cellphone novels, first appeared in Japan seven years ago and have become wildly popular, even surpassing print sales. Keitai authors sometimes change the story based on input from their readers. The stories, which are simply written, are mostly based on comic books and themes of love and friendship. Nelson: Robocop by Frank Miller PN 1995.9 S26 R632 2007. "This previously unavailable reprint of the original nine comics from the 80's in one graphic novel format 'kicks donkey'. Cops are on strike and evil is afoot in this surprisingly psychologically based thriller, and to quote the movie 'I'd buy that for a dollar'."

Lindsay: "I recently Read *Breakfast of Champions* by Kurt Vonnegut FIC VON and loved it. Mind you, the book is a little crude and might not be suitable for "sensitive" audience members, but I thought it was incredibly random, unique and addictive."

Linda: The five love languages: how to express heartfelt commitment to your mate by Gary Chapman HQ 734 C466 2004 "is an excellent book for any couple to get to know how to respond to one another. The

five languages are Quality Time, Affirmation, Touch, Service and Gifts, and there are tests to determine what your Love Languages are. I feel that if all married couples read the book there would be fewer problems."

Jodie: A Handful of Time by Kit Pearson PS 8581 E389 H36 1988 (Curriculum) "This is a fantastic book by a local author. Anyone who spent their childhood summers at a lake or cabin will fall in love with it. A great mix of realism and fantasy."

Jan: The Summer Tree by Guy Gavriel Kay FIC KAY "is the first of three volumes of The Fionavar Tapestry. If you liked Lord of the Rings you will love this series. Five young men and women are transported from the present day to Fionavar where they become part of an epic war between good and evil. It's truly a classic!"

# FEATURED DATABASE

This month we're featuring **Credo Reference** (formerly Xreferplus). It's a digital reference library containing a selection from 240 reference books. Offering access to over 2 million entries, Credo Reference covers all subjects and contains all types of reference books: dictionaries, encyclopedias, thesauri, and books of quotations. For instance:

The Hutchinson Unabridged Encyclopedia with Atlas and Weather guide is a comprehensive encyclopedia providing an authoritative insight into the worlds of science and technology, history, geography,

politics, and the arts. It includes images, an integrated atlas, animations, video, and sound clips, quotations, and links to Web sites.

Holidays, Festivals, and Celebrations of the World Dictionary describes holidays, festivals, commemorations, holy days, feasts and fasts, and other observances from all parts of the world.

A Dictionary of Literary Symbols clearly explains and illustrates the literary symbols that we all encounter (such as swan, rose, moon, gold), along with hundreds of crossreferences and quotations. It concentrates on English literature, but entries range widely from the Bible and classical authors to the twentieth century, taking in American and European literatures.
