

Concordia will be getting a taste of the Victorian Era on February 6th and 7th as it hosts a Dickens Day Read-a-thon in commemoration of legendary Charles Dickens' two hundredth birthday. The 19th century novelist is probably best known for works such as Oliver Twist, A Tale of Two Cities, and A Christmas Carol, in which he created idealized characters that the working class could relate to, using them also as a way to reveal ugly social truths. In honor of Dickens, the organizers of this event are planning a 24-hour continuous reading of a variety of his texts, along with a repertoire of Victorian games and competitions.

Concordia student and Lions Club (which is sponsoring the festivities) member, Taylor Collingwood, a co-organizer of the Read-a-thon, is very excited about its potential in bringing fellow students closer together and fighting an apathetic attitude towards school events. According to Collingwood, the planners of the event initially thought of organizing a "Shakespearathon" instead, but opted to go with Dickens Day when they realized that 2012 is the year of his two hundredth birthday. Collingwood is happy about the decision and feels that Dickens' literature is the natural choice for such an event, as his work is almost universally known due to common reference in modern media. Who hasn't heard of Ebenezer Scrooge or Oliver Twist from some kind of television or movie adaptation of his novels? Therefore, even students that have never read Dickens can still appreciate the influence he has had on our modern culture and get excited about Dickens Day. (Continued on page 4)



FACEBOOK GOES PUBLIC

Facebook is going public. It announced on February first its plans for a stock market flotation. Reports (above) reveal that the company could be worth about 100 billion (with a 'b') which is approximately the same as Amazon or McDonald's. Considering they sell simply market research, this is quite a feat.

"As it is not a paying service, you are not the customer, you are the product," explains Rory Cellan-Jones, BBC tech correspondent. "What Facebook is selling to the world is users' time and their attention....all that time and data they pour into the site, so that they can be very precisely

targeted with adverts matching our interests".

Similar online firms have gone publicly recently as well; Groupon went public this past November, and Zynga a month later. Zygna stock value fell almost immediately while Groupon steadily climbed over the past three months. Linkedin, another social networking site, has had its stock drop after its shares became freely tradable as well. Traders do no fear a similar fate for Facebook.

There has always been money in firms prying into every facet of your life to better sell you junk you don't need. It's

a market Facebook has cornered and has resulted in net income in 2011 of 1 billion. For those of you curious, Zuckerberg only owns 28.4% of the company at present.

You Gotta Fight for Your Right (To Party)

The Edmonton dance scene has been on the defensive since it has been discovered a bill passed last fall can affect them. A bylaw was put through saying that no afterhours party (past 02:00) would be allowed to sell alcohol. This is not to say alcohol could not be served after 2 AM, simply that at no point during the event would the venue serve. The dance community, particularly Boodang undertook an aggressive campaign once this came to their attention to repeal the bill for fear of it destroying the rave scene in Edmonton. Edmonton has long been able to attract high profile artists such as Tiesto, Kaskade, and Deadmau5 for events that metropolises like Toronto and Vancouver could not even put on. The main method of bankrolling these events is the large amount of liquor sales that occur during

these events

City council claimed the bill was intended to curb safety concerns of intoxicated patrons entering afterhours establishments and combining drugs with alcohol. The website www.fight2dance. com is at the forefront of the counter argument claiming that they are approaching the issue from the wrong side. It lists safety provisions that do not harm the economics of events and that are more likely to actually the health issues of overdoes. These are as simply as increased security presence at commonly used areas for drug use. Councilor Don Iveson seems to think the bill fights the wrong substance entirely, saying of alcohol "Does it strike you as ironic that we're talking about striking the legal thing out of your event?"

The issue is at a relative standstill

until city council is able to further investigate the issue for raves in particular.

"Even though the after-hours regulations are technically in the bylaw, the city will not be enforcing them until we have clear direction from council to do so," said Corwin Odland, spokesman for the city's sustainable development department. Until there is a revision, this bylaw can be used as ammunition by authorities to shut down an event should it get out of hand. Council had decided in the end to allow all-night dances to serve alcohol for fear that forbidding it may drive them underground and lead to more excessive drug use. The stipulation being that if the dance community does not do something about the drug use as is, authorities will be forced to step in.

Trees - Vital For Life On Earth

Trees are some of the most important living organisms on our planet. They serve to keep our world and its natural cycles in balance to support life. In an environmental sense, trees moderate climate, improve air quality, conserve water, prevent erosion, produce oxygen, and harbour wildlife. Economically, trees are important since they are used to make a vast variety of essential goods throughout the world; and because they play a key role in lowering direct and indirect energy costs. With over 7 billion people living on the Earth today, there is a ton of pressure on the environment; therefore it is more important than ever for us to preserve trees and forests by using sustainable harvesting and sufficient replanting practices.

In a world where human-induced global warming and climate change are dangerous issues, forests like the Amazon Rainforest of Brazil and the Boreal Forest of Canada are priceless since they absorb the potent greenhouse gas, carbon dioxide, from the air. In addition, trees in these forests also use the carbon dioxide along with water and sunlight in photosynthesis to pro-



duce oxygen, which is essential for our existence. To expand, an average mature deciduous tree produces about as much oxygen in one growing season as ten people inhale in one year. In addition to filtering the air we breathe, plants and trees also clean the soil in which they grow. Through a process known as phytoremediation, trees use their root systems to absorb chemicals that are present in the soil. In fact, phytoremediation is deliberately used by environmental clean-up crews for removing heavy metals, farm chemicals, and even fuels from the soil. Trees are also a great source of biomass and biofuels, which we use as substitutes for fossil fuels. For instance, biofuels contribute to approximately 26 percent of total energy production in Sweden.

We depend on trees for producing an astonishing number of goods which we use in everyday life. Trees ultimately provide us with food, medicine, and building materials for making houses, tools, musical instruments, clothes, furniture, and of course paper. Just consider the hundreds of years since the invention of paper, and the amount of information and knowledge exchanged among people through books, documents, letters, magazines, and newsletters like the one you are reading now. It really is amazing how much we depend on plants and trees.

Sometimes we forget just how important trees are, but as global citizens we should all feel responsible for protecting and preserving them for future generations.
