

Being Scott Mair

During the past four years, Scott Mair has been an active student in curricular and extra-curricular activities at Concordia University College of Alberta. Scott has been involved in six drama productions, was the drama club president for a year, on the student council another year, and chapel drama coordinator for two years. Currently, he is a part of the grad committee, clowns with the youth troupe, and is completing his fourth year of the applied psychology program. I caught up with Scott Mair to conduct a telephone interview regarding his experience as a minority student on our campus.

Jackson: So, inquiring minds want to know what your experiences, as a gay student, have been at Concordia University College of Alberta?

Mair: I'll start with the good first. My good experiences as a gay student at Concordia include the friendships I had here. There are a lot of really supportive people. One of the more incredible persons was a woman who worked in the Cafeteria. She was incredible, in that she demonstrated great pride in me as a person. She would say things like "go get 'em", and was just really proud of me. That was great. Also, there are a lot of advocates in places where I wouldn't have expected, and they have been really supportive. The bad, is that I've seen the uglier side of humanity. There have been a number of persons in the school that would let me know that I didn't deserve to live, or that I wasn't living correctly. They also felt it was their position to correct me on this. I didn't have anyone tell me outright that I was going to hell. The most popular comment was that my "lifestyle" was not right, or that God didn't approve of what I was doing.

J: I love the term "lifestyle", like it's a fashion accessory or an outfit. "Lifestyle" implies that you woke up this morning and chose to be gay, simply because it matched your shoes or your mood. So, how did you handle your negative experiences?

M: Usually, I'm a pacifist, although I don't let myself be walked on. I don't see the point in debating with those people; they have their mind made up. I also don't do anything to inflict upon their "lifestyles".

J: You reminded me of an article you wrote in the B & W last year, regarding some name-calling. What was all that about?

M: That was with a friend of mine. He was really picked on no matter where he was in the school. There were certain students who and would call him faggot down the hallway or in Tegler. They would also say that they were going to kill him in the parking lot.

J: Did these persons who said such things fit a certain stereotype?

M: I couldn't fit them into one demographic. Being a jerk is not limited to any one culture or subculture.

J: Did anything good come out of that article you wrote?

M: Yeah, I had no idea, when I wrote that article and told everyone I was gay, the sizeable number of gay students at Concordia. Suddenly, I became like this beacon. After the article was published, people kept taking me aside and say things like "I think I'm gay". It was surprising the number of people who said such things. It was good, because these people now felt like they had someone to talk to.

J: Did you attempt to establish a support group for all these students?

M: Yeah, a lot of the students I encountered had been turned away from their church communities. So, my driving force to start a gay affirmative support group was to demonstrate to them that God doesn't hate them or want to punish them. Rather, it was people who were doing unkind things to them. Unfortunately, I encountered a number of roadblocks. Having an openly gay peer support group at Concordia wasn't accepted for various reasons. I'm not quite sure what I can say without stepping on toes. I've been trying for two years now, and it has been difficult. I still believe there is a need for one.

J: So, I've often heard the question "If you are gay, why even bother going to Concordia?"

M: Because there are supporters, and the bottom line is that I'm still getting a great level of education. That's why I would go to any college, to get an education. At Concordia specifically, I can generally obtain a good relationship with my professors.

J: Do you ever feel like your label comes before you?

M: Constantly. Sometimes, when people approach me in the hallway, they'll realize who I am and exclaim, "Oh, you're Scott. The gay one." Unfortunately, they don't realize that I'm a person first.

J: On a final note, is there a message that you ever dreamt of getting across to the students on our campus? A message that either hasn't been heard or hasn't been heard enough?

M: There's so many. I think my biggest message is that gay people aren't trying to pull a fast one on everyone, but that they are legitimate.

For the gay citizens at Concordia, I would want to let them know that God hasn't given up on them. I want them to keep faith because slowly things are changing, even at Concordia. Another message would be directed to those Concordians who perhaps, don't understand my objectives. I'm not trying to endorse my "lifestyle" or convince people

of it. Rather, I want to endorse a message of basic human respect. That is, gay people need to be treated fairly and get an equal amount of respect that say, some non-gay persons take for granted.

J: Anything else?

M: Yeah, tapioca is not your friend.

J: Thanks Scott, all the best.







I became interested in how the police solve crimes through forensic evidence sometime ago, and I decided to read up on the subject when I took <u>Deviance and Conformity</u>, and also <u>Criminology</u> classes. Nickell and Fischer have written an excellent book

CRIME SCIENCE METHODS OF FORENSIC DETECTION JOENICKELL AND JOHN F. FISCHER about the methods that crime labs use to solve crimes; the book is well written and has many excellent photographs and diagrams.

Chapters in the book include: a brief history of forensic science, a overview of how a modern crime laboratory is

set up, a complete chapter on crime-scene investigation, including documentation, and collection and preservation of evidence. There are other chapters on such interesting topics as firearms, finger printing, pathology and anthropology.

I found the whole book interesting, and excellent as a source book for anyone contemplating writing a essay about forensics or crime science.

<u>Crime Science Methods of Forensic Detection</u> is available at the Edmonton Public Library, or as a special order through any major book-seller.


CSI

An Open Letter to The Editor-In-Chief

I was distressed and, quite frankly, angered by your opinion piece on the Native Awareness Days held at Concordia on March 8th of this year. Native Awareness Days is a tradition at Concordia that has been going on since the beginning of the Aboriginal UCEP program many years ago. It is sponsored, organized and carried out by the students in the UCEP program and is important for many reasons. One is that Aboriginal students need to be reminded of their own culture, its beauty and dignity and their own heritage. It is important because frequently the dominant (white, Christian) society forgets about our First citizens and neglects to respect their contributions to our nation. Were it not for the Mohawks of the Iroquois Confederation, Canada, as we know it, would not be.

It is important because the UCEP students want to share themselves with the rest of the students and give an introduction to those of us who know little about their culture. It is especially important in this century as governments around the world struggle with National Sorry Days, Alternative Dispute Resolution and Reconciliation. Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Canada and the United States are but a few of the countries struggling with the long lasting, negative effects of internal colonization and government sponsored cultural genocide.

I was outraged to hear your whining complaints about the "rudeness" of our guests. Your ignorance about Native Awareness Days was surpassed only by your mis-information about it. Concordia does NOT make a cent from the celebration. I might point out that in the past five years the Aboriginal students in the UCEP program have been the only cultural group that has come here and always brought free food for a feast, giving others a taste of moose meat stew or elk stew and bannock. This year's contributions were delicious - many thanks to the cooks!

To think that a stranger would walk into the CSA office needing a space to practice her speech and would be treated with such rudeness is unforgivable. As a volunteer Student Representative for Concordia I was speechless to think that you, a paid representative of the student body, could treat a guest on our campus with such disrespect. As a Christian I am offended more than I can say that you would then put in print your biased, ill informed opinions in the Blue and White. I know that Christ would never treat anyone as you did. He taught us to turn the other cheek, walk the extra mile and basically treat one another with love and respect.

The first tenet of racism is ignorance-racists are the first to cry "foul" whenever they are accused of

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being what they are-they simply don't get it. The second is to de-humanize the "other" so that you do not need to treat them as you would others of your kind. James, you have heard from professors I'm sure that most people are more terrified of speaking in public than they are of death. And yet you did not see a fellow human being, a suffering, stranger on our campus in front of you, you saw a rude woman. Shame on you. The very least you could have done is call Val Lenz and tell her someone required assistance. What you should have done is find her a space or, heaven forbid, be generous enough to offer your office and assistance, while you went out to report on Native Awareness Days. Also James, why did you not lock the door of the CSA office after you were first bothered? Why in the world did you leave the door open for someone else to come in - and for you to then complain about?

A third tenet of racism is that of the immature notion that our experience (or our parent's experience and/or our family's experience) is the only experience we need in order to make an informed opinion. Therefore, you experienced two rude Aboriginal people and your article then suggests what? The tone of the article suggests to me that you believe that Aboriginal people are rude and we no longer need Native Awareness Day. We should keep Tegler for the tuition paying students. Your article, ignorance and lack of grace suggest that we will need Native Awareness Days for many years to come. James, I remember the first time I met you in the parking lot last year. My opinion of you was "what a man of integrity and courage", I hope your article was a momentary lack of good judgement (which all of us suffer from) and you will see how your opinions could be considered racist.

Native Awareness Day was enjoyed by many students. I was there most of the day, except when my presence was required in class, and I can tell you that Mrs. Elsie Potts McLean, the Elder who opened and closed the ceremonies with prayer, was a delightful lady who would have been very happy to meet you and talk with you. Julie Bull, the young comedian, was so very funny. She is only nineteen years old and it appears she may truly have a future in comedy. (Her older sister Crystal, is a graduate of the UCEP program, Concordia University College of Alberta, and is now in the After Degree Program at Goldbar. She will be a Public Health Worker). Amanda Woodward was stunning with her flute and her beautiful, gentle traditional storytelling. The children in their dancing costumes were delightful to watch. Some of our fellow students brought their children to witness the dancing and I had a guest from Peru who was de-

lighted with the food and entertainment. There was, of course, the traditional round dance at the end and the traditional give-away.

If yours was not a racist opinion and the noise and lack of parking was the true reason for your column, why did you not complain about Karaoke? That happens far more frequently than Native Awareness Days, and is very loud and distracting for professors and other students. It is the only thing I've ever heard of professors complaining about.

Dr. Gow was the only professor's name n your article and you said you were bothered during his class. I thought that might mean (since you claimed professors dislike the Native Awareness Day) that he was one of those professors. I spoke with Dr. Gow and he assured me that his experience was very positive, with many of the Aboriginal cooks and students asking him to come back for seconds for his meal. He professed to enjoy the day and was witness to the festivities whenever he was not required in the classroom.

Kudos and many thanks to the UCEP students who organized the event - extremely well organized this year I might add. Also, sincere apologies to those students and our other guests who might have been offended by your article and in particular by the

behaviour of one of our students. He felt some compulsion to interrupt a guest speaker, Mrs. Linda Hunter-Bull, who was nervous enough as it was without being rudely interrupted. This student's lack of respect for Mrs. Bull and his belligerent demeanor frightened some of the mothers who had brought their children to entertain us. I guarantee that the negativity of your article and the boorish behaviour of one student in no way represent the mission statement of Concordia, the beliefs of the administration, nor do they represent the entire student body.

In conclusion James I would add that I agree with your statement that we should have other culture days also. The UCEP students organized Native Awareness Day and I would thoroughly enjoy other cultural presentations by any other group of students here. As to any special consideration being given to Aboriginals I can only say that they are the only culture on our continent that our government systematically attempted to annihilate. Perhaps we should take that into consideration when we complain in the future.

Since this will be in the last Blue and White of the year, I look forward toyour response in the same issue.
