WELCOME AND HISTORY

The Board of Regents, students, faculty and staff of Concordia College extend a warm welcome to all who join us today for the conferring of degrees on the members of the fifth graduating class.

Concordia College was founded on October 31, 1921. Its original purpose was preparatory training of young men for the preaching and teaching ministries of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. Co-education, general courses of study and an accredited high school program were introduced in 1939. In 1967, the University of Alberta granted Concordia's request for affiliation at the first-year university level; second-year affiliation followed in 1975. On July 16, 1987, Concordia College became a degree-granting institution, offering three-year baccalaureate degrees in Arts and Science. The College was accepted into membership by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada on March 7, 1990.

Concordia's educational philosophy is based on the belief that the Christian faith gives purpose and direction to life and that successful living depends upon moral and spiritual maturity. The College fosters a Christian lifestyle on campus and encourages a dual commitment to academic excellence and religious vitality. Concordia welcomes all students interested in studying the liberal arts on a small college campus.

The College continues to offer an excellent matriculation high school and a continuing education program designed to meet needs of people in the community. Future goals include the addition of four-year degrees, a two-year Bachelor of Education after-degree, and the introduction of a Director of Parish Services program to train workers for service in congregations of Lutheran Church-Canada.

Concordia College is owned and operated by Lutheran Church-Canada and governed by an elected Board of Regents. The philosophy of the institution is expressed in its motto: "Initium Sapientiae Timor Domini — The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom."

ACADEMIC DRESS

The ACADEMIC GOWN dates back to the twelfth century. While originally it may have been worn as protection against the cold of unheated buildings, it has come to symbolize levels of academic scholarship with variations in sleeves and decorations representing degree levels.

The ACADEMIC CAP symbolizes the dignity and freedom of scholarship. The mortarboard (a square cap) represents a book. Tassel colors may vary according to the wearer's major area of study. Gold bullion tassels indicate doctor's degrees.

The ACADEMIC HOOD varies both in size and color. The colors of the silk lining of the hood are the colors of the institution granting the degree. The hoods of Concordia College are lined with blue and white, the school colors. The color of the velvet edging indicates the academic discipline in which the degree has been earned. The color for arts is white and the color for science is gold.

The GOLD CORD indicates a degree earned with distinction or with high distinction.

Degrees with Distinction: The notation "With Distinction" is inscribed on the permanent record of a candidate who obtains a grade point average between 7.5 and 8.4 in meeting the degree requirements of the program.

Degrees with High Distinction: The notation "With High Distinction" is inscribed on the permanent record of a candidate who obtains a grade point average of 8.5 or higher in meeting the degree requirements of the program.

THE CONVOCATION SPEAKER

Dr. Ronald E. George is President and Chief Executive Officer of ACTC Technologies Inc., Calgary, a custom software engineering spin-off company of the University of Calgary. He is also an adjunct professor of Management at the University of Calgary, and has previously served as Professor of Computing Science and Director of Academic Computing Services, SuperComputing Services, and the Advanced Computing Technology Centre at that institution. Prior to that, he was on the faculty of the University of Guelph, Ontario.

Dr. George received a Ph.D. in Management Sciences from the University of Waterloo, and is a Registered Professional Engineer. He has held consulting assignments in manufacturing, government, education, health, insurance, in the areas of feasibility studies, policy analysis, organization, project management, and specification of systems. Recent assignments have included organization and financing of super-computer projects for a major university and for the provincial government.

In 1990, Dr. George received the National Professional Achievement Award of the Canadian Information Processing Society, an organization in which he has held numerous executive positions.

He is a director and past Chairman of the Board of the Lutheran Life Insurance Society. The George family attends Foothills Lutheran Church in Calgary where Dr. George is Chairman of the Stewardship Committee and a choir member. He is currently Vice-Chairman of Foothills Lutheran Manor.

Dr. George holds Honorary Life Membership in the Canadian Hemophilia Society in recognition of his substantial work on behalf of people with hemophilia around the world. He was inducted into the Saskatchewan Sports Hall of Fame (shooting) in 1979.

THE CHRISTO ET ECCLESIAE AWARD

The 1992 Christo Et Ecclesiae Award acknowledges the many years of service and significant contributions to Christ and His Church of Carlene Helmcamp Rudnick.

Mrs. Rudnick attended Concordia College, St. Paul, Minnesota and graduated from Concordia Teachers College (now Concordia University), River Forest, Illinois. She received a Master of Music in Church Music from Northwestern University (1966), the Associate Diploma in Piano from the Royal Conservatory of Music and the Western Board of Music (1968), and a Master of Music in Piano Performance from the University of Minnesota (1985).

Following graduation from River Forest, Mrs. Rudnick was called to Concordia College, Edmonton to teach music and other subjects from 1960-1968. She then returned to her alma mater and taught on the music faculty of Concordia College, St. Paul from 1968-1987, attaining the rank of Associate Professor. For eight years she was editor of *Pipenotes*, a newsletter for the Twin Cities American Guild of Organists. The faculty of Concordia, St. Paul is awarding Mrs. Rudnick the Doctor of Letters degree at their commencement on May 30, 1992.

In 1987 Carlene returned to Edmonton when her husband, Milton, became president of Concordia Lutheran Seminary. Since that time she has served as Director of Music at the Seminary, has taught piano and organ part-time at Concordia College and privately, and has done some choral and instrumental composition for church use. She accompanies the Concordia College Community Chorus; presents music workshops in the Alberta-British Columbia District; serves as organist for services, hymn festivals, and recitals in various Lutheran congregations and at special events; assists with the A-BC District Worship Resource Centre; and is serving as project director for a collection of hymns by Lutheran Church-Canada members which the LC-C Board for Parish Services plans to publish. She is currently Music Chair for the International Women's Missionary League Convention to be held in Edmonton in 1993.
