



What is the Woo style? Woo offers filmgoers a cornucopia of genre cliches. There is 50's-style melodrama (heavily influenced by Douglas Sirk). It is mixed with the French New Wave (especially crime films like *Le Samurai*). To all this you combine a dose of Sam - *The Wild Bunch* — Peckinpah (particularly Peckinpah's predilection towards showing extreme graphic violence to comment on how bad extreme graphic violence, and the society that engenders it, can be). The result is a kind of action film that can be enjoyed on many levels, even by those who usually avoid action films. The only caveat is that viewers may have to suspend their disbelief when it comes to a Woo plot: coherence and reality have no place in a universe whose basis is strictly personal and moral.

You have a chance to witness the first successful example of the Woo style Monday, February 12, 2001. A Better Tomorrow will be screened at 7:15 p.m. in the Green Room in Tegler. The film is presented letter-boxed, in Cantonese with English Subtitles.

The film follows a high-level triad man on his last job before retiring; his brother has just graduated from the police academy so the gangster figures it's a good time to go straight. The last job goes sour and the gangster winds up in jail. His former partner is crippled seeking revenge for the betrayal that resulted in the jailing. The younger brother runs afoul of the same triad the gangster worked for. When the gangster tries to go straight after his release from prison, he finds it harder than he thought to achieve *A Better Tomorrow*.

The film stars Ti Ling, a chopsocky actor who deservedly copped the Best Actor prize at Hong Kong's version of the Oscars, Chow Yun Fat, who sprang to international notice with this role, and Leslie Chung, a pop star who proved he was a capable actor here. The film was rated Restricted Adult years ago, but would likely get an 18A rating with a violence warning today. The best news is the screening is free.

Cognitive Bias

"There is a grave disturbance in the Force." The dark-side is quick and easy, and sadly one of our fellow students has taken this path. This is the path of plagiarism. What does the word "Plagiarize" mean? "Plagiarize: to take (ideas, writings, etc.) from (another) and pass them off as one's own."

No matter what year you are presently working through, you have all heard the 'Plagiarism' speeches by professors. Therefore, no one has the excuse that they 'didn't know', no one.

Last semester, a student in Concordia was caught plagiarizing another's work. He admitted this to his professor and to some of his peers. This person is our student body president, Dave Brooks. Your mission, whether you choose to accept it or not, is as easy as 1-2-3:

- 1. Go to your video store and rent *Chicken Run*, the first feature length animated film from Aardman Animation, the makers of the *Wallace and Gromit* series and assorted state-of-the-art Claymation films.
- 2. Enjoy the movie: trust me, you will. Directors Nick Park and Peter Lord have an intuitive understanding of comedy and story; you will laugh no matter what your age and the plot is engaging in many respects. The Claymation Aardman produces is always beautiful to watch; it's so detailed. You will discover it's more than just a kid's film.
- 3. Rent the following to gain an appreciation for some of the references made in the film that older film buffs (like me) roar at.

The Great Escape is the granddaddy of WWII escape pictures. It has a huge international cast and should be on anyone's short list of the best action films of all time. There are countless references to this film in Chicken Run.

Stalag 17 offers more visual than plot and scene references. Director/writer Billy Wilder turns his usual jaundiced eye on what happens to the human in inhuman conditions.

The Colditz Story is a British film of the late 50s (and a TV series in the late 60s/early 70s). It set the standard for stiff-upper lipped prison escape films.

Tenko is a TV series from the 80s concerning prisoners in an all-female Japanese prisoner of war camp. I hear it's on video, but it may be hard to find. The Women's Network or Vision may still show it.

The Mackenzie Break is unique in that the POWs are Germans for a change. The other break with the genre is a peculiar blending with true crime/mystery elements as unorthodox former crime reporter Brian Keith (who's terrific, even if his accent wavers) struggles to get to the bottom of problems at this particular camp.

The Flight of the Phoenix is not a POW movie, but it feels like one. A group of men are stranded in the desert after a plane crash. Their only chance is to rebuild the aircraft using an as-yet untested experimental design featuring man-made power. See Chicken Run to see how this fits in.

Till next time, watch the screens and save some popcorn for me!








Street Hockey Tourney

El Salvador Fund Is Not In Vain

On January 13, 2001, an earthquake struck the small Central American country of El Salvador. The country has been in a state of destruction ever since. The CSA has put forth collection jars in order to help the people of El Salvador, and the students, staff, and faculty of Concordia have given more than expected. To date, the fund has reached \$950.00 and an anonymous donor here at Concordia has offered to match all donations above and beyond what has been collected up to a maximum of \$1000.00. Angela Edwards, the on-campus coordinator whose husband and son were in El Salvador at the time of the earthquake, stated that the efforts of the fund are completely free from the Administrative costs and 100% of the donations are given to Colonia I.V.U. This is an area where over 20 apartment buildings were destroyed and hundreds of people have little or no shelter. In order to convince any who doubt the efforts of the fund or the reason it was set up, here are some facts about El Salvador and the earthquake:

- -There are still over 1000 bodies buried in the land slides following the earthquake.
- -The total left homeless in El Salvador is over 580,000.
- -A wait in line ups for 5 hours will get a person a glass of water.
- -Seven hours in a Red Cross line will get 2 tents for one community.
- -The area of Colonia I.V.U. has over 600 residents, most of whom are living in lean-tos in parking lots.

Aftershocks continue to shake the area which is unstable. The living conditions for those in El Salvador are beyond anything most of us could imagine as we sit in our houses with our warmth and food. One question repeatedly comes up in discussion when the Fund is discussed: Why? Why help those in a third world nation thousands of miles away? Perhaps the question should be "Why not"? Have we become so self-seeking, greedy, and passive to what happens in the world that we can turn a blind eye to those who are in dire need of basics such as water and food? Maybe it is time to set up a fund of this type permanently, so that the students of Concordia can set an example and make a difference when disaster hits communities like that near the Red River in Manitoba or like that of Colonia I.V.U. in El Salvador. The fact of the matter, is that we all attend a Christian based institution and giving is something that we do because we know it is right.




