The "Red Tape" of any institution is often hard to beat. I have fought many people and usually win. Here's a couple of hints when having problems dealing with the almighty people and office. Recently, I was unable to pay my second half tuition or any of my other monthly bills. Instead of working, I thought I would get a student loan. This is an option taken by many. However, Concordia would only sign the loan if they received my full tuition from the loan. Let's do the math, \$3000 loan minus \$2400 equals \$600. It doesn't take a genius to figure that \$600 won't last me too long. Time to question policy. After all, I was hoping MY student loan could be used by ME. I complained and my complaint went unheard. I was told to get the loan minus the full tuition. I simply refused to get the loan. I counteracted Concordia's policy was to take full tuition from loans with my own policy to not get loans unless I received most of the money. Eventually we worked out a deal in which they take \$1000 and I gave them a visa slip for the end of March, hoping my tax returns will cover that in April. Always question policy as people make policy.

Another problem that I recently settled was trying to get my damage deposit back from a landlord. I had no lease and pulled out in four months. He then refused to give me back my damage deposit. To solve this, I visited the Landlord and Tenants office downtown. Best to learn my rights first. Then I stopped in at the U of A legal assistance office. Neither costs any money and you can get great advice on all kinds of legal problems. I knew my rights and filed in small claims court in Fort Saskatchewan because there was less of a chance he would respond to the Fort court. This case, although a city matter, can be tried in any provincial court. If he had wanted the case moved, it would have been. Needless to say, I won. I then proceeded to collect not only the damage deposit, but also a cool \$200 for my 'expenses'. If you ever have problems in rental disputes, know your rights. These landlords often prey on students. They may offer low deposits, knowing that few will sue, if they keep it. The fact is that courts work in renter's favor. If you need a hand, stop by the CSA Blue and White and they will direct you to me. I can provide assistance, as I am well versed.

Everyone realizes that they can ask for discounts, use coupons, and haggle for good deals. However, few people actually do. My best haggling is with a speeding ticket. I was traveling at about 145 km/h, a mere 45 km over the limit. As I started to slow down, I police car passed me. Needless to say he turned around and started to pursue. I quickly pulled over, turned on my hazards and interior light, and gave him my information before he asked for it. He claimed he only caught me at 131 km. With no other alternative I asked him for a written or verbal warning. He refused. I told him that a ticket would hurt my insurance, and then asked "How about a students discount". He laughed and said he'll see what he can do. He also appreciated my honesty when I told him that he must have radared me when I was slowing down. The ticket was issued for \$57 (only 15 km over). If I had a coupon I would have used it. Always ask for discounts.

Hope these hints help you in your fight. Remember to challenge policy, know your rights, use free help and discount stuff, and always be polite.

10 Tips For Successful Public Speaking

Feeling some nervousness before giving a speech is natural and healthy. It shows that you care about doing well. But, too much nervousness can be detrimental. Here's how you can control your nervousness and make an effective, memorable presentations:

1. Know the room. Be familiar with the place in which you will speak. Arrive early, walk around the speaking area and practice using the microphone and any visual aids.

2. Know the audience. Greet some of the audience as they arrive. It's easier to speak to a group of friends than to a group of strangers.

3. Know your material. If you're not familiar with your material or are uncomfortable with it, your nervousness will increase. Practice your speech and revise it if necessary.

4. Relax. Ease tension by doing exercises.

5. Visualize yourself giving your speech. Imagine yourself speaking, your voice loud, clear, and assured. When you visualize yourself as successful, you will be successful.

6. Realize that people want you to succeed. Audiences want you to be interesting, stimulating, informative, and entertaining. They don't want you to fail. Speaker"

7. Don't apologize. If you mention your nervousness or apologize for any problems you think you have with your speech, you may be calling the audience's attention to something they hadn't noticed. Keep silent.

8. Concentrate on the message — not the medium. Focus your attention away from your own anxieties, and outwardly toward your message and your audience. Your nervousness will dissipate.

9. Turn nervousness into positive energy. Harness your nervous energy and transform it into vitality and enthusiasm.

10. Gain experience. Experience builds confidence, which is the key to effective speaking. Be bold. Practice can provide the experience you need.

Next Time, prepare to learn how to write a good speech.
