Thunder Makes Waves in 2000/2001

Last year the Edmonton Journal wrote an article entitled "Clapless Thunder" in regards to Concordia Athletics. Well, I am proud to say that they are "clapless" no more. This year the athletic teams put that argument to rest with a dominating year in the ACAC. Every team did their bit to contribute and, boy, was it a fun ride.

The year started with the much-hyped soccer teams who decided to set the goals high and they delivered. Lead by the 1999/2000 ACAC Coach of the Year, Diane Brennan, the women's soccer team finished second in the north and gave Mount Royal College, eventual ACAC champs, an epic battle in the conference semi-finals. Both Lesley Brennan and Samara Smith were named to the all-conference team and all the girls played their hearts out. The men's team decided that Vancouver would be the place to be in November and didn't let any ACAC competition stand in their way. They were disappointed with a late season loss to NAIT, which ruined their undefeated season, but took that frustration out on Lethbridge in the semi-finals. The road to Vancouver was almost blocked when Mount Royal took the boys to overtime, but they would not be denied. With ACAC all-conference team members Sinisa Matic, Serge Maione, John Pino, John Westergaard, and Josh Little ready to take nationals by storm, Concordia anxiously awaited the school's first National Championship banner. Unfortunately, after some suspect officiating in their first game against the favoured host team, the boy's hopes of returning with their banner were dashed.

The hockey team had a very up and down year but it still was one of the finest performances ever for Thunder Hockey. While they did not finish at the top of the standings, they still managed to grow and get into the playoffs. Concordia had many positives this season including wins over Mount Royal, SAIT, and Red Deer, which shows they will be a force to reckon with next season. The boys also need to be commended for overcoming the loss of a teammate and the wife of a coach and moving on to complete their season. The awards have also been there for the boys this year. Tate Locke became the all-time leader in ACAC scoring and will likely hold this record for many years. Recently, defenceman Oliver McGee was named to the all-conference second team and coach Jim MacLean was named coach of the year for his patience and determination to see the team get better as the year went on.

The Basketball program continued to grow by leaps and bounds in its second year and will be looked upon to make a run in the playoffs next year. The women's team only posted two wins, but they were the first two wins in the history of the program. With the return of players like Becky Kleinman, Rachel Vachon, and

Shawna Siemans they will take a shot a being in the playoffs next year. The men's team came out of nowhere this year to contend for a playoff spot from the beginning. Injuries may have been the ultimate downfall of this team as Darren Graham, who was once again named to the ACAC all-conference team, missed several games with injury this year. The boys pulled off a big upset late in the year defeating NAIT



when the playoffs were on the line but it was too late. Guard Chris Wilson promises that next year the team will make the playoffs and make other teams look hard at Concordia as a threat. The growth of the team is the reason Chris Nicol was named ACAC coach of the year.

Even though the "smaller" teams get little coverage in the paper or around school, they all had fantastic seasons. Badminton finished fifth in the league, Golf won the consolation event, and curling qualified for the ACAC finals. The crowning achievement for the Thunder Athletics Teams may come as I am writing this article: Lindy Van Riper is competing at Nationals for Badminton. Thunder pride has run rampant through Concordia this year and the athletes deserve to be thanked for giving us this pride. On behalf of the students: Thank you for all the time and effort you, the student athletes and coaches, put into representing Concordia with the pride and dignity that you do. You athletes have helped to make my final year here at Concordia memorable and I hope that you all continue to be blessed with the talent and fight that has gotten you this far.

Students Voice Concerns At All Candidates Meeting

Students of Concordia met with the candidates from the riding of Edmonton Highlands on March 1 to voice concerns over matters of importance to them. The three candidates consisted of Brian Mason of the New Democrats, Robert Bilida of the Progressive Conservatives, and Kim Cassady of the Liberal Party. Each of the three gentlemen had opportunity to give their par-



ty's platforms for the upcoming provincial election and also gave the students an opportunity to ask questions. While the majority of students' concerns were related to funding for Post-Secondary education, matters of healthcare and primary education also arose allowing the candidates a chance to see that all of these issues are of universal concern. Robert Bilida of the Progressive Conservative Party appeared to bear the brunt of students' frustration because of his party's policies. This showed itself clearly when Charles Allen, a student at Concordia, asked Mr. Bilida how it was that he felt he could represent his constituents when he represented a party that pushed Bill 11 through even though there was a loud outcry from the people of Alberta. This question along with the others proved to the candidates that even a small group of people, such as that at Concordia, have opinions on government and want those opinions heard. The event, which was organized by Erin Payne and monitored by Dr. Smythe, was excellent. Due to the scheduling of some of the candidates the meeting could only go for an hour much to the dismay of those students who did not get a chance to ask their questions. The majority of students who attended felt the meeting was an event which allowed them a chance to voice their opinions; hopefully, it showed the candidates that students comprise a force that wants to be heard.

EMPLOYERS STILL PLAN AGGRESSIVE RECRUITING

An undiminished demand for new employees will continue across Canada for the second consecutive quarter according to the Employment Outlook Survey conducted by Manpower Inc., global provider of staffing solutions. Of the 1,700 plus companies interviewed, 33% said they intend to increase employment in the upcoming second quarter, 7% plan decreases, 56% will remain at the present level and 4% are uncertain. The net hiring strength (increases minus decreases) matches that of the like period of last year, when 30% expected increases, 4% anticipated decreases, 60% foresaw no change and 6% were undecided. Present totals are seasonally higher than those of three months ago, which also matched the results of the year-earlier quarter.

"There appears to be no erosion from the very solid picture of the past three years," said Tammy Johns, Chair of Canadian Operations for Manpower Inc. "The need for new workers remains very great. Openings in the period ahead will lie in different fields than those of the year's beginning months. The greatest activity will follow seasonal patterns with the Construction industry as most optimistic," she said. Mining, Service, Retail Trades and Wholesale firms are also among the leaders.

A significant decline year-on-year is ahead in the important Durable Goods Manufacturing sector.

Geographically, towns on both coasts are most optimistic as the Maritime and Western provinces appear active, but a renewed vigour seen three months ago among the nation's largest cities now seems to have weakened.

By industry:

MINING: As this sector approaches its active hiring season, plans exceed the

like quarter of the past three years as 50% seek additional workers and 9%

expect decreases.

CONSTRUCTION: The industry expresses hiring intentions well beyond those of second quarters of 2000 and 1999 with 49% gearing up for further recruiting and 6% trimming down.

DURABLE GOODS MANUFACTURING: Anticipated hiring will decline precipitously from levels of the past four years. While 28% say they will add staff, a high13% forecast decreases.

NON-DURABLE GOODS MANUFACTURING: Not since 1985 has a second quarter been more optimistic as 30% report plans for em-

ployment increases and just 5% anticipate cutbacks.

TRANSPORTATION & PUBLIC UTILITIES: The seasonally high level of demand expressed three months ago continues as 33% continue to seek employees and 9% indicate reductions.

WHOLESALE & RETAIL TRADES: Since 1989, only the outlook of one year ago was brighter at this season than the present 36% increasing staff and 7% planning declines.

FINANCE, INSURANCE & REAL ESTATE: While more positive than those of last year, present intentions are nonetheless below those of 1998-99. At present 26% say they will increase the employment rolls and 5% will trim down.

EDUCATION - PUBLIC & PRIVATE: The need for additional people has been consistently high for two years and the current situation is no exception with 23% continuing to hire and 5% cutting back.

SERVICES: For the second consecutive quarter, hiring intentions surpass those of the like period of the prior year as 35% continue to search for additional people and 6% say they will correct an overstaffed condition.

PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION: Present needs fall below those of the same quarters of the past three years. Now 30% will continue efforts to fill government jobs, while 8% plan layoffs.

The quarterly Employment Outlook Survey is conducted as a service by Manpower Inc., global provider of workforce management services and solutions, with 52 locations in Canada and 3,600 offices in 54 countries.

Concordia and the other universities and university colleges along with Alberta Learning are conducting a survey of all the students who are eligible to graduate in 2000-2001.

The survey will help Concordia by telling us how successful we have been in enabling you to achieve your educational goals. At the same time, the survey will also give information about the level of satisfaction of graduating students across the province. Alberta Learning will take the survey results into account in the Key Performance Indicators (KPIs). The KPIs are used by the province as a basis for determining part of the funding for each university and university college. In addition, the information on how you have financed your university education will help Alberta Learning with student finance policy.

By participating in the survey, you will help Concordia as well as Alberta Learning and the whole system of universities and university colleges across the province.

Your participation in the survey is voluntary, and any information you provide will be kept completely confidential. To ensure confidentiality, an independent research agency, the Population Research Laboratory, has been contracted to do the survey. When the Population Research Laboratory summarizes the results, only group averages will be calculated, and no individuals will be identified. Concordia and Alberta Learning will receive only aggregate data, stripped of all personal identifying information.

When this survey was done 2 years ago, in the spring of 1999, Concordia had the highest response rate in the province—that means our results were very reliable.

When you get a call from the Population Research Laboratory, please take twelve minutes to reply to the survey. It will help Concordia and it will help future students.
