In Opposition to the Muzzle

I would like to appeal to the Arab students at our school to deeply consider the implications in supporting a policy of censorship. There is little debate as to the nature of the article in question, which was highly insensitive and plainly racist. I make no apologies for the contents of the article - which I find reprehensible - but I would like to emphasise how important the issue of free speech is. The price of free speech is putting up with nonsense on occasion. There will always be narrow-minded people out there who will want to voice their bigoted views. But silencing them is not the correct solution. By silencing these people, we set a very dangerous precedent for ourselves.

I would like to point to a recent example involving the United States and Israel at the last UN Conference on Racism, in which both nations refused to allow criticism with regards to their racist policy towards the Palestinian people. Both nations walked out of the conference, effectively ending any muchneeded, meaningful discussion of this issue on the grounds that such talk was "anti-Israel" in nature, thereby allowing them to avoid any serious scrutiny

on the world stage. In a sickeningly ironic manner, the Americans and Israeli appealed to the need for blocking "racist dialogue" as a means of derailing discussion on racism itself! *Racism* is clearly immoral and dangerous, but *the restriction of free expression* is even more so, particularly since (as demonstrated at the UN conference) the latter can be very easily used to support the former!

Those of us who oppose racism are morally and politically in the right. As such, we need not fear words we know are wrong from the misguided, the evil and the ignorant. I would rather the racists among us identify themselves by their words so that we know who they are, as opposed to allowing their hate to fester in private to dangerous extremes. I would rather have the opportunity to expose their ideas as the groundless superstitions they are. And I would *much* rather prevent their moral shortcomings from becoming an excuse for the enemies of free speech to impose their subjective interpretation of what is acceptable on the rest of us.

Modern Gladiators

Recently I started watching a television show that pits one competitor against another in a battle to the death. The arena that these warriors fight in is rigged for the maximum amount of pain, as it is edged with spikes, and there are high-speed saws that can easily sever limbs. So, what is this program, a new kind of foreign game show? A new Fox network quiz show? NO! The show is Battlebots!

Battlebots can be seen on the

Comedy Network, Friday nights at 9:30, and on Discovery channel Saturday nights.

(www.battlebots.com) The "robots" are actually remote controlled by human drivers on the sidelines, so are not autonomous. The Battlebots take on different shapes and forms, from wedge shaped, to saws with wheels attached. And like other sporting competitions, there are different weight categories, which range

from lightweight (25-60 lbs.), to super heavyweight (220-340 lbs.) divisions.

The robots fight against one another in an arena that is surrounded by 20-foot sheets of Lexan. Lexan is a super tough plastic that can be made to be bullet resistant in certain thicknesses. The Lexan is necessary to protect the audience, as many times during the fight pieces are flung off robots at high speeds. To demonstrate the power and lethality of some of these robots, a spinning robot was allowed to gather full speed (several hundred revolutions per minute) in a an empty parking lot, and when a bowling ball was rolled towards it, the bowling ball exploded on impact! The robots use different weapons to combat each other. Some robots use their wedge shape to ram into opponents and tip them over; others use crushing pincer devices to destroy opponents. The

ultimate goal of Battlebots is to advance to the finals without being destroyed, and the trophy that the competitors vie for is a giant golden nut.

There are two other robot combat shows, Robotica, on TLC, and Robot Wars, televised on TNN. I still find Battlebots the most interesting of the three. Battlebots is one of those mindless television shows that are relaxing to watch after studying all week. Besides, how many other shows allow opponents to square off in a real-life fight to the death?

In Defence of the Muzzle

It gave me great pleasure to see that the guardians of virtue at Concordia College have acted to temper the contents of the outrageously deviant school newspaper. Otherwise we would have to deal with that troublesome document, composed by bleeding-heart libertines, the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, which states that "everyone has the following fundamental freedoms... freedom of thought, belief, opinion and expression, including freedom of the press and other media of

communication". It is comforting to belong to an institution with the willingness to banish these foolish notions from its domain - our superiors know what is right and what is acceptable, and that is all that matters.

Those with a higher moral awareness than the rest of us have also been able to use this event to further more important goals, and shall now endeavour to eradicate our school newspaper of all sin. As you may be aware, the Blue and White "will now be editing all blasphemy." I only hope that we will be kept updated as to what exactly the current version of "blasphemy" happens to be, issue to issue. This is a good precaution to be sure, for the last thing we need in an institution of higher learning is to risk inviting some modern-day Galileo to challenge our perfectly accurate notions of what is right and true. Certainly, any such deviants will also have to endure our newly adopted ritual in being made to publicly recant their unacceptable statements.

Now, if I were an intelligent man (which I am not, for I have others to think for me), I might not be so frightened by the words of others. In fact, I might even welcome moronic, ignorant, insensitive, racist articles like "Arabic Berlitz" simply because, as Woodrow Wilson put it, "if a man is a fool the best thing to do is to encourage him to advertise the fact by speaking." All of these despots have appealed to some skilfully crafted rationalization as to how their brand of tyranny was not really a transgression against individual freedom, or even that freedom of speech is really a bad thing - "a bourgeois prejudice" in the words of Lenin. Noam Chomsky (among others) cuts through such sophistic fog, maintaining that "if we don't believe in freedom of expression for those we despise, we don't believe in it at all."

But why believe in free expression? Why risk tarnishing the image of one's ideology, party, nation, school, etc. by allowing people the right to express a thought, rant or idiotic joke that one group or another may (quite rightly) find offensive? The argument has been put forth that words are powerful, and indeed they are. It was Josef Stalin who once said: "Ideas are more powerful than guns. We would not let our enemies have guns. Why should we let them have ideas?"

For one more clever than myself, the answer would be simple: by suppressing speech you consider wrong, or even evil, you immediately lower yourself to a position beneath those you attempt to silence. And while Stalin plainly didn't care about smashing individual freedom to defend his moralistic version of the truth, perhaps we might consider altering our own course. So lacking an argument of my own, I will lean on the words of one such intelligent man, known as Voltaire, who once wrote: "I disapprove of what you say, but I defend to the death your right to say it."

January 14, 2002 Christopher Ducharme



Library Fines:

"Library fines" those dreaded words that can induce anguish, confusion, and stress upon a student already strapped because of the high cost of survival in academia.

To clarify the mystery on how these fines can unintentionally accumulate and to increase your awareness on how to avoid acquiring them, it is hoped that the following will unveil some of the answers to your questions.

How library fines are calculated

Library fines are calculated as follows:

Overdue books belonging to Concordia: \$1.00 per item per day (plus one day grace period)

Overdue books belonging to other libraries: \$1.00 per item

How to Avoid Them

per day

Reserve materials \$.50 per item per hour

Long-overdue books: replacement cost plus processing fee

(usually

\$80.00 per item and up)

note: payment

for lost books must be made at the owning library

How and where library fines can be paid

Fines (including fines for overdue materials belonging to other libraries) can be paid at Concordia's Circulation Desk by cash or cheque. If you wish to pay by Interac or credit card, pay at Student Accounts and bring the receipt to the library's Circulation Desk.

Consequences of unpaid library fines

Marks, transcripts and diplomas are withheld when outstanding fines or overdues are owing to any NEOS library. Borrowing privileges are suspended when \$50.00 or more in fines are owing and/or books are long overdue.

How to AVOID LIBRARY FINES

Some suggestions on how to keep track of your library materials and due date:

Bring your student I.D. card to the Circulation Desk and ask for a list

Use Borrower Information in the NEOS libraries' Catalogue; your I.D. number is the barcode number on your student I.D. card;


your PIN number is the last 4 digits of your student I.D. number (if you have internet access at home, telnet to dra.library.ualberta.ca and input the user name Concordia or GATE; you don't need a password)

Tips for renewing materials:

You only need your student I.D. card; you don't have to bring the books in

You can renew before the due date; if there is a request for your book, you will not be able to renew it, but if you renew a bit early, you'll have a little time to finish your work with the item before passing it on to someone else

You can renew either at the Circulation Desk or using Borrower Information in the NEOS Libraries catalogue. If you borrow onsite at another library, using Borrower Information - see instruction on user name, password, and telnet above (the U. of A., for example, allows 4 renewals for these items, but you have to use Borrower Information or it doesn't work). If you borrow materials belonging to other libraries from Concordia, you can only renew at the Circulation Desk.
