

A Response To Transit Fees



In the last issue of the Blue and White, I read the article by Dave Brooks entitled Edmonton Transit New Rates. This concerns city council's proposal for mandatory transit fees to be added to tuition. Although I agree with the concept, I strongly disagree with the term 'mandatory.' Yes, if more students take the bus it would alleviate parking problems. However, as a mother of two with a part-time job, with a husband who works full time, and a home in a neighbourhood with one bus route in and out, using the transit system is not only more inconvenient, but it would cost me much more than the \$88 per year that would be added to my tuition. For example, to get to my 9 am class I would have to leave my home at 7:05am, take two buses to drop my youngest off at daycare, wait for the next bus, and then take two more buses to get to school. Since my husband works out of town eight months of the year, I would have to pay for out of school care for my other daughter. After classes, I would need to ride two buses to pick up my daughter, wait for the next bus, and then take those last two buses to get home. I would then have to pay for out of school care for my eldest daughter. The cost of this additional childcare would be close to \$2500 for the year, not to mention I would be wasting four very valuable hours a day riding around the city on a bus. Any parent would agree with me that using the bus is not the most practical approach to going back to school. Now, if city council proposed voluntary transit fees, I would completely support the idea, but I would not be buying a bus pass anytime soon. Bring on the referendum!

PENNILESS


Dear SheSaid_HeSaid,

The Pain of "Back" to School

Ever since the upswing of the fall term, I have been going home every day and taking my three caplets of Entrophen because of the pain in my back. At first I thought it was my body telling me that thirty years of hard living were catching up to me, but then I heard other

students, who are younger than myself, complaining of the same problem. Now we all know that our textbooks are not just heavy on the wallet, they are also heavy on our backs. On an average day, my own backpack weighs roughly 35 pounds or about the same as my five year old son. I decided to do a little research into this "student phenomenon" by consulting a chiropractor for some professional advice.

The standard backpack can free up your hands for packing coffee and a muffin, but what about when you sling them over your shoulder? And what about those trendy little book bags people wear that rest on their hips? Dr. Anders Anderson, a local chiropractor, offered up some advice for students: "The best kind of book bag would be a back pack. And this should be worn on both shoulders so that the weight can be distributed evenly. There should be no more weight in the pack than the person could carry to allow himself to stand straight without hunching over. Wearing the pack on one shoulder puts

an uneven bio-mechanical stress into the body and will create problems in one's back. It may also cause a medical syndrome called a "heavy purse syndrome" resulting in numbness, tingling, and stiffness in the neck. This is primarily due to compression of the brachial plexus a nerve network running onto to the shoulder. Medicines only serve to mask the problem; stretching and seeing a chiropractor to insure that the structure of your back is correct are the best solutions." Dr. Anderson also went on to remind me that, "anytime that we abuse our bodies long enough we may end up causing a permanent injury. Most times though, with proper care and paying attention to what we do, we can go along way to healing that injury."

So for all of you students out there aching and hurting from that weight on your back, I hope this advice helps more than the Tylenol or the Aspirin you are choking back after a really long day.

On ACTISEC

Instead of my usual article on the state of affairs at Concordia, I have decided to share with you a student's perspective on ACTISEC. The following article was written by Michelle Mark, the story editor for SAIT's student newspaper. I think it will give you a better perspective on ACTISEC from a student's point of view than I myself could give you.

Anyone interested in paving the way for the future of college students around Alberta – help is here. You just don't know it yet. At the final senate meeting of last April, SAITSA made the move to rejoin the Alberta College and Technical Institute Students' Executive Council (ACTISEC) – a province-wide student group devoted to lobbying on behalf of student issues such as tuition increases, additional scholarship money and published instructor evaluations. The move was made after previous SAITSA executives withdrew their membership from the group because of what they considered too much of a financial commitment. But because rejoining the group was done on a trial basis, SAITSA receives its membership at half-price. Membership to ACTISEC only costs 83 cents per full-load student for the trial year. That's a small price to pay for giving students a voice in meetings with government committees – where it counts, especially at a time when the standard excuse for apathy is that students feel they don't have the strength in numbers needed to make an impact. Well, with ACTISEC representing over 40,000 students in this province, strength in numbers is something we no longer have to worry about. By joining ACTISEC, SAITSA teams up with 13 other Alberta college students' associations including those of ACAD and Mount Royal, Grant MacEwan, Lakeland and Red Deer colleges. Now that we have the added representation we need, what are we going to do with it? It's up to students to go to their students councilors with their concerns. When those concerns affect Alberta students as a whole - it's up to the students' executive council to take those concerns to ACTISEC.

Tuition being increased across Alberta to the maximum allowable amount as the quality of education declines is just one of the problems that students don't have to take lying down. Now that Fall Fling has flung, and students are settling into another year at SAIT – think about how much your education matters. If it wasn't important, you couldn't have spent all that time and money to get here in expectation of the best quality and service money can buy. Sounds to me like its something worth fighting for. And as ACTISEC says in their vision statement: They're trying to achieve a society in which the individual pursuit of knowledge has no limitations.

Would you settle for anything less?

(Note: We have become full members unlike SAIT and pay 1.67 per student to ACTISEC; also, King's college in Edmonton has joined ACTISEC since this article was written, bringing the number of participating colleges to 14.)

Phillip Lovecraft holds out against the trend of sorcery. Because he eschews magic he gets dragged into a plot to recover the fabled Neconomicron and open a portal for a stack of demons. This one's cheerfully silly; Fred Ward as Lovecraft and David Warner as (what else) the bad guy fit their roles like gloves and this does have a lot of fun with the world filled with magic premise. The sequel Witch Hunt features Dennis Hopper as Lovecraft and Eric Bogosian as a Sen. McCarthy-esque crusader against the taint of witchery in America.

Monsters

Tremors A sharply written and acted delight pits a group of Southern States stereotypes against a bunch of huge, ravenous worms. You'll jump, you'll laugh, you'll wish you were in a drive-in. Avoid the sequels. See it on DVD to hear the rumble. There is some PG-13 violence, but this is at heart a 50's giant critter movie.

Godzilla Vs. Destroyah This is the second series ender (this is the series that started with what many of you know as that execrable hatchet job Godzilla 1985). Must Own Albums Part I

With the dawn of the new millennium came an overabundance of "Best of..." lists. Every writer for every media source came up with their own list of what was seminal within the annals of human history. So here are my picks for albums that I feel any record collection is incomplete without.



Good Riddance-For God and Country (Fat Wreck Chords)

I first heard "United Cigar" on the original Fat Wreck Chords compilation and I immediately liked what I heard, but it was not until I got this album that I was blown away by what has now be-

come Fat's most popular band.

The lyrics are politically charged and full of insight, yelled with sincerity, and a beautifully gruff voice that demands you pay attention. The driving guitar-work is interesting and layered without lapsing into the realm of cock-rock wanking and the drums keep it all together with a pounding beat accented with wicked fills. For God and Country has the perfect mix of upbeat anthems and mid-tempo rockers with a few breakdowns thrown in for good measure. As much as I love this album, I have to admit that I do not like anything else they have released since and, in fact, I do not own any other albums of theirs. Despite this, I still go see Good Riddance every time they come to town because their live show more closely resembles their work on this album than anything else they have released. If you already own this album, you know what I am talking about; if you do not own this record...what are you waiting for?



George Michael-Listen Without Prejudice Volume One (Columbia Records)

As half of the creative force behind Wham! George Michael proved he has what it takes to be a pop superstar...the looks. He also has what every other male pop vocalist lacks, an incredible

voice with impressive range and a talent for writing emotionally evocative songs that bare the soul.

In 1987, George Michael decided to walk away from the success of Wham! and the adoration of teenage girls everywhere (who needs 'em) for obvious reasons: the deterioration of his relationship with the other half of the group, Andrew Ridgely, and his desire to escape the confines of a collaborative project and stretch his artistic wings. With the release of his first solo album, Faith, Michael proved that he could still write the hits with the ballad "Father Figure" and the more rocking "Faith," as well as leaning towards previously untapped genres with the bass-heavy dance hits "I Want Your Sex" and "Monkey." However, it was his lounge-crooning style on the album's most personal track, "Kissing a Fool," which foreshadowed his turn towards introspection on his seminal work, Listen Without Prejudice.

The three years between the release of Faith and Listen

Without Prejudice were witness to a bitter legal battle between Michael and Columbia Records. The bones of contention were artistic freedom and pressure from the label to produce a "hit." When the single "Freedom 90" was released, the public was surprised to see the video, Faith, laden with supermodels, (Cindy Crawford, Naomi Campbell, Linda Evangelista, Christy Turlington) images of exploding props, and an absence of the artist himself. This signified the shedding of his pop-superstar image. A press release announced that George Michael would not release another single, appear in any videos, nor record again until he was freed from his contract with Columbia. Basically, George Michael was willing to commit career suicide in order to ensure complete control over his music. The fact that he was able to release an album as amazing as Listen Without Prejudice during all this turmoil is incredible. Michael's decision to promote this album only as much as he was forced to under contract is a shame because it means too few people have heard what is, without a doubt, the best pop album of the past decade and, in my opinion, of all time.

Michael's vocals get pushed to ridiculous extremes on this record, spanning the gamut from high and wispy to low and sultry. He plays almost every instrument on this album including guitars, bass, keyboards, and percussion. Lyrically, he is at his best writing about more personal subjects such as his popstar image and his decision to scrap it in "Freedom 90" or his relationships and break-ups in "Something to Save" and "Waiting for That Day." He also handles social commentary without lapsing into a preaching stance. His anti-war view is particularly subtle in "Mother's Pride" as is his take on society's lack of faith in "Praying for Time." A pop artist with emotional depth, what a novelty!

I implore everyone to give *Listen Without Prejudice* a spin on your stereo. Even if you are not a pop music fan, I think you will appreciate the quality of this record as long as you follow the title's suggestion.


