

MEET YOUR SOY

Following up on my last article, I would like to thank all of you who read it with the assumption that you would read my following one, which you are now reading...

I would like to first tell you some interesting facts that I found this week. As well, I promised I would try to provide a little help for you aspiring vegetarians! Looking around for more info on animals' rights and such, I came upon these disturbing facts that might hit you environmentalists out there as well. How does eating meat harm the planet?

Producing a single hamburger uses enough fossil fuel to drive a small car 27 miles and enough water for 17 long hot showers.

It takes 25 000 gallons of water to create a pound of meat.

A typical pig factory farm generates the amount of raw waste of that of a city of 12 000 people

We are losing rain forests as fast as 125 000 square miles per year to clear room to raise cattle.

On one acre of land, 20000 pounds of potatoes can be cultivated, but on that same land only 165 pounds of beef can be raised.

I am not trying to force anything on anyone, I am just writing to inform my fellow students about the world around them. I feel that our global destruction is something we all should be aware about if we plan on living here a little longer. Anyways, here are a few tippers for you fellow aspiring vegetarians. Use these things instead of....

Eggs: Use commercial egg replacers in baked goods. For breakfast, scramble tofu with onions, mushrooms, mustard, turmeric, and soy sauce.

Jello: Look for agar-agar (made without boiling cows' hooves and pigs' skin), or try Hain's Super Fruits, a vegan gelatin that comes in four fruit flavors.

Ice Cream: Try frozen desserts like Tofutti, Soy Delicious, fruit sorbets, and ices.

Cheese: Check health food stores for soy cheese, which is great on pizza and sandwiches, as well as in sauces.

Milk: Try chocolate, vanilla, and plain soy milk, rice milk, and almond milk. Excellent for cooking, on cereal, in coffee and hot chocolate—use them any way you'd use milk.

Hamburger: There is a wide variety of vegetarian hamburgers. For "hamburger meat" as an ingredient, substitute crumbled veggie burgers in recipes for chili, "meat loaf," and tacos.

INFORMATION ON THE UPASS

Do you take ETS to school? Are you tired of paying \$54 a month for a pass? Do you only use your bus pass half the time? If the answer is yes, then this will interest you.

Recently, the students at the U of A held a referendum to receive from ETS a subsidized TERM bus pass. This bus pass will have all the privileges of a regular adult pass, but will cover four months in a term. ETS calculated that a term bus pass could be given to students at a rate of \$120 per term. That is a lot better than close to \$60 a month.

Information about the UPass program is available on the ETS website, www.takeETS.com. The UPass program has been successful at other post-

secondary schools across Canada. In order to implement it here at Concordia, an agreement would be forged between ETS and the Concordia Student Association. A referendum would be held in order to determine whether or not the students would accept the program. Now, the U of A is going to offer this pass at \$60 per term to their students. However, to keep this price, they have to subsidize the ETS estimate. It has been calculated that in order to offer this subsidized cost, the SU at the U of A will have to acquire \$3 million a year through fundraising and sponsorship. Personally, even the \$120 estimate looks better than the \$216 I already pay per term for bus passes. I have taken the liberty to inform the CSA President (Scott Lyons as of May) of this program. If you are interested, please contact a Student Representative for more information.

Breaking Down the Walls of Chapel

Spending time within the halls of higher education can be a daunting task for most people. Whether you are there to learn or work, sometimes you just have no patience for what can face you during the day. It is these moments which for some can be the most stressful, regardless of what is done to try and prevent it. What can we do to cope? Well, an interesting thing happens at around 10:45 in the morning. A group of students, most of them Christian, accompanied by some faculty and staff, do what they know works for them to overcome the stress. They head to chapel. It is during this time when by happenstance they, as a group of friends, regardless of position or placement, are able to pause and reflect on what might be challenging them, and in the spirit of fellowship and prayer face what lies ahead.

Now, how can I say this? I figured I had my time at Concordia well in hand, capable of doing it on my own. Ironically, I was wrong. There was one day when facing a hard exam for my Intro to Logic class with Professor Strand had me all wound up and extremely stressed out. I figured I call myself a Christian, but I thought that chapel would be a waste of time. What I thought I needed was to study more, but I could not retain anything I was reading. I needed something, an inner strength to face this exam, and anytime I need that strength, I go to the Lord in prayer. The problem lies with the fact that I like to think of myself as an ecumenical Catholic (one who wants unity among Christians, while maintaining his own religion), but I certainly don't act like it. So what did I do? I buried my pride and went to check it out.

What was I expecting? I mean, I cannot tell a Catholic from a Lutheran, but since this is a Lutheran/Christian School, were they going to try to covert me or change me? Or as a friend of mine, who happens to be an atheist said, "Do they have a Lutheran Brain-Washing Machine?" I was leery because I live at St. Joseph Seminary and Newman Theological College, with the hopes of becoming a Catholic priest. I attend Morning Prayer and Mass already, so do I need to worship with a bunch of Lutherans? The answer is yes, and a big YES! As a Christian, I cannot look at one of my brothers or sisters in Christ and expect them to treat me with kit gloves because I am a Catholic-Christian. I want to be on a level playing field where my religion can coincide with my faith, and people can know I am proud to have Jesus in my heart.

They took a moment out of their day and gave thanks to the Lord for what He has done so far, and for the strength to carry on with life's challenges during the rest of their day. Did they do this vocally, speaking out about what they specifically needed help for? Nope, it was done simply with a hymn, a sharing, and at the end of it all, a blessing from Dr. Dombrosky. The amazing thing for me was that when it was over, I felt ready to face that exam. Although I did not ace it by anyone's standards, I passed with a decent mark. Did that come from within? I could not tell you where specifically, but the solace and serenity I got from going to chapel that day prepared me to face the exam. So before you make the judgment that chapel isn't for you, think about what it did for me, and you might find a moment to pause and prepare like I did.
