1. The Library catalogue and e-resources are available on and off campus 24/7 at

http://library.concordia.ab.ca/

- 2. You can renew your books online through **My Account**.
- 3. Find out what your instructor has put on reserve by visiting the online **Reserve Room**.
- 4. Your student ID card is your library card. It gives you access to Concordia's library materials and other NEOS libraries'

materials. Your card can also be used in person at those libraries.

- 5. Students get free NEOS Inter-library Loan articles.
- 6. Go to the *Information Desk* for research and citation assistance, and password and printer help.
- 7. Go to the *Circulation Desk* to sign out or return materials, book library study rooms, purchase additional printing pages, or pay library fines.
- 8. Library notices (reminders that books are due, recalls, fines owing) are sent to your Concordia email account.

- 9. The library not only has academic books for your research needs, but also CD's, DVD's, and fiction for those times you need a little mental break.
- 10. Two computer labs are located within the library and are maintained by Computing Services. Computing Services is located on the 2nd floor of the library in L356.


modern world our storytellers aren't philosophers but filmmakers. This collection of essays explores how films follow several major philosophical themes within the context of Christian faith.



We have the first three books of the Twilight (FIC MEY) series by Stephenie Meyer. As you know these books are somewhat (!) popular so if you want a specific title you can place a hold.



Another great series is the Uglies (FIC WES) by Scott Westerfeld . We have all four books in the series - as of this writing all 4 are in, so come check out this great series!



If alternate history is your cup of tea try The Years of Rice and Salt by Kim Stanley Robinson (FIC ROB). Imagine if the Black Death in the 14th century killed 99% of the population instead of 33% and China colonized the New World - what would the world be like now?

See that picture just above and to the right? I created it in just minutes at **Motivator** http://bighugelabs.com/motivator.php. You don't need to register to create your own motivational poster and save it, but if you want to order prints from the folks at Big Huge Labs you will need to sign up. What is really fun is the message you get after hitting the Create button - "Digitizing your wisdom, great one - Please wait (this should take just a moment)". Other options to play with your photos are Mosaic, Magazine Cover, Pop Art Poster, Movie Poster or Jigsaw. There are many uses for this fun site - use your imagination!

🕆 Have you heard of Wolfram Alpha yet? The buzz when it opened up was that it could be a Google killer, but that would be like comparing apples to oranges, if you catch my meaning. Check it out at http://www.wolframalpha.com/. It's billed as a "computational knowledge engine". Enter your question or calculation and their built-in algorithms & data sets will compute your answer. They cover many topics including Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Music, Web & Computer Systems, etc., etc. You can also have a bit of fun with it - try asking "What is the answer to life?" or "Why did the chicken cross the road?". Type in "88 MPH" and scroll down to "Comparisons as speed". What a hoot!

He says "Reading as an academic exercise" involves not just gleaning the content form a book or essay but engaging with it. We read not just to learn some new set of facts but also to learn how facts are put together to form an argument, to learn what kinds of arguments are acceptable in our chosen disciplines, and to prompt us towards further research." Rediscover Literature Resource Center!!

Literature Resource Center just had a facelift! This e-resource is a one-stop shop for doing research on literary topics, authors and their works. It covers all genres, disciplines, and time periods with new and updated material added daily.

Improvements to this e-resource include a better layout, more intuitive searching, and exporting to **RefWorks**. You can even listen to a scholarly article being read out loud! The Basic Search screen allows you to use the most frequently used search options, while the Advanced Search screen gives you a wider scope of search possibilities and limiters. It is also possible to search for authors based on a particular nationality or ethnicity, literary movement, time period, genre, or theme.
