



PRESIDENT KRISPIN'S MESSAGE

Welcome (back) to Concordia. You've probably done your best not to think about school for the summer. That's okay, because you've had a few months to clear your mind. You're refreshed for another busy year of studies.

The summer has been very busy on campus; there's a lot of change that's taken place and some is still underway.

I've been calling this summer our season of change because there are a lot of things that are different: some you won't notice readily, but there are also plenty that you will. A number of the changes are downright exciting, and they are all focused on you and your experience as a student at Concordia.

First, we wanted to reflect Concordia as a modern university. We have retired our old crest-based logo in favour of a new contemporary symbol and wordmark that, I believe, captures the past, present, and future of Concordia. It is an image based on the front entrance to Schwermann Hall, but also includes symbols of the river. As our new identity, it reflects the visible changes underway at Concordia.

Among the things I hope you don't notice are the new heating and air conditioning system in several of our buildings; which is to say, hopefully you won't notice being too cold or too warm, or system noise or other distractions that would interfere with your learning.

You will definitely notice included renovations to the library and the auditorium. The auditorium isn't quite finished yet since there was a delay getting new seats. But they're on the way and they'll be installed within a couple of weeks of you reading this.

Then there are the labs: Biology and Chemistry have rejuvenated and expanded facilities. We've run new conduit and ventilation ducts, walled sections in, and opened others up. The result is vastly improved wet and dry lab space for Chemistry students, and a new Biology greenhouse and animal containment facility. One of new things you'll see every day is digital signage. The new system is still being installed: eventually 11 screens will adorn the halls in the Hole Academic Centre, the Robert Tegler Student Centre, and the cafeteria in Founders Hall. Digital signage will replace much of our billboard postings, so you'll always see current messages in this quick and convenient format. The CSA (Concordia Students Association) has been instrumental in making this project happen.

We're also doing our best to eliminate spam to your student email account. New policies in the student services area mean you will get a weekly e-newsletter in your student email; gone are endless emails and notices.

Finally, you should brace your taste buds for a massive difference this year. We've amicably parted company with our old food service provider, ARAMARK, and we are pleased to welcome Chef Michel Lamontagne to run the cafeteria. His reputation precedes him, as he is also the Chef at the King's University College, which has long lauded his culinary endeavours. Chef Michel also fulfills one of our long-standing hopes in terms of a commitment to the purchase of local food whenever possible (which is not always possible: ever wonder why it says "Imported Bananas?" I know of none domestically grown!!), and the engagement of local business (such as Catfish Coffee, which in turn roasts exclusively Fair and Farm Trade coffee). Aside from this commitment to social responsibility, we know the food will provide us what Chef Michel's company is named: Choices! HANGING AROUND CAMPUS

You may spend your early days at Concordia buying books, signing forms, taking tours around the school and trying to find your classrooms, but once you have the basics down, the most important question is, of course, where to go to hang out.

You'll find that there are a few key places around the school where students tend to congregate. Let me introduce you to each of them, and try to give you the flavor of these places.

TEGLER:

This building is perhaps the most popular gathering point, simply because it's at the center of the school. A big, open, windowed area that has plenty of room and sunlight, and probably the only place that I will not need to give you directions to; if you spend any time touring or wandering around Concordia, you will find Tegler.

You will find that most students will hang out on the big steps along the elevated portion of Tegler. There are several of them all along the side of the lower half, and they are high enough and roomy enough to put your books and laptop down and sit comfortably. Dozens of students can usually be found perched upon these risers. Plus, among the higher level, there is a number of tables and chairs (and even a couch) which usually seat a number of students as well. Because nearly all the classrooms branch off from Tegler, it's a pretty common meeting area for all sorts of students.

CAFETERIA:

The only other place to challenge Tegler for propensity to gather students, this is where students have come to eat, and then promptly complain about the food. Sadly, new student, you may miss out on this proud tradition since the former food

provider is out, and a new chef is in. This place has two things going for it. One is that it's the only place to get a meal in the immediate area; you can drive down a couple blocks to Subway or McDonalds, or head the other way to get a muffin from a local coffee shop/bookstore, but your options for eating are limited. The other advantage it has is its location directly below the men's dorm, which makes it a natural meeting place for the hundred or more dorm students that live at Concordia September to April.

Often there are several students hanging out and chatting, even outside of the lunch rush. There is enough seating to accommodate well over a hundred students, and it's a good place to spend an hour between classes.

If you want to locate it, head left when exiting student and enrollment services, go in the part of the building straight ahead of you and down the stairs. Or exiting Tegler, exit the glass doors that are not leading to the parking lot, and enter the door that is ahead of you and to your right, and go down the stairs. You'll learn other ways of winding your way to the cafeteria, but that should get you there initially to start.

THAT ONE PLACE, YOU KNOW, BY THE THING:

Okay, so I have no idea what this area is called, but there's this charming little place that overlooks the official front of the school (which is particularly beautiful in the fall and spring) through a large window. There's not much seating and the place is usually full, but if you can snag a seat, it's a great place to sit, as it's well enough away from the buzz of Tegler to be a little bit better of a studying location.

In Tegler, go up the stairs and find the kiosk. There's a hallway that runs parallel to the kiosk; go down it towards the kiosk and you'll see this place right in front of

MANDOLIN BOOKS:






Happy hanging. May you waste your time as productively and in as excellent company as any human being could hope to be in.



Concordia is a thriving arts community as well as a wonderful place to learn. We have four choirs at Concordia this year, and you are welcome to audition/or participate in them! The Concordia Concert Choir usually has about 30 singers, both men and women - and this choir is taken for credit. To participate in this choir, there is an individual audition (held now at the beginning of the school year) - so if you are interested in this ensemble which meets every Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons to rehearse - sign up on the sheet outside of the School of Music (A306) or talk to Dr. Joy Berg (A201-C) about coming for an audition. Aside from the Concert Choir, there is also opportunity just to sing! Women (students, faculty, staff) are welcome to sing in Bella Voce Concordia, a women's choir that meets on

Wednesdays from 3:15-4:25; men have a similar opportunity this year (first year!) to sing in Mannechor Concordia, the new men's choir (students, faculty and staff) that meets at the same time (Wednesdays from 3:15-4:25). And last, but certainly not least, the Concordia Community Chorus welcomes all to sing on Monday nights from 7:00-9:15 – this Chorus will be ending the year singing with the Concordia Community Orchestra on May 1.

This semester, the choirs all participate together in the Sacred Music Festival on October 24 (in the Winspear Centre) – where they will be presenting Schubert's Mass in G, along with other sacred music; also together at the Christmas Concert on November 28 (at First Presbyterian Church), the choirs will be presenting a

newly-composed 6-movement Christmas work, "Welcome to Our Wondering Sight" (a Canadian premiere), accompanied by harp and oboe. TheConcert Choir will also give a Gospel Concert on Oct. 2, along with members of the Pioneer Heritage Singers.

So, come sing! The Choirs have been at the heart of Concordia since Concordia began, and along with great music, there are lots of friendships formed through these choirs; you'll be glad - and proud that you sung in a Concordia choir!

These are the things we have accomplished so far which I believe are of greatest importance to students: We have hired a new caterer to provide better food in the cafeteria. Enjoy! We have made it possible for you to pay your fees through your bank-online, at an ATM, by telephone, or in person. 
We are changing the way we communicate with students. Concordia will be sending out far fewer e-mail messages to 'All Students.' Instead, important announcements are being consolidated into one weekly e-communiqué. Concordia will also begin using e-mail as its official way to communicate with students rather than through paper and snail-mail. Therefore it is very important that you read your Concordia e-mail!


Parking passes and locker rentals can now be purchased in the bookstore. Additional print and copy credit can be purchased in the bookstore and library, as well as 'declining balance' credit for use in the cafeteria. Print credit can also be purchased online through Services for Students. We are working on increasing the amount of usable study space for students. Students will be able to use the cafeteria for after hours study. And we are working on arranging for more during-the-day study space. This will likely take the form of additional tables and chairs set up on the main floor of Tegler during the day. Students will be able to access their final course grades more quickly at the end of each term. Unofficial grades will be available online 48 hours after the last scheduled final exam.

Many other improvements have been made or are in the works, but these are what I believe would be of most immediate interest to you.

One last thing: I am going to use you, the students, to help us discern the most effective ways in which we can improve our services for you. I have already been using the CSA to that end, but will be expanding the ways in which I'll be seeking student input.
