It has taken a long time, but finally individuals, corporations, and governments are seriously acknowledging their responsibility to the environmental crisis. Dr. Dalton, Department Head of Biology and Environmental Science states that recently the fundamental issues at various round table talks on the national and provincial level are not only of economic considerations but of urgent environmental issues as well. Because of their sheer magnitude, and the repercussions that will transpire if these issues are not dealt with immediately and strategically, they will be placed on the forefront, politically, for a long time to come. Thus, because of the

so-called rapid "need" for industrialization and the ignorance, or the "laissez-faire" attitude about the environment held in main-stream society in the past, a new job market, which has been expanding at a rapid rate, has been untapped. Consequently, government and industry are starting to be in urgent need of individuals with a solid background in the field of environment science either because of their genuine ethical concern for the future of the planet or because they merely must adhere to the environmental regulations.

Therefore, in this society, there is a growing demand for individuals who have an interest in and a genuine concern for the planet, and a desire to

work in this field so that we can continue to live, to co-exist in harmony within this fragile and rapidly depleting ecosystem. At Concordia University College, the three year environmental science degree introduces students to biology and environment sciences in the two introductory survey courses which touch on such topics as the soil, atmosphere, water, occupational health, and public health. Although the student must take a number of required courses, they can specialize a little bit in the area of their choice later on in the program. Areas of specialization include, but are not limited to, limnology or terrestrial systems (land). The student interested in

Limnology (the study of fresh water systems) would study, for example, the problems of water quality or weeds in Alberta Lakes, or the problems related to fisheries. These students go on water-research field trips to the mountain lakes and take samples of various water bodies. Two of the required courses all students need

to graduate are the research technique course and the independent research project course. This latter course puts the students in a quasi-graduate student situation which not only aids the students in making future job contacts but they also learn invaluable research skills which usually are never continued on page 2...

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

For all of you who don't see this as a serious threat just look at the Quebec Nordiques and the Winnipeg Jets, folks the precedent has been set; if the corporate community and the fans don't back a team, it's dead!

Perhaps the empty coliseum seats are a sign of the times in the Edmonton hockey market. The 1994 player lockout went a long way in permanently damaging the image of pro hockey. For three months we listened to owners fighting with players to see who could build the largest pile of money. It's not hard to figure out that "Joe Fan" with his or her \$35 000 a year job did not feel very sympathetic towards millionaires fighting with millionaires. Where I think both sides really "pucked up", was that they completely forgot about the fans. Yes those pesky little people who complain on radio call-in shows about the "crappy" play of their team. Us pesky people though are the ones who pay \$40 for a ticket, about \$30 more than it's worth to keep these poor owners and players riding the gravy train. So yes, perhaps the Edmonton hockey market has forever changed. As citizens of the "city of champions", we are now faced with a sudden death question. Do we want NHL hockey in our city? Despite previous events like the lockout, I think that Edmontonians would all agree that the Oilers have been and will continue to be an asset to the community. It has been estimated that NHL hockey brings fifty million dollars annually of economic activity to Edmonton and that

is a significant enough piece of the economy to make even the non fan take notice of the current crises. Also, having a major league sports franchise in our city gives us the image of a major league city which is fundamental if Edmonton is going to grow.

if Edmonton is going to grow. So this is the deal that the NHL has approved to save diminishing small market teams like Edmonton. If the Oilers can sell all rink board advertising, all their luxury suits, and 13 000 season tickets the league will grant the Oilers a \$7 000 000 dollar subsidy. So where do we stand? The Oilers need to sell three more rink boards, eighteen more luxury suites, and about six thousand more season tickets to qualify for the subsidy. The subsidy is intended to offset the U.S currency exchange rate and limited building revenues. For example, you may be able to sell a \$100 ticket in New York but certainly not in Edmonton or Calgary. The subsidy, the league hopes, will allow teams like Edmonton and Calgary to expand their payrolls and put more competitive teams on the ice. The NHL was once a league where any team that made the playoffs had a chance to sip champagne from Lord Stanley. Now, only a few teams with deep pockets and high payrolls are serious contenders. Yes, heart does go a long way to winning a championship but it is unlikely that anyone other than Detroit, New York, Colorado, Philadelphia, or Pittsburgh will hoist the cup over their heads this spring. All, are teams that rank at the top as far as payrolls go. It is this watering down of the league that concerns the NHL board of governors and is perhaps the reason they are going so far to save small market teams and make them more competitive. The league has also admitted that Canadian teams are an important revenue source for the league when it comes to the almighty television buck. In spring when the Americans are glued to watching the NBA playoffs, Canadians are glued to watching NHL playoffs. I am confident the NHL is committed to staying in Edmonton and, so is Peter Pocklington. Why else would he spend two million dollars on a new Oilers Office or \$700 000 on a new coliseum sound system? All the mechanisms are in place to make NHL hockey work in Edmonton for the long haul but both as fans and community we are in sudden death overtime. If we do not meet all the conditions by June 1 the moving vans will move in and take our "home game" south of the boarder. The problem is that without the \$7 000 000 subsidy the Oil is not viable in Edmonton.

So what can you do as a student, faculty member, or support staff member? Buy a ticket now and then and go to a game. Why not petition the CCSA to buy a couple of mini packs, 7 or 14 games, and hand them out as prizes? As a College administration buy a couple of season tickets and hand them out to employees. And for all you faculty members with salaries as high as Gretzky and Lindros get out and buy a mini pack or season ticket. And don't feel that your providing charity. NHL hockey, despite greedy owners and players, is still one of the most entertaining games on earth. And yes! the Oilers have stepped into the future and market the game like a real major league sport. Fireworks, good music on a new sound system, score board activities, and hilarious intermission stunts make it a good time out. And for those that say there are no superstars on this team you're wrong, in my book Doug Weight and Curtis Joesph are big stars. 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

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Twelve Monkeys and a Mass Funeral

This new science fiction-thriller from director Terry Gilliam presents the audience with a series of thoughtprovoking issues to ponder long after the final credits have rolled. The premise centers around the fact that 5 billion people die in the year 1996 after a deadly virus is released worldwide. A generation later, the remaining survivors are forced to live underground, in small cages, awaiting their turn to "volunteer". Some of the most meaningful episodes of my life have been during my travels to other countries, particularly when I have been a volunteer. As a volunteer, one gains new ideas, insights and perspectives by being immersed in your host country for a short period, instead of being limited as a surface tourist. Many of us are looking for a travel experience with a difference; one that would involve more than simply visiting the Moulin Rouge, the Tower of London, and the Gucci Shops. There are innumerable possibilities for travel that entail more than the typical tourist traps. These types of experiences leave the traveller with a more lasting impression of the country as opposed to simply remembering the sore feet, cranky tour operators and bad imitation American food. The best part about being a volunteer is that it is also unlikely to break your bank account. Besides, if you're soon to be an Arts graduate like myself, you probably won't be

making any money any time soon!

Imagine that you are travelling through the most beautiful regions of France and Italy. Soaring castles and breathtaking scenery are yours to behold. The exquisite pastries and cheeses of France and the wonderful wines of Italy are a part of your daily meals. The sights and sounds of these countries are a sensory smorgasbord to be relished. During your stay, you

are a part of a team of volunteers, who have agreed to spend three weeks restoring a decaying medieval village. No knowledge of construction is needed; you simply need to have the desire to work and definitely to play in your off hours. Charges to volunteers for housing, full board and all activities for three weeks is approximately \$900 (US) and this includes transportation between France and Italy.

Alternatively, picture yourself as a member of Project Discovery. You will spend three weeks at a kibbutz in Israel working on a collective farm and living with a Jewish host family. You will then spend another week on an archeological dig and the last of your five weeks visiting various biblical sites. This seems to run a little on the expensive side at first glance, but the total cost of \$ 2400 (US) includes your flight to Israel, all of your meals, your housing, transportation and tour costs. This really is quite reasonable for this interesting and diverse travel experience.

Another option would be to volunteer with GATE, that is Global Awareness Through Experience. This organization operates tours to Guatemala, El Salvador and Mexico with the aim of providing meaningful dialogue with the poor and those who are struggling to ameliorate the situation. GATE focuses on the empowerment of all people, regardless of denomination. Their end goal is that of enabling people to find independent solutions themselves. The tours are fairly inexpensive, running \$550 for 10 days (excluding airfare). As a volunteer, you will be brought to many completely "un-touristed" areas to speak with the local people. As well, you will attend seminars with economists and politicians who are working with the people in these countries. This option has the potential to be a life-changing experience in that it will bring you in contact with situations that are not to be found in our society.

Finally, if you haven't had enough of school, there are many study-tours that are available for all those with a thirst for knowledge. The Swan Hellenic tour company offers cruises through the Mediterranean. While on board, you will be entertained and educated by top historians, archeologists, classicists, and Egyptologists. This well-versed group is at your disposal for questions and seminars as you sail the Aegean. The rates are \$250 a day for air/sea/land arrangements and is comprehensive of all your needs.

There are so many fascinating lands to explore and people to visit in this vast world. I challenge all people to travel, not only through their own country, but to learn to experience first hand the diversity of cultures at our disposal. It is only through dialogue and exposure to other ideas and modes of thinking that we learn. Thus, although we are graduates, we can continue to be students of life and to embrace all of its adventures.



Many people are concerned with the variety of world religions, but as a Christian, I am concerned with the diverse views in Christianity itself. There are so many battles between the different Christian faiths that sometimes we forget what it is to be a Christian. We are getting caught up in arguments over doctrine and who is right. As opinions are heatedly disputed, the needs of people become ignored. Churches become known more for their stance on an issue than for their belief in God and their faith in Jesus Christ. I admit that I too get caught up in these disputes, and it sometimes sickens me.

I wanted to write an article about how great Christianity is to me. This includes the ideas of being one big happy family, having brotherly love, and people who are ready to help you or even a stranger in need. This is what Christianity is supposed to advocate - the principle of love your enemy. However, people don't always practice what is preached. I can enter almost any denomination, start attending regularly, become a member, and they will take me in as one of the family. This family will gladly accept you, but it will not willingly share you with its in-laws, i.e. another denomination. If there is a situation in which for some reason you choose to attend two different churches, one or maybe even both may end up refusing you communion, asking you to leave, disowning you; ostracized and finality, excommunicate you. The result is the same no matter how you sugar-coat it; Christians deny people access to Christ's teachings. They become judge, jury, and executioner. Ultimately, we are sentencing ourselves to a spiritual death. Is this what it means to be a Christian, a brother in Christ? I think not!

Recently, I was in a small town with two churches: one Catholic and one Evangelical. I was raised half Catholic and half Lutheran, and my first choice was to attend Catholic services. Even though I maintained affiliation with the Catholic church, my friends at the Evangelical church treated me as a family member. This transition created an uneasiness because of my Catholic background. This led to a re-examination of my own religious affilia-

The fellowship I received at the Evangelical church provided me with the final encouragement that I needed to make the decision that I had been contemplating for most of my life. I decided to become a minister for the word of God in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada. The pastor of the E.L.C.I.C church, along with the congregation were very happy and offered me alot of encouragement. The Pastor even helped me with my research into other Christian faiths. The priest at my Catholic church informed me that we had nothing further to talk about now that I had reached my decision; I obviously felt very unwelcome. I realize that Lutheranism is not the same as Catholicism, but I felt he should have been pleased at my decision to preach the word of God.

After I made my decision, I was no longer able to commune at the Catholic Church. My priest said that he didn't believe that God was calling me to walk both paths in two churches. I question how he was able to state what God was or wasn't calling me to do. The only way for members of different denominations to learn from one another is through interaction and this behaviour prevents that

from happening.

The E.L.C.I.C is a good example of the principle of "All the colors bleeding into one". All people were welcome at my Lutheran church and were treated equally, There were Pentecostals, Baptists, and members of other denominations and we became one large family. Our guests were allowed to partake of the Lord's supper even though this contradicted the principle of not providing the Eucharist to non-Lutheran Christians. In our small town, a sense of oneness was achieved in this church through this generous exception.

The problem extends far beyond Catholics and Protestants. The main churches themselves exacerbate the problem through the creation of further subdivision denominations. These problems extend between the members who will not accept eachother; each group wants to be right and clings to the belief that the others are going to hell. I hate to burst their bubble of righteousness, but this is not a true Christian attitude. We must get to know our fellow humans in order to draw them towards Christ and not to isolate them due to small differences in belief.

I am studying to be a pastor in the Lutheran Church of Canada, but I state my denomination simply as that of a Christian. This is the foremost affiliation that I desire and I prefer to leave the other labels aside.

I would like to leave you with this prayer of Jesus Christ, our Lord:

"My prayer is not for them alone (his disciples). I pray also for those who will believe in me through their message, that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you" (John 17: 20-21).

The economy is changing swiftly. Companies and governments are downsizing and laying off employees. Where will the jobs be when you graduate?

Although we are seeing major economic shifts, there will always be work which needs to be done. The manner in which work is done and the structure of work is what is changing.

We are used to seeing long-term work for one organization with pensions benefits. There will be less work like this.

Looking ahead, the following work forms will be more prevalent:

- (a) Short-term work
- (b) Work for several organizations within a lifetime.
 - (c) Contracted work (d) One person companies
- (e) Multi-tracking Holding 2 or
- more jobs simultaneously

This type of work implies finding or creating or own work; planning for our own retirement; writing proposals and negotiating contracts; setting aside our own benefits, savings, pensions.

Some helpful tips:

(1) Keep an eye on current events. Watch the media and look for changes and transitions in all sectors (social, economic, etc). Each change may be seen negatively or may present an opportunity. For example: If a large oil

(e) Health. Cuts in government finding will lead to more interest in less costly methods to maintain good health including nutrition and exer-


