

A place where I can stand solid feet and smile, a place tippee toes once reached. And it really makes me wonder how insignificant my life really is to the world. Too many blame these tragedies based on what they call "selfish acts" If only they could take one day out of their busy lives, they'd understand. 






Handbell program moves into the community



Concordia's handbell program is expanding into the Edmonton area by launching an auditioned handbell ensemble with members of the local community. Resulting from the group of ringers who participated in the handbell dedication last February, this new ensemble would be the first community-based auditioned group in Edmonton. The artistic committee consists of ringers from the dedication who have the vision for the future as well as solid connections among handbell ringers and directors. The hope is to secure an invitation to perform at the Ringing Link 2002 in Winnipeg in July.

While Concordia's Dr. John Hooper will serve as the initial conductor of this ensemble, the group, once established, will make decisions about future artistic direction. This as-of-yet-unnamed handbell choir will complement the existing Concordia Handbell Ensemble, which has performed at various Concordia events, including concerts and tours. Established in 2000 in part through a generous gift by the Concordia Guild, the handbell program has emerged as a vital and unique part of music at Concordia.



UFOs, JFK and Elvis: Conspiracies you don't have to be crazy to believe By Richard Belzer

Conspiracy Theory with Kevin Nealon

Richard Belzer is detective John Munch on <u>Homicide</u>, and he is also a stand-up comic. Belzer has a very dry sense of humour, and one of his favourite subjects is political satire. In his book, Richard looks at some famous and some not so famous conspiracy theories. Fans of the <u>X-Files</u>, or Oliver Stone's movie <u>JFK</u>, will especially appreciate this book.

In the first part of the book, Belzer looks at the mystery and controversy surrounding the assassination of John F. Kennedy. Richard brings to light many inconsistencies, from problems with how the murder was investigated, to how the material from the investigation was hidden from the public. New information is brought out about the famous Zapruder film. According to Belzer, there seems to be evidence of doctoring of the original film footage, but to what extent seems unknown. Another conspiracy theory is that there appeared to be a shooter on the grassy knoll, and any evidence relating to this was suppressed. Witnesses to the assassination, who wanted to testify as to what they saw, were threatened and even disappeared. There are of course other theories put forth in Belzer's book; and throughout the text, Belzer lets his dry humour show.

"I wrote this book to inspire you to do what the powers that be wish you wouldn't: to question authority...and to keep an eye out for Elvis."-Richard Belzer.

Despite the title of the book, there is really nothing in the book about Elvis. The book is primarily about the murder of JFK, and the last part of the book talks about UFOs and aliens. The book is actually rather well researched, as the back of the book contains quite a few sources, but it is questionable as to whether or not these sources are reliable! I found the book enjoyable to read, and anyone that is interested in conspiracies should have a real laugh reading this book.

The show takes the format of a panel discussion, with Kevin Nealon as the host. The panel consists of three guests, one or two from the entertainment industry, (usually comedians), and an expert on the show topic. Nealon poses questions to the panel, and the panel debates the questions in a humourous manner.

Some of the show topics have been: Is Elvis alive, Did rock stars from the 1960's-70's actually die




of natural causes, or were they murdered? The show topics are interesting, and actually bring to light a few questions that are open to debate about what actually happened in certain famous events.

Kevin Nealon was formerly on Saturday Night Live, and is an accomplished comic. Throughout the show, just when serious debate is about to get under way, Nealon

interjects his special brand of sarcastic humour. Most of the time this is funny, but occasionally I found that I wanted to hear the guest's point of view. I say this despite the fact that it is hard to be serious when talking about how Elvis is still alive, and how the CIA could have killed Jim Morrison!

The show has a live studio audience, and at the end of the discussion, the audience is allowed to ask questions, and interject their own weird comments. It is clear that many people in the audience take the conspiracy theories seriously, as many of the questions appear to be asked sincerely. People have asked about sightings of Elvis in their local towns, and also serious questions about the assassinations of rock celebrities. The audience questions are actually some of the funniest moments on the show.

- 7. All entries become of the property of The Fraser Institute. In addition to receiving cash prizes; winners may have their essays published in Fraser Institute periodicals.
