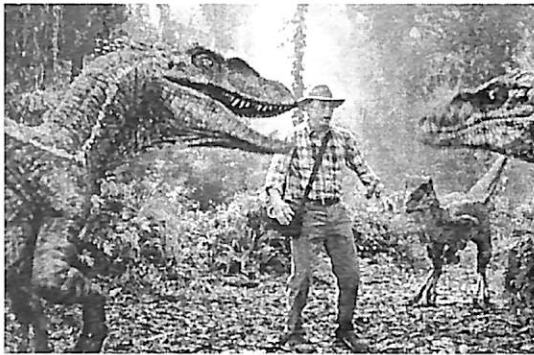

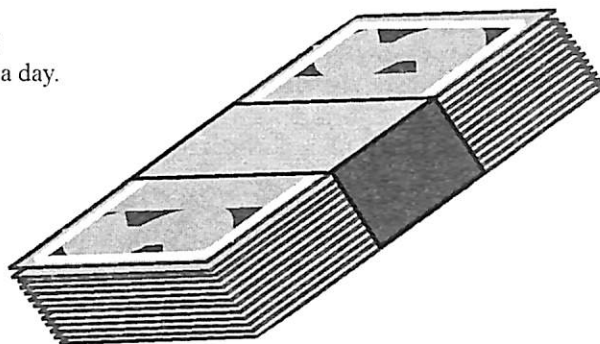

Student Services Is Here For You

We, in Student Services, would like to welcome all of you to Concordia for the 2001-2002 academic year. We are pleased that you have chosen Concordia as your university and we are committed to making this choice one of the best you have ever made.

The following are a few of the services we offer:

The Office of the Registrar handles all **academic advising and changes to courses and programs** and issues transcripts of marks.

The Office of the Dean of Student Affairs provides counsel and support in all matters of **student well-being**. Student Affairs handles appointments for the **Career Practitioner** and the **Counselling Psychologist** and special arrangements for **students with disabilities**. The Dean of Student Affairs functions as the **student advocate** in areas of difficulty which the student may encounter and is responsible for promoting and maintaining the **safety of students** and a **positive academic environment**.
